MassBay Rotaract members signed everyone in as a large crowd gathered. President Bill Westerman opened the meeting with the Pledge and a few words about Rotary along with a handout about Wellesley Rotary and its programs in the community. Rotarian Nora Pou, Chair of the Club's Food Insecurity Committee, introduced President Podell. Chair of the MBCC Board of Trustees and Wellesley resident, Tom Peisch was also introduced. Dr. Podell described the scenario of community colleges in Massachusetts. MassBay is one of fifteen and they are run separately from the state and university systems. They are open to everyone regardless of education background and they come with a variety of needs and hopes. Many students are transfers and many come with a big disparity in age. ...continued

continued... This presents a challenge for teachers and requires imagination and hard work for the students. Most graduate with an Associates Degree on the way to a four year school. Along the way each student is supported with tutoring, counseling and mentoring. He covered tuition costs (\$6,140 per year) which can be quite onerous for a student. The campus covers programs in Framingham & Ashland. Veterans attend and have been a great transitional success. Survey of typical students show an interesting cross-section (82% work; 48% care for a dependent; 37% are of color; 35% are first generation in college; 34% are considered low income and 11% are disabled). For many students, education is a "stop & start" process...taking one semester at a time. He then described the Food Insecurity issue on campus, what it is; what is being done; and how one can help. This "lack of access to nutritional food" affects the student in many ways primarily in lack of concentration on studies. Some cannot afford to buy food! Intervention has taken on many successful directions including efforts to "destigmatize" being hungry. SNACK or "food on the go" is made available along with a Mobile Market for students to shop. They currently feed over 600. Other local groups participate as well. Becky Kannam spoke as a involved volunteer. Donations are always solicited. Vin Spoto spoke for Wellesley Rotary and it's involvement (Marathon runners; Taste of Wellesley and a District Grant (\$5K)). All help. Many Q&A's helped inform all of us. **A**A
