P R O G R A M - Rotary Information Program under the direction of William Kilroy, Rotary Information Committee Chairman. All members who have joined during the past year should make a special effort to attend.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Dr. Merle S. Bacastow, Director of Medical Education, at the Maine Medical Center, gave a most informative talk on the Educational Program now in progress at the local hospital. He said that there are 7000 hospitals in the United States of which 1500 are teaching hospitals, but of the 1,700,000 beds in the United States, 900,000 were in teaching hospitals. He defined the terms: intern, resident, fellow, attending staff, and medical student. There are now 12 interns at Maine Medical from 6 Medical Schools and 27 residents taking 7 programs. This should ultimately result in more resident physicians for Maine. He said these interns are as highly motivated as doctors ever were and are dedicated to a life of service. Maine Medical is conducting a real experiment in Medical Education.

NO MEETING on Wednesday, January 16, 1963

JOINT MEETING with Portland on Friday, January 18, 1963 at noon at the Lafayette.

PROGRAM - The "Faux-Pas" - A selected choral group from Westbrook Junior College under the direction of Richard Roberts, Faculty Director, will provide a musical program.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - James Farr of South Portland, Probation and Parole Officer for District 1, (Old Orchard to Freeport), gave a very informative talk on the supervision and rehabilitation program of the Department of Mental Health and Correction. He said there are 200 parolees and 1000 probationers in District 1 supervised by 8 officers. The average cost of keeping a person in confinement is \$1600. per year, therefore, this department, with 30 officers in 3 Districts, saves the State of Maine 4 million dollars per year. He said that 50% of the offenders go before court once and are rehabilitated, 25% are in institutions once or twice, and the remaining 25% are hardened criminals who take up to 40% of the departments time. 60% of the criminals are in the 17-26 age bracket and burglary is the majority offense. He stressed the importance of the Big Brother Program especially in broken homes where there is no father.
