OUR SINGING with Alex Cote at the piano and Mark Stimson leading was at its "Barber Shop" best.





The Foundation is a scholarship fund giving men and women of all races and creeds an opportunity to study and live in a country other than their own. Since this program was started in 1949, Fellcwships have been awarded to 1595 young men and women from 75 countries. As of March 27, 1962, \$8,424,594 has been contributed to the Rotary Foundation and more than \$4,000,000 has been expended in awards since 1947. For the academic year of 1962-63, 141 Fellowships have been awarded, 94 of which went to men and 47 to women representing 34 countries. In order that our club may show a 100% participation at the Bretton Woods Conference, all members of South Portland Rotary are urged to subscribe to the "10 and 1 plan" immediately, that is \$10. (paid only once) for every new member and \$1. per member each year thereafter. Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary, had a great interest in the Foundation. He looked upon it as an agency for the effective promotion of the fourth avenue of Rotary Service: "The advancement of international understanding, good will, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men united in the ideal of service."
