#### WHY RLI?

#### (Rotary Leadership/ Learning Institute)

Though originally developed in 1992 as a leadership development program, Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) has become known as the best general training about Rotary for all Rotarians. In fact, many clubs use RLI as part of their on-boarding plan to help new members learn about Rotary more guickly. The resulting retention rates for RLI graduates (those who complete all 3 classes) is much higher than for non-graduates because RLI helps connect the dots between their passion and how Rotary helps fulfill that passion. For those in line to become Club president, if you haven't already graduated RLI, this certainly is a great way to refresh what you know about Rotary, learn things you didn't already know, as well as to gather ideas from peers.

#### HOW?

Adult-learning processes are used so it is comfortable for those who haven't been in a classroom in a while; topics are explored through use of discussion groups, problem solving workshops, sharing of experiences, and audiovisual presentations.

#### **Dear Rotarians and Rotaractors:**

2021 has been a great year for polio eradication. At this point, we can count the cases of wild polio virus this year on one hand. The global number of vaccinederived cases which are found in unvaccinated children is about 1/3rd of what we saw a year ago. It has been the unceasing focus of Rotarians around the world working with our partners to end polio once and for all and we have never been closer.

In November, I was able to spend a week in Pakistan meeting with Rotarians, government officials, our partners, and front-line workers. During the worst pandemic we have experienced, the mostly women who go door to door have donned their masks, provided Covid-19 guidance, and have provided two drops of the oral polio vaccine and measles and rubella vaccines to millions of children. Through their dedication, in one year we went from seeing 84 wild polio cases in 39 separate districts of Pakistan to one case in one district. It was wonderful to see and listen to these amazing women and to acknowledge their dedication to making their communities polio free.

The polio eradication effort is now focused on the two endemic countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan, and on 12 high-risk countries in Africa where we have seen outbreaks of the vaccine derived cases. 100% of your PolioPlus contributions are paying for vaccines, for stipends for local community members to deliver vaccines, for logistical support for immunization activities, for surveillance to ensure we find the virus before it spreads, and for encouraging parents to get their kids vaccinated. 400 million times a year we provide polio vaccines to children under five.
