Clean water, sanitation and hygiene are basic necessities for a healthy, productive life. Yet, millions of people die from preventable waterborne diseases caused by unsafe water. At least 3,000 children die daily from diarrheal diseases, which is a grim reminder of the importance for Rotary members to make providing clean water and sanitation a priority.

March 22nd is World Water Day, but Rotarians lead clean water initiatives on an ongoing basis, especially in underdeveloped countries. They spearhead projects to install latrines and washing stations, lay water pipelines and maintain other new infrastructure to harvest clean water, and organize educational programs to promote handwashing and other good hygiene habits.

\$24 is all it takes to provide one person with safe water. Today, over 23 million people have access to sanitation and hygiene thanks to Rotary projects.

MAGAZINE REPORT

This month's edition of *Rotary* has so many interesting articles, covering topics including a dog-friendly service project in Korea, high tech polio mapping in Africa, extreme isolation among young adults in Japan, and the world's nuclear dilemma. However, I picked just three stories that highlight how people, from the youngest to the oldest, can make changes in the world through Rotary.

"The Business of Caring" on page 18 is the story of a six year old boy in Japan. After Typhoon Haiyan ravaged the Philippines in 2013, this child visited the Philippine Embassy in Tokyo and donated the money in his piggy bank to help victims, including those in his own city of Tacloban, which was decimated. After that act of love, Johnny and Veronica Yu of the Philippines were so inspired that they became members of the Arch Klumph Society Chairs Circle by contributing more than \$500,000 to the Rotary Foundation. They had been involved in Rotary for decades but boosted their giving because of a six year old! They support PolioPlus because it started in their country, and they said they support the Foundation because they believe in hope, love, blessings, answered prayers, God and the Magic of Rotary. They encourage all of us to leave that same legacy behind in the work we do, the people we help and the lives we change.

Let's travel over to Washington State now, where it is estimated that 1 in 11 residents, and 1 in 8 children, face hunger. Food insecurity increased dramatically after the start of the COVID-19 Pandemic and remain high today, especially among people of color and households with children. Now, with their apple industry, the state's agricultural sector turns out an abundance of produce. Yet, in 2022, about 1/3 of the United States' food supply – more than 12 million tons – was left unharvested. This feature article in this month's edition of everyone's favorite magazine details how Harvest Against Hunger and other non-profits, like Rotary, are linking farms to food banks and reducing food waste. Be sure to check out "From Farm to Pantry" on page 24.

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Finally, in "Responsible Voluntourism", we're given some tips from a veteran volunteer on how to truly make a positive impact in communities that we visit. Susan Gibson loves to travel, and when she turned 30, she flew to Haiti to volunteer. She thought she could roll up her sleeves, jump in and do whatever needed to be done, and everyone would be happy. However, it turned out to be a lot more complicated. The non-profit that she connected with didn't align with her values.

So, she came home, went back to school to study overseas service and development, and landed an internship with a Nobel Peace Prize laureate, where she learned about microfinance in Banghladesh. She watched and learned, and went on to a career in international development, working and volunteering in 70 countries. And here are the lessons she learned:

- 1. Start local. Before you go to another country, find out what you can do at home and build upon your experience.
- 2. Be prepared. Do your research and really think about what you want out of an experience.
- 3. Spend time in the field. If you're going to go through the trouble of putting yourself on a plane to a foreign country, interact with the people, clarify what their needs are, and don't just talk about helping actually do it.
- 4. Respect people. Adhere to their community's culture.
- 5. Listen to what people are saying and don't make assumptions. Resist the temptation to say, "All you need to so is . . ."
- 6. Learn by doing. You won't know all the answers to problems until you have firsthand knowledge.
- 7. Work in partnership with the residents of the community. Be a catalyst, cheerleader, facilitator, and connector. Do WITH others, not FOR others.
- 8. Park your ego! As a volunteer, everything is your job, even the mundane tasks. Don't look for pats on the back because it's not all about you!
- 9. Be adaptable, empathetic, compassionate and understanding not judgmental. When things don't go the way you want, take a deep breath and stay calm.
- 10. Follow up. When you make promises and commitments, keep them. Thank everyone who has helped you, without expecting anything in return. Sounds a lot like "Service above Self"!



<u>NATE MAZUR,</u> ALL ABOUT THE PAWZ DOG RESCUE

Nate Mazur is a Quality Manager for Xaloy, a supplier of plastic manufacturing equipment based in Austintown, Ohio. He lives in Cortland with his wife of 24 years, his two daughters, and his AATP rescue dogs, Luna and Sadie.

Nate has volunteered a few times a week at AATP for the past $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, where he helps take care of the dogs, assists with building maintenance, and organizes fundraisers for the organization.

AATP is an all volunteer-run dog shelter and foster based dog rescue located in Youngstown, Ohio. There are currently 10 to 12 animals in shelter care and 30+ dogs in foster care. Many of the dogs that come to



the shelter also require veterinary care. AATP is a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization, funded by private donations and community fundraising. All funds go directly to pay for care of the animals, including food and veterinary care expenses, as well as shelter operating expenses.

AATP's mission is to find loving, forever homes for all of their dogs, with people who understand that a pet is a family member. The majority of their shelter animals come from Mahoning and Trumbull County pounds and other local dog rescues. However, they have also received animals from crisis areas as far away as Tennessee and Mississippi. These dogs need to be rescued due to being abandoned, abused or neglected. In some cases, owners surrender the dogs due to life changing events.

The shelter requires volunteers to feed, walk, play, and spend time

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with the dogs, as well as complete chores like sweeping, mopping, doing dishes and laundry, and taking out trash. Volunteers also help to plan fundraisers, such as basket raffles, concerts, online raffles, dinners and bake sales, and t-shirt sales.

In addition to volunteering, you can help AATP by adopting or fostering a rescue dog, supporting animal charity group fundraisers, liking/sharing animal rescue social media pages and posts, and spaying and neutering your own pets.




