15 were present for the August 20th Wellesley Rotary meeting including guest, Mary Beth Martello (Director of the Wellesley Climate Action Committee). President Nora Pou opened the meeting with a welcome and after the Pledge there were Happy Dollars from Bevilacqua, Hayden, Rowbotham, Spoto, Tighe, Westerman and Wilson. Prez Nora introduced our guest speaker, Andrew Willinger, a Newton Rotarian, who presented *"Climate Action Now*—films & tools to raise the priority of the Climate Crisis and inspire action" Dr. Willinger outlined the urgency "that if we don't do something soon...then there will be trouble." Rotary can help communicate the message to drive home the impact. D7910 is reaching out to its clubs to raise awareness and help. He showed visuals emphasizing causes (fires, floods, drought and hurricanes). He showed a chart showing the rise in average global temperatures (1850-2023). "We worry about the ....continued

extremes (rising ocean levels, deforestation, mass displacement of population and extinction and death of lifeforms)". He proposed some goals (reinforce the urgency; raise the priority, and provide the tools). He gave some examples (forest: *albedo* (reflection of the sun on the ice cap raising heat, and permafrost (release of methane). He showed a brief 4 minute video outlining the climate emergency, and how the weather pattern changes through large swings of the jet stream. It gets depressing but it's not too late to do something. Brookline Rotary initiated an event to create awareness. It was a beginning. We should ask ourselves, "What can I do to make a difference?" Here he opened the Rotary "toolkit" which included a QR code (to open the District website); a review of the MIT "En-Roads", a simulation tool that works out an environment scenario; a plan to work toward policy change including equity concerns; conducting a RCAN film event in Wellesley, and other ways. He commended Mary Beth for leading Wellesley in these efforts. No matter what, there are very complicated solutions but he encouraged participation by all. There was much discussion. Susan Bevilacqua gave an update on recruiting volunteers for her Club projects. Vin Spoto reported on getting help for serving meals at the Village Table and the NE Center for Homeless Vets. The remainder of the meeting was spent discussing fundraising (Patrick Hayden and Andrea Kaiser) and the need to get restaurant help for our upcoming "Dinner on Us" (Linda Tighe). There was also much discussion and enthusiasm for both.
