I will, however, only state that it was evident that those present were impressed by Mr. Youngs and his two little assistants, Sally and Claude.

--- MORE FROM FRANK LEE ---

My car is supposed to arrive this week so will have more to write about when we have a chance to travel more often. The school here is very modern, physically that is, but behind in many ways. For one thing there are no textbooks for ANY classes. We have to write all of our own and duplicate them for the students.

The students are the same as any other country's. Take every opportunity to raise cane. They are however very eager to learn and very hard workers. They range in age from 12 to 20 years. Only grades 7 to 9 are operating now, grade 10 will start in January and 11 one year later.

The country is very underdeveloped and poverty is everywhere. However the people are very humble and friendly. We really see many contrasts here. Beautiful modern buildings rising out of filth and rubble. Two classes of people exist, the have and the have nots. It will take many years and large sums of money to come anywhere near U. S. Standards.

Disease is everywhere. Doctors are like diamonds, few and far between and just as expensive. There are quite a few hospitals but overcrowded and under-equipped. I'm speaking now of health for the average Nigerian. Of course we have medical facilities for the Americans here, provided by USAID.

Here is something that will interest you. Saturday my family and another family went to the beach. The beach is located at Badagri (60 miles). After crossing a small lagoon, in a dugout canoe, and walking about $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile across Topo Island, we were in 7th heaven. There on both your left and right looking out to sea was hundreds of miles of the most beautiful white sandy beach. Swaying cocoanut palms and beautiful surf. Best of all, there was not one person in sight anywhere, except for a very very few native fishermen. Not even a Howard Johnsons. Not much like the Maine Coast. It will be even better around Xmas because we are now just going into the dry season (summer) here and we probably will be going there Xmas day. Remember us when you are shoveling the snow from the walks, we'll be swimming and sweating here in Nigeria.

He said the new demerit system was more fair to the driver than the point system it replaced, because of the provision for review. He noted that the former system in some cases stressed in the driver's mind the points against him rather than the seriousness of the offense itself.

ROTARY INFORMATION - "Pope Paul and Rotary" ... from a UP story recently published in the Boston Sunday Herald - Vatican City - Pope Paul praised the American-founded Rotary International for it's "generous dedication to the services of the common good." It was the Roman Catholic Church's first open praise of the Society. The Pope's remarks came at a special audience at the Vatican for various groups, including 1,500 Italian Rotarians. The Pontiff mentioned that in the past the church had reservations about the Rotarians because it cut religious boundaries and seemed open to influence by ideologies harmful to Catholicism. "Your Society seems to wisely recognise its various limits and respect the beliefs of its members," the Pope declared. He said, "that the organization does not close itself to the Christian message. The Society is helpful in its generous dedication to the common good," the Pope said. The Pope also said "that Rotary International could contribute to world solidarity and peace."
