ALL MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE: Printed herewith are the proper steps in the procedure of proposing and electing new members.

(Over)

- (1) A member submits the name of the prospect, and the classification to be filled, to the Board of Directors through the Secretary, from whom a proposal card may be obtained.
- (2) The Board of Directors refers the proposal to the Classification Committee for a report on the correctness and availability of the classification.
- (3) The Board then refers the proposal to the specially appointed Membership Committee for consideration and a report as to the eligibility of the prospect from the personal point of view. THIS IS AN IMPORTANT STEP!
- (4) The Board of Directors reviews the action of the Committee, and sustains or rejects their action.
- (5) Favorable action by the Committees having been sustained by the Board, the Secretary notifies the proposer.

The first five steps are preliminary. During this procedure, the prospect should NOT be notified.

- (6) The proposer, aided by the Information Committee, explains Rotary to the prospect and secures his signed application.
- (7) The Secretary notifies the members in writing (via "The Spindle") of the application.
- (8) Members may file written objections within ten days.
- (9) No objections having been filed, the applicant is considered elected. If objections are filed, the Board of Directors considers them and votes on the application.
- (10) The Secretary notifies the applicant and the proposer the results of Board action.
- (11) If elected, applicant pays admission fee and dues.
- (12) The Secretary issues membership card.
- (13) The new member is presented to the Club.
- (14) The Secretary sends a new member report card to the Secretariat of Rotary International.

Several of George's slides were taken in the beautiful White Mountain area. His facts and figures made us realize what a contribution the Pipe Line makes to the economy of Greater Portland, Each tanker leaves \$8,000 in this area or a yearly total of \$2,800,000. The Pipe Line has a payroll of over one-million dollars in Greater Portland. It pays a \$1,817,000 electric bill and a total in the several towns of \$349,000 in taxes. 285,000 barrels of oil a day can be pumped and it takes $2\frac{1}{2}$ days to make the trip. The Pipe Line saves each tanker a 2000 mile trip around Cape Breton and down the St. Lawrence River. George, who is Immediate Past President of the Portland Rotary Club, aided in the early formation of our Club and we hope to see him often at our future meetings.

It was a typically bleak Chicago night, when on February 23, 1905, Paul Harris, a lonely, young lawyer, not yet used to the casual and impersonal relationships found in a great city as compared with the friendliness and warmth of his Vermont background, met by appointment an engineer, a coal dealer, and a merchant tailor from Litchfield, Maine. Out of that small beginning has grown a movement now found in 124 lands and regions, with their over 11,000 clubs and some 513,500 members. They talked about an idea that Paul Harris had been thinking about for several years. The idea was that business relations should foster friendly relations. Since all agreed, they decided to form a club to put the idea into practice. They didn't decide, there and then, to call it a Rotary club, but that meeting that night was the first meeting of the world's first Rotary club.
