

June is designated as Rotary Fellowships Month, a time when we focus on recognizing and promoting the importance of International Fellowships and goodwill among Rotarians with common interests.

Let's first think about the meaning of "Fellowship". Fellowship is a core value of Rotary. It starts in our own club, where we enjoy fun activities together. However, it's more than just fun activities. Fellowship means being supportive, accepting and friendly with all of our members and adding value to each individual's membership by focusing on their positive characteristics.

On July 4th, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. ET, all of the United States will watch with bated breath as men and women from around the country gather to partake in one of our great American sports: eating hot dogs.

The Nathan's Hot Dog Eating Contest has, both miraculously and completely unsurprisingly, carved out a niche in our culture. Every year, people tune in to watch men and women alike stuff as many hot dogs (and buns) as possible into their rigorously trained stomachs.

The record for the most hot dogs ever eaten at Nathan's Hot Dog Eating Contest is held by Joey Chestnut, who ate 76 hotdogs in 2021! So much is said about Michael Jordan, Babe Ruth, and Tom Brady. Is LeBron James the greatest of all time? Muhammad Ali, Serena Williams, Michael Phelps, Simone Biles. These are the GOATs, the untouchable pantheon of great athletes. Where is Joey Chestnut's name? Have we ever seen such sustained dominance in a sport? The answer is no. No, we have not.

Of course, Joey Chestnut is not the only annual participant at Nathan's – and there were many great hot dog consumers in the years before his arrival on the scene. Takeru Kobayashi won the first five annual Nathan's contests, which began in 2002. His top win was 64.5 hot dogs. Matt Stonie is the only person to topple Joey Chestnut head-to-head since 2007; he ate 62 that year. Those two, and Chestnut, are the only winners in contest history. Carmen Cincotti is destined to be overlooked for a historically strong second-place effort in 2018 (64 dogs that year).

In 2011, Nathan's opened up a second contest on the Fourth of July for female competitors. So, in the more than a decade since, let's take a look at the five most hot dogs and bun eating in the women's Hot Dog Eating Contest. Much like the men's record book was written by Joey Chestnut, the women's records are co-authored by Miki Sudo, who has won every women's contest since 2014 except 2021 when she did not compete while pregnant, and Sonya Thomas, who won the first three women's contests. Sudo's highest number of dogs eaten for a win was 51, compared to Thomas' 48.5.

The best hot dog brands of 2025, according to taste tests and expert recommendations, include:

- * <u>Nathan's Famous Skinless Beef Franks</u>: Known for their crisp skin, subtle spice, uniform texture, and juicy flavor, these hot dogs are considered the pinnacle of a hot dog experience.
- * <u>Boar's head Uncured Frankfurters</u>: These hot dogs are praised for their minimal prep, easy cooking, and crowd-pleasing taste, making them a favorite for cookouts.
- * <u>Hebrew National Beef Franks</u>: With a beef-forward flavor and a hint of smoke, these hot dogs are perfect for topping with chili and salsa.
- * <u>Oscar Mayer Original Uncured Wieners</u>: These hot dogs are known for their squishy texture, salty flavor, and classic hot dog taste, making them versatile for various dishes.

These brands have been recognized for their quality and taste, making them top choices for hot dog lovers in 2025.

Soraeya shared that her experience in working with Christine at United Way has impacted both her personal and professional life. She loves being a part of an agency that "creates real human connections" and a network of people working together to make positive changes in the community.

United Way's mission is to help children and families thrive. Their vision is to "inspire and build a community where everyone has the opportunity to reach their full potential." They are focused on creating community-based and community-led solutions, and their campaign raises money to support community partners in three focus areas: Learn Well, Earn Well, and Stay Well.

The Learn Well focus area is centered on education, reflecting on United Way's belief that educational opportunities should be available to all children and youth to help them succeed in life. Initiatives include: assisting children with Kindergarten readiness; increasing the number of children reading at grade level by grade 3; and providing food, clothing and other essentials to local students. United Way of Trumbull County is also an affiliate of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.

The Earn Well focus area is dedicated to helping families achieve financial stability and a secure future. Partner agencies funded under this focus area help individuals develop skills and knowledge needed to secure better employment and increase their earning potential, manage finances more effectively, reduce stress and improve their quality of life, and build a stronger future for their children through access to education and resources.

Finally, "Stay Well" initiatives focus on health and basic needs of families, especially women and children with special needs. These partner agencies aim to improve access to healthcare, promote healthy lifestyles, address food insecurity and homelessness, prevent and manage chronic illness, provide mental health support, and more. 2-1-1, a 24 hour emergency hotline, assists in connecting families with resources.

Soraeya stated that Trumbull County United Way's strength lies within its people and support from the community. Their volunteers, who help with events, are very much appreciated. She believes that one small act of kindness comes back to you. And in closing, she said, "Warren is resilient, but with support, we will be unstoppable."
