Goodwill Workshops are found in 17 countries and in 127 cities in the United States. The Workshop in Portland is the only one in this state and has been in operation here for thirty years. Their first objective has been the collection of clothing, furniture and appliances to provide work for the handicapped by refinishing these items for resale. There are forty types of jobs that can be learned in this occupation. They next hope to expand their efforts in the rehabilitation of handicapped persons. The Junior League of Portland is giving their support to this agency and they are fortunate to have this energetic group behind them. They have just recently purchased the former Geo. C. Frye building and are in the process of relocating.

Co. spoke on the satellite space communications program and showed a film on the launching of the satellite Telstar. The Satellite weighs 34 pounds and is 34 inches in diameter but contains 10,000 working parts. The communications in space program started in 1953 with Echo I which was a hollow ballon. Echo I proved that a space satellite would be practical and was the forerunner of Telstar I. Telstar II is now in orbit and is circling the world 6 times a day, at a distance of 600 to 900 miles from the earth. The installation at Andover can be visited from 9:00 to 5:00 o'clock every day until November 15th and on weekends after that date.
