Next Step: College Success & Independent Living

The Judge Baker Children's Center is a Harvard Medical School affiliate with proven leadership in the area of children's mental health. It was founded in 1917 and is located on Parker Hill near N.E. Baptist Hospital in Boston. As a non -profit corporation, it serves children by promoting their developmental, emotional and intellectual well-being. It runs the Manville School which goes to the 10th grade. The speaker was Matt Arnold who heads the Next Step Program for College Success. Sarah Duggan, who accompanied the speaker, works with Matt at the Judge Baker. Next Step serves high school students with autism who want to attend college but need to learn the social and independent living skills required to succeed. These students often experience higher rates of anxiety, depression and drop out, The Next Step Program focuses on students above grade 10 who present social language deficits. The program encompasses three Saturdaylong sessions throughout the school year and a week-long overnight dormitory experience at Boston College in the summer. The speaker noted that the attendees are capable of doing college work, but lack the social skills to ensure successful interaction with their peers. Mary Jane **Toohey** of Wellesley attended the Rotary meeting to attest to the benefit her son received from the Next Step program. Because the costs of running the program are quite high, the speaker requested that Wellesley Rotary consider supporting the program.

Note:* Here's our World Peace Scholar, Dr. Matthew Johnsen, Ph.D.'s, continued experience at the Rotary Peace Center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok Thailand:

We met with people on both sides of the conflict, from Sri Lankan Generals and politicians to former solders and family members of the Tamil Tigers. We found a deep desire among many for reconciliation and moving past this conflict but not yet a willingness to deal with the painful truths associated with this conflict. Conversations with Sri Lankans who had lost family members in the war made it clear how difficult it is to move beyond these losses, and to resume cordial relations with the former enemy.

Each Fellow came to Bangkok with his or her own vision of peace. Over the course of our time together, by sharing, learning from one another, drawing insights from gifted faculty, these visions have been enlarged and strengthened. As I interview my colleagues and they share the paths they have taken to devote their work and lives in the pursuit of peace, their stories touch me but also enlarge my own vision. And move me into action.
