Ad Hoc By-Law Committee headed by PP Bill Westerman has concluded the update the Club's 2015 draft By-Laws. It is now under review by PP Frank Rowbotham before a Club vote. The Committee also includes: President Vin Spoto, President- Elect Linda Tighe, Donna Armentano and PP Tory DeFazio. Among the 18 present we welcomed Meg Steere and Travis Ning from project MAIA (Travis was in Guatemala!), Marguerite Chatelier, and Keith Miller from MBCC. We began with the Pledge followed by an Invocation by Toby Kell. Happy Dollars: Rowbotham, Tighe, Kaiser and Spoto. President Vin gave a Club Update which included: Summer Sked-Wellesley Rotary is planning to resume restaurant meetings in July & August; Patrick Hayden gave an update on the *Music Series in Wellesley* Square. Last Saturday 8 hours of live music entertained visitors and shoppers. The series lasts through August. Vin urged members to get in their budgets for 2021-2022 as soon as possible. Tory DeFazio gave an update on *EREY* (see p. 2). There was also discussion about matching grants, and the 4-Way Writing contest from Donna Armentano. The annual "Taste of Wellesley" is still in doubt for this year. Meg Steere of Wellesley then introduced **Travis** Ning to give us an overview of MAIA (stands for Mayan women). Travis, originally from Colorado, was in the Peace Corp and is now married with two boys and living in Guatemala. He's been associated for 11 years with MAIA. He described Mayan women as "poor, rural, Mayan and female" - the worst generation gender equity gap affecting 20% of indigenous girls. He described MAIA as an opportunitycontinue

to "unlock and maximize the potentials of young women to lead transformative change". A new school (MAIA Impact School) has opened which is "designed for indigenous women leaders and to educate indigenous girls." It's goals are: to develop economic autonomy; "create a family on her terms"; achieve lifelong learning, and be "empowered to empower". Travis described the progress of the MAIA ("It's on track.") and how they have collaborated with Rotary clubs in Guatemala and in the U.S. They are looking for clubs to "chip in" not only financially but help create a program to equip a generation of "Girl Pioneers" to find work after high school and prepare for higher education.

Julie Ginn updated us on DEI (Diversity, Equality and Inclusion) efforts in Rotary D7910. A Social Equity Task Force has been created with 20 members and 6 active sub-committees. She talked about diversity in Rotary quoting Founder, Paul Harris; "This is a changing world. We must be prepared to change with *it.*" She then presented some Wellesley demographics including the recent Select Board statement in support of anti-racism and anti-bias; the appointment of a Director of DEI for the public schools (Dr. Charmie Curry), and how DEI has a different impact on the town. So what's next? She encouraged us not to be "bystanders" but "upstanders". There were many interesting question and discussion points on both subjects presented at this Rotary meeting. 🛡 🛡 🛡
