PROGRAM - Eugene S. Martin of Cape Elizabeth will speak on "Area Development". Eugene was Vice President of The Portland Rotary Club last year and was instrumental in the formation of our Club.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Earl Angell, who has been appointed by the City Council as South Portland's first historian, gave a most interesting and educational illustrated lecture on the "Early History of South Portland." Earle showed many slides, some of which depicted South Portland's first school, church, ferry, and grist mill. His splendid fact filled talk showed the amount of research that he has put into this project which can be of immense educational value to our school children.

PREVIOUS WEEK'S PROGRAM - A. Edward Langlois, General Manager of the Maine Port Authority, gave a vigorous and challenging talk on "The Functions and Future of the Maine Port Authority. The MPA was founded in 1918 when the Maine State Pier was built. Its four principal functions are (1) Operating the Maine State Pier. (2) Responsibility for ferryboat operation throughout Maine, (3) Maintenance of the Casco Bay Line piers and (4) Promotion and solicitation program for Maine ports at a cost of \$36,000 per year. Ed enlarged on the taking over operation of the grain elevator, erecting a building for all Greater Portland Federal Agencies, erecting an adequate covered shed area, adequate Casco Bay Line facilities, and new docking facilities for the large tankers that are unable to go through the present bridge. He stressed the advantages to be gained from a World Trade Mart building where all products made in the State of Maine could be displayed.

- 7:00 P. M. Dinner (\$3.00 per person) to be followed by an address by our District Governor. Governor Malcom P. Noyes, better known as "Mack" is Governor of District 779 for the year 1962-63. He is a member of the Ellsworth, Maine Rotary Club, and his home town is Franklin, Maine. "Mack" has served in the State Legislature, on the local board of selectmen, on the school committee, and is a 100% Charter member of the Ellsworth club. He is also Past President of the club, is active in Little League, church and Y.M.C.A. work. He is a tireless worker and a dedicated Rotarian.
