<u>COLONEL MICHAEL MALONEY</u>
<u>& SR. MASTER SGT. BOB BARKO,</u>

<u>910<sup>th</sup> AIRLIFT WING,</u>

Colonel Michael Maloney (pictured above on the right) is the commander of the 910<sup>th</sup> Airlift Wing at the Youngstown Air Reserve Station. As commander, he is responsible for the training of personnel and employment of C-130 Hercules aircraft globally. He was commissioned through the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of Missouri. He began his career as a navigator and electronic warfare officer at Barksdale Air Force Base and graduated from pilot training in 2002. He has logged more than 5,000 military and civilian pilot hours. He also has many years of experience in Joint Special Operations Detachment and Foreign Language Training, and is a certified Foreign Area Officer (FAO) with a European specialty. He was previously stationed in Texas, Florida, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Illinois, Georgia, Uganda and Germany. He has been assigned to Ohio for the past 6 months.

Senior Master Sergeant Bob Barko, Jr. currently serves as the Superintendent of the 910<sup>th</sup> Airlift Wing's Public Affairs Office.

He originally joined the military in 1986. He later graduated from Youngstown State University in 1993, where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Graphic Design, with a minor in Computer Graphics. He also earned an Associate's Degree in Mass Communication/Media Studies from Community College of the Air Force. Shortly after 9/11, Barko reenlisted in the Ohio National Guard as a public affairs specialist. In 2006, he joined the Air Force and was stationed at the Youngstown Air Reserve Station where he's been serving ever since. He is a Mahoning Valley native who has always been fascinated by the history and culture of the area. Out of uniform, Master Sgt. Barko is a graphic artist for his business, Steel Town Studios.

During the first segment of their program, Colonel Maloney stated that no one joins the military knowing exactly what they will do. Rather, the heroic act is raising your hand to join in the first place. He told us stories of strategic air command missions that his family members were involved in during the Cold War and bitter fights in Iraq. He emphasized that the brave individuals serving in the military at that time were kids, but many are still here, and they're still amazing, and they still need our support. So, his message to America is to always remember the past, present and future veterans

Master Sgt. Barko then took over the program and gave us a more in-depth look at the 910<sup>th</sup> Airlift Wing, whose mission is to provide a current, qualified, mission-ready force. They are always ready to answer the nation's call to provide tactical airlift, aerial spray and agile combat support. Nearly 1,900 personnel are assigned to the Airlift Wing's home base at YARS. The Air Force Reserve Unit at YARS is the largest in Ohio, only behind Wright Patterson Air Force Base. Sitting on approximately 330 acres, YARS houses eight C-130s and \$1 billion in federal assets. As the largest employer in Trumbull County, they pour \$100 million into the local economy, making the 910<sup>th</sup> and YARS vital to national defense and to the Mahoning Valley as well. Eight new C-130Js have been promised to the base, which will nearly double their assets.

YARS has a longstanding history as part of the Mahoning Valley, dating back to 1955. During wartime, the  $910^{th}$  Wing uses C-130 Hercules tactical cargo aircraft to deliver personnel and materials by airdrop and air – land techniques. They have delivered vital supplies to soldiers in Afghanistan, Iraq, Europe and the Middle East, as well as humanitarian cargos to global locations.

The Department of Defense tasks the 910<sup>th</sup> to control disease-carrying insects and undesirable vegetation via Aerial Spray Missions. Only EPA products are used for these missions, which are carried out in combat areas or in response to natural disasters and emergencies.

YARS also houses one of only four EPA-approved training centers for Pesticide Applicator Certification, serving both the U.S.A. and overseas.

The 910<sup>th</sup> and YARS are engaged in the local community by offering equipment displays, speaking engagements, air shows, mutual aide to fire trucks, and night vision training.
