The road, which critics said could never be built, at one point crosses an 11,000 foot mountain where motorists can see both the Atlantic and the Pacific Ocean. PROGRAM - Roger N. Woodcock, Publicity Representative of Recreational Promotion, Department of Economic Development, Augusta, will show a film, "Skiing through Maine". Members who saw this movie recently at the Portland Rotary Club report that you shouldn't miss this one.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Captain Llewellyn McGouldrick spoke on "Operations of the South Portland Fire Department". He reported that the department had recently been increased to 35 permanent men with 150 call men. He outlined their "other than fire-fighting duties" such as checking the 300 hydrants and keeping them shoveled out. He reviewed the Survey which puts South Portland in a B3 classification and spoke on each of the following parts of the Survey. (1. Fire Dept., 2. Fire Alarm, 3. Water, 4. Building Code, 5. Fire Prevention, 6. Police, 7. Climatic Conditions, 8. Structural Conditions, 9. Divergence of Classes). He stated that to put South Portland in a higher bracket would cost the taxpayers considerably more money. He also emphasized that the department needs the public behind them for shorter hours and increased pay.

PROGRAM - Earl Hutchinson, Principal of the Maine Vocational and Technical Institute, will speak on the aims and adversities of the Institute as well as its place in the South Portland community.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Richard Lovejoy, Maine Bonding and Casualty, spoke on water and boat safety with his topic, "Can We Learn From Experience." He said that the cowboy on the highway is the cowboy on the waterway and that more people were killed in New York on one holiday on the waterways than on the highways. He outlined the six steps needed to insure safety on our inland waters. 1. Adoption of sound laws. 2. Enforcement of these laws. 3. Initiative in furtherance of boating program. 4. Course in Health and Boat safety. 5. Enactment of new laws. 6. Publications of Publicity Bureau should contain boating regulations. He said that Maine stresses its numbering system but not safety (such as life preservers.) With only two arrests last year, he saw little enforcement of a program until more wardens are provided.

Mr. Hutchinson stressed the need for more legislative financial assistance in order to purchase new machinery and replace worn out machinery. He invited the club to visit the school at any time.
