TO ERADICATE, CIRCUMNAVIGATE

Piloted by two bold Rotarians, the Flight to End Polio took the route less traveled

- Two Iowa Rotarians, John
 Ockenfels and Peter Teahen,
 took a single-engine Cessna
 210 around the world in a
 flight to end Polio.
- Their trip took three months to complete and four years to plan.



- The scheduling was affected by the COVID-19 pandemic as well as Russia's invasion of Ukraine.
- The invasion caused them to make a major overhaul to their flight plan.
- Ockenfels and Teahen funded the trip themselves. The trip cost them about \$100,000.
- Before they took off, they had already raised \$1 million.
- The men made 37 stops in 19 countries and travelled about 26,000 miles.

And their welcome home celebration? A pancake breakfast... after all, they ARE Rotarians!

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WHY MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

- Prioritizing mental health is one of President Gordon McInally's initiatives this year.
- He hopes to erase the stigma associated with mental health.
- As we have heard before, in the wake of COVID-19, mental health has become a silent crisis.
- Mental health affects our physical health as well as how we relate to our family, friends, and community.
- One in eight or 970 million people worldwide live with significant mental health conditions.
- The World Health Organization has compiled research showing that people with mental health issues are more likely to have other health issues such as diabetes and heart conditions.
- Poverty, violence, disability, and inequality put people at a higher risk of mental health issues.
- By treating others with care, respect, and dignity, we can all improve the mental health of our community.

THE PURPLE PINKIE PROJECT: In countries where the threat of Polio remains high, children under the age of five years receive the polio vaccine by mouth twice a year during National Immunization Days. In order to document which children have received the vaccine, every child vaccinated has the little finger (pinkie) nail of their left hand painted with an indelible purple marker. On Tuesday, October 24th, in recognition of World Polio Day, District 6650 is hosting a fundraiser event for the End Polio Now campaign. For every \$20 donated, you will receive a dozen Purple Pinkie Donuts, glazed donut sticks topped with a dab of purple icing. Each box provides vaccines to help eradicate polio. A donation has been made in our club's name.

ERIC THOMPSON'S TRIP TO INDIA

Eric Thompson is a graduate of the 1980 Class of Howland High School. He attended both Kent State and Youngstown State Universities. Eric has held political office and has been to 32 countries. He has raised money to buy thousands of chickens for oppressed people around the world. He truly has a heart of gold. Eric was recently inducted into the Howland Schools Achievement Hall of Fame.

Eric has been the proud owner of Satali Carpet for 31 years. He has been married for 36 years and has three children and seven grandchildren.

Eric recently spent three weeks in Asia and performed magic shows in India for two weeks this past February. He told us all about his trip at our last club meeting.

The flight from New York's Kennedy Airport to New Dehli lasted 16 hours. Eric stayed in a Sheraton in New Dehli, and he could see a sign outside the window saying, "Don't make direct eye contact with the monkeys". Apparently, the monkeys are quite hostile and aggressive.

While in New Dehli, India surpassed China as the most populated nation. The people were very proud and celebrated in the streets.

Eric's tour guide arranged for him to spend Holi, the celebration of color, with a local family.





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Eric reported that everywhere he went, half of the vehicles were motorcycles, and the streets were packed with people. Cows and garbage were also in the streets. There is no garbage pick-up in New Dehli, so people throw the garbage in the streets and burn it at night.

Cows are revered in India, because when a mother is not able to provide milk for her child, the cows do so. Thus, they're revered like a mother. Cows wander the streets all day but go home at night to be milked.


Children walk to school and wear uniforms.

There are also flower markets everywhere. The people wrap the flowers into chains and adorn the cows with them.

Elephants are also revered in India, although Eric was not sure why.

Snake charmers can also be found


in India.





Eric said that the architecture in India is stunning. There are marble buildings that are hundreds of years old, inlaid with precious stones, such as Mother of Pearl, Garnet, and Amethyst. Yet, right next door, one can find abject poverty. Eric also saw very colorful Buddhist temples.

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Women in India wear traditional garb, such as a Sari, which is a dress made of eight yards of material. Men wear jeans except at weddings when both individuals wear traditional clothing. The wedding celebration lasts for days.



Eric indicated that the best way to experience the culture of an area is to attend weddings and funerals.

Eric also loves to get haircuts in foreign countries. In India, a haircut cost him \$20 with a tip. He was treated very differently than he is in an Ohio salon. In India, he felt like the "king of the world".

The people of India work until Noon and then take a siesta. There are vendors everywhere selling fruit, vegetables, and wares. They make their own rugs, by hand, which takes hundreds of hours.



There is a lot of building going on in India, and hence, many brick factories. They also burn cow manure patties for fuel.

While in India, Eric had the privilege of visiting an orphanage started by Mother Teresa.

And one final tidbit - every family in India gets a mating pair of chickens. If they do not eat this original pair of birds, the family will have food for life.

Eric had many more pictures than I could show here, and he told the story of his trip with interesting facts and humor. Many thanks to Eric for sharing. Can't wait to see where he goes next!
