Mentoring at MBCC—Julie Ginn. Vin concluded with announcing that another 1500 masks had been distributed to MBCC; meals delivery to NECHV, and a program to invite new residents of Wellesley to join our Club (Membership). John Adams will be the first to personalize letters to 70. Linda Tighe introduced our guest speaker, Lara Smith. Lara is a 2016 graduate of Wellesley High and currently a student of politics and journalism at NYU. Entitled "My Summer as a Political Affairs Ambassador" Lara announced she is a "global citizen", gave her background and her experience teaching in India for 6 months-part of her involvement with the **Borgen Project**. Named for founder & president, Clint Borgen, the Project was founded in 1999 and is headquartered in Seattle. As a non-profit its goal is to downsize poverty in the world by supporting legislation that encourages support for aid. Lara led us on a path of what happens as people transition out of poverty-barely surviving to working poor to middle & upper class. She encouraged us to look at "foreign aid as an investment" to correct this. It creates a stable & thriving community. It's methodology is simply: advocacy (approaching Congressional leaders); education (teaching constituents); mobilization (encourage support); messaging (raise awareness on poverty reduction issues). Presently the Project has 931 volunteers and had 762 meetings with Congress. She gave two examples of approach: "keep every girl in school" act and "increase the international affairs budget". Her personal experience with the Project resulted when she realized "I have a voice". In a very inspiring way she asked us Rotarians; Are we inspired? Get involved. Call Congress. Donate to the project. Our thanks to Lara for an informative talk.

Important changes in Global Grants from The Rotary Foundation by K.R. Ravindran, Chair.

Continued... By 2018-19, the number of global grants awarded had risen to 1,403 worth \$86.6 million. You will note that while demand for our grants had shot up by 80 percent, corresponding Annual Fund contributions never kept pace, showing only a 7 percent increase during this same time period. Therein lies our fundamental problem.

Last year, for instance, we fully expended our World Fund budget for global grants by mid-May 2020. At that point, we realized we had become victims of our own success.

This year, we have almost \$12 million less in our World Fund for global grants. And that has nothing to do with COVID-19; it's because our Annual Fund contribution two years ago decreased significantly, especially after the sterling performance the prior year, which incidentally happened to be our centennial year.

After much thought and discussion, this month, your Trustees initiated a new policy that <u>eliminated</u> the match on cash contributions to global grants. We knew it would hurt, but we had little choice. The alternate options, which we carefully examined to make up for ato be continued....
