PROGRAM - JUNE 8, 1962. The speaker will be our own BILL SOULE. Presented under the auspices of the International Service Committee, Bill will discuss the American School System. As Superintendent of our own public schools, Bill is qualified to discuss with authority the accomplishments of American Education and the scope of the challenges for which it must prepare.

LAST WEEK - The Lewiston-Auburn club is to be congratulated upon the fine program presented at Portland Rotary last Friday. It was an outstanding meeting with Past District Governor Harry Rowe at the rostrum, assisted by Bill Flynn who presented the invocation and George Davis who led the singing with the able accompaniment of Bert Cote. Justice Donald W. Webber was the principal speaker. Justice Webber discussed the problem of race relations which he characterized as, "the greatest moral issue of our day." He spoke with rare feeling and conviction of his own observations and experiences in the South. Warning against over-simplification, he, nonetheless, urged the necessity of close personal friendship between individuals of both races in establishing communication between them. He spoke of the terrible waste of talent and leadership in the present discrimination against the negro and the unfortunate effect of that discrimination among the new emergent nations abroad. In moving terms, he spoke of what he called the major imperative - the god-given dignity of all men. The club's standing ovation at the conclusion of his talk was a deserved tribute to Justice Webber and to the Lewiston-Auburn Club.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - As Chairman of the Board of Trustees at the Maine Maritime Academy, RALPH LEAVITT lends a willing hand toward the rearing of young men. Judging by the midshipmen who visited us, a number of other dedicated men are helping too. Since the Academy's training ship, the SS State of Maine, had returned to Portland from her winter's cruise, Rear Admiral George A. King, Superintendent of the Academy, was present to answer the question, "Why druises?" Of course, they provide an opportunity for practical application of academic studies of seamanship, navigation and engineering, which is vital. Further, however, they, by design, expose the young men through social contacts to ways foreign to our own. Here they can observe and come to respect the customs, hopes and fears of others. According to reports from our American consuls, our midshipmen measure up well.

In turn, Lt. Howard Jordan, Public Relations Officer of the ship, Third Classman Lawrence Gaudreau, Jr., from Cape Elizabeth, First Classman Francis Bromley of South Portland, and Second Classman Thomas Brown from Stroudwater, shared experiences. These included sightseeing tours, invitations to homes for meals and dances, etc. at Hamilton, Bermuda; Bridgtown, Barbados; Salvadore Bahia and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; as well as at San Juan, Puerto Rico and Port Everglades, Florida. We gather that the age of the people met affected the rating given them by the midshipmen. When the ship crossed the equator, 26 "shellbacks" must have been busy indoctrinating three hundred "polliwogs". Their ship shared berths in port with other Maritime Academy ships from Brazil and Massachusetts.

Captain A. LAST WEEK'S MEETING - Dr. Peter Bowman, Director of the Pineland Hospital, spoke to the Club on Friday. It was Dr. Bowman's third visit to Portland Rotary in nine years - nine years which have seen

tremendous improvements in the Hospital's facilities. Dr. Bowman characterized his first talk to the Club in 1953 as "a list of grievances." On Friday, he expressed his profound thanks to all the citizens of Maine who have recognized and supported the Hospital's needs.

Since 1953, this continued support has made possible, an impressive number of improved services and facilities. A new school building adequately staffed is now in operation; a medical laboratory supervised by a full-time pathologist has been established. In 1955, a thirty-two bed hospital for infectious diseases was constructed which now serves as a facility for the treatment of cerebral palsy patients and for persons suffering from other kinds of brain damage. There are three physio-therapists assisting in this facility. In 1961, a psychiatric hospital for children was opened which will henceforth provide treatment for all mentally disturbed children in the state who otherwise would be assigned to adult wards at Bangor or Augusta.

In response to a question, Dr. Bowman indicated the hospital's most pressing needs at the present time are for a gymnasium and for operating room facilities.

Perhaps the soberest note struck by Dr. Bowman was his expressed concern with the mounting numbers of those who, affected by pre-natal accident or brain damage live out with the aid of modern medicine, a normal life span. To these must be added, as well, increasing numbers of persons incapacitated by terminal but extended illnesses. Society, he said, has no tradition, no past experience upon which a solution to this problem can be based. It is, he suggested, a problem which demands the attention of us all.

All members will agree that we are fortunate in having, in the service of the state, a professional man of Dr. Bowman's stature. Portland Rotary has learned to recognize his competence and to appreciate his compassion for the human beings in his charge.

IAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - One of the really vital talks concerning the art of living was given last Friday by Donelson F. Hoopes, Director of the Portland Museum of Art. Because what he said was so necessary to say and so well stated, a brief resume of his talk is in order.

A museum is not just a storehouse of expensive and unusual objects; it is a place for the enlargement of one's fund of knowledge and, perhaps more important than this, a place where certain fires of the imagination may be kindled. The primary purpose of any museum, and art museums in particular, is to increase in the individual the talent, interest and enthusiasm that is to one degree or another, within us all. By interest and enthusiasm is meant the potential that may be released at the sight of something meaningful for the creative impulse. We may never say arbitrarily what may or may not be useful or meaningful to those who use and enjoy what museums have to offer.

Who is ultimately responsible for the successor failure of the museum in the community? A useful museum is a living museum; a useless museum, a dead museum. The community itself is directly responsible for the kind of museum it maintains. A living museum makes an effective contribution to the larger life of the community and makes the community a better place in which to live. A good community museum should be such that people come easily and naturally to it and, once inside, gain knowledge, stimulus for culture, and educational growth. A living museum should be for the benefit of the whole community, and not the exclusive domain of a particular segment of the community.

There is a definite an urgent need for the business leaders of the community to be aware of the asset of a living museum and to share in the problems and responsibilities of maintaining it for greater good of all the inhabitants.

Our Rotary members, this Editor hastens to add, can rightfully point to the many fine and large contributions they make from time to time to improving the character and quality of this community. To ask them to take a positive interest in the Portland Museum of Art is but to ask them to extend their potential capabilities to improving the fine art of living.
