

PROGRAM - A film, "Science Rides the High Iron", will be shown by Joseph H. Cobb, Director of Public Relations for the Maine Central Railroad.

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LAST WEEK'S SPEAKER - Roger C. Gay, President of Nasson College, Springvale, Maine and member of the Sanford-Springvale Rotary Club spoke on "Small Colleges with Big Problems". Roger traced the history of Nasson from the time he assumed the presidency in 1950 with an enrollment of 86 girls to its present size of 440 with 60% male. The faculty has grown from 19 to 41 and the buildings from 7 to 22 and more coming. His statement that 8000 students in New England would be unable to go to college in this area this fall, 59,000 in 1967 and 95,000 in 1972 were sobering facts to those members with children. 1% of gross income would be needed to properly finance this educational acceleration. His sketches of the present campus were eye-openers and to Roger goes our best wishes for continued success.

PROGRAM: Paul Rieger, our capable program chairman, has hit the jackpot this week. Our speaker will be Dr. Richard Wright of Standish, Maine who will speak on the fascinating subject, "Medical Hypnosis" and give a demonstration.

LAST WEEK'S SPEAKER - Joseph H. Cobb, Director of Public Relations for the Maine Central Railroad gave us some little known facts about the transportation problems of the railroads today. Last year the Maine Central Railroad hauled 216,919 carloads of freight which would have formed a freight train stretching from Portland to Dallas, Texas using a total of only 2000 employees. 5 people on a train can do the work of 200 people in any other form of transportation. The film, "Science Rides the High Iron" showed new methods of laying track, new laboratory research, and new freight and passenger cars. The mountain scenery from a dome car was especially beautiful.
