a connection. All this is leading to a Global Grant down the road so stay tuned. Prez Vin updated us on several on-going projects including: *Food Insecurity Forum*—**Dede Long** will chair follow-up; **John Adams** briefed us on environment development (Club, District and Town); **Toby Kell** on a new food insecurity grant; "*Rotary Minute*" spots by **Linda Tighe, Dede Long** and **Sue Bevilacqua**; Annual Arbor Day on 4/20/21; Rotaract at MBCC rechartered and recipient of a Club's \$500 donation & **VP Linda Tighe** successfully completed PETS (President-Elect Training). **AG Sue Peghiny** brought us up-to-speed on District developments and encouraged us to continue participation.

Andrea Kaiser introduced her neighbor, and our guest speaker, Alex Doe. In a "thank you" to Wellesley Rotary Alex spoke about his first connection with the Club with fundraiser, CCL (Chicago City Limits) in 2016 and later, receiving scholarship aid from the Club. He graduated from Lafayette College in Easton, PA in government law & international affairs. During his undergraduate years he was a student abroad three time (London School of Economics, Madrid and Cuzco, Peru). Rotary and its GPEI* partners celebrate a monumental achievement, say global eradication of wild polio is possible with the continued dedication and persistence of Rotarians

* The **GPEI** is a public-private **partnership** led by national governments with six core **partners** – the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), UNICEF, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and, most recently, Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.

"From raising funds and immunizing children, to providing 'polio plusses,' such as soap and health kits, Rotary members have shown resilience and steadfast dedication to our top priority of ending polio."

Rotary members have helped build extensive polio infrastructure that has been used to respond to COVID-19 and, in 2014, the Ebola crisis, as well as to protect communities from yellow fever and bird flue.

The GPEI's challenge now is to eradicate wild poliovirus in the two countries where the disease has never been stopped: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Additionally, routine immunization in Africa must also be strengthened to keep the wild poliovirus from returning and to protect children against circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus, which is rare but continues to infect people in parts of the African region.
