Wellesley Rotary had a good representation of members at the November 5th meeting. Guest speaker, Claude Kaitare, originally from Rwanda, graduated from high school in Portland, Maine, did undergrad work at Clark University and grad work at Salem State University. He presented a series of slides as he talked about the horrendous Rwandan genocide of the 1990's and its impact on him and his family. First, a little geography lesson, where is Rwanda? On a map he displayed his country as in east Africa formerly part of the Belgian Congo, south of Uganda and north of Burundi. He gave us a little history of the country from 1853 to 2016, how the Europeans became involved ("scientific racism" per Berlin Conference (1894), and how Africa was divided up as shown in a 1914 map. Called the "Land of a Thousand Hills", Rwanda was home to the Kaitare family for generations. On April 6, 1994, Presidentcontinued

continued... Habyarimana was assassinated, killed in a plane crash. This event set off a power struggle between the revengeful Tutsi, who had no share in power, and the Hutu people, resulting in over a million deaths! The Hutu militia (Interahamwe or "those who attack together") created roadblocks and virtually shut down the country including schools, businesses, etc. The scale and brutality of the massacre caused shock worldwide. A UN peacekeeping team sounded the alarm. Claude remembers the peace keepers. His family moved north during the crisis although many family members were lost. Major General Paul Kagame, head of the Rwandan Patriotic Front, later became President of Rwanda and brought stability to the country. In the post-genocide period a "Gacaca Court system" was organized to bring justice (revenge? forgiveness?) to the suffering people. Genocide memorials proliferated all over the country. The one at Myamata shows the world what happened and include open crypts of shelved skulls. Another at Kigali lists the many names of the Kaitare family members who lost their lives. The country is slowly healing but the memory will never be lost...Never Again! Claude and his family were reunited in 2005 and he showed many touching photos of family members alive and dead. Outpouring from all corners of the world tries "to restore the rhythm of life." Claude gave us a very compassionate insight into a national tragedy that exceeds the limits of our humanity. Our deep appreciation for this moment. Many interesting Q&A's followed.
