- LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM Karl D. Emerson, President of the Portland Pipe Line Corporation brought us up-to-date on the expansion that is currently being undergone by that Company. A 24 inch line is being laid beside the existing lines; a 12 inch line laid in 1941, and an 18 inch line laid in 1950. Of course the deepening of Portland Harbor, also currently underway, will allow tankers of up to 900 feet in length and 43 feet drafts to dock at the Company's Pier #2. Some other interesting facts brought to light include: \$163,900 in property taxes to South Portland, a payroll of \$1,318,300 and a total expenditure in Maine alone last year of \$2,641,300. The Area is certainly very pleased that business is good at the Pipe Line, and wish them continued successes. And we are very appreciative that Mr. Emerson took the time to address us. We hope that he can visit with us again some time soon.

 unhappy, because when you do find one it has a 99.99% chance of being a carrier of
