THE ROTARIAN - JANUARY - DOWNTOWN vs. SHOPPING CENTER. In 1950 there were fewer than 100 shopping centers in the U. S. Today they total around 7,500 with estimated annual sales of 50 billion dollars - about one of every four dollars spent in retail trade, excluding automobiles.

"We do not believe these new centers create new business," says one S. S. Kresge executive. "They take it away from somewhere -- usually downtown." But now downtown merchants are adopting suburban shopping center techniques to lure customers back to the city, says author Tom Mahoney, in "Shopping Centers--The Big Success Story." WANT TO BUY A ROBOT? PROGRAM - In observance of Rotary's 59th Anniversary, Rod Littlefield of the Portland Rotary Club will speak to us on the 54th Annual International Convention which was held last year in St. Louis. Rod served as Portland's delegate to the Convention.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Don Nielson of the Internal Revenue Service, Audit Division gave a well prepared and most interesting talk on I.R.S., the duties of each of its divisions (administrative, collection, intelligence and audit) and the numerous services offered to taxpayers. Last year in the Portland office, during the 3½ months preceding the April 15th deadline, they handled over 12,000 telephone calls and about 10,000 taxpayers that came to their office seeking help. In the ten offices located in Maine the I.R.S. employs 210. He pointed out that on the average it costs 40¢ per \$100.00 to collect the taxes. (In 1963, I.R.S. collected 105.9 billion dollars.) He also briefly discussed the new tax cut which is expected to be in effect about the first week in March.

ROTARY'S ANNIVERSARY - In 1905 in Chicago, Paul Harris and some of his friends got together to form the first Rotary Club, a club dedicated to "The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service.
