LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Because of the storm Wednesday, there was a rather small attendance. One of the members absent was your editor and we are indebted to Secretary Ron for furnishing the following account of that meeting.

The guest speaker for the evening was Raymond A. Hearn, Assistant Superintendent of Opportunity Farm, New Gloucester, who gave a very vivid and personalized picture of the community of which the farm is apparently so large a part. Opportunity Farm has a consistent population of 42 boys whose ages range from 8 to 18. These boys are mostly orphans or come from broken homes. Occasionally a boy will come to the farm through the recommendation of some of the State workers, however, this is the exception rather than the rule. Opportunity Farm receives no Federal aid, nor State aid; it is self-supporting and supplies its own milk, beef, pork, eggs and vegetables. What more does a community need in the way of food! It almost seemed that we must be listening to something from another era. These boys appear to have so much more of the important things of life; companionship, trust, faith (of the interdenominational kind), and a common desire to make theirs a worthwhile life. Hearing the story of their farm makes one wish he could share such an experience, if only for a few months or weeks.

Ray invited us to visit the Farm at any time. This writer cannot help but feel that it would do us all more than a little good to spend a day, individually or as a group, at this fine institution. The story that Ray told cannot help but make one proud to live in Maine, where a 55 year old Opportunity for Maine boys exists.

Mr. Pratt is now retired and lives in Portland. He formerly lived here and had homes on Summer Street and Harriet Street in South Portland.

Mr. Pratt gave us an exceptionally fine talk on Rotary, tracing its growth from a small office at 127 Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois, where Paul P. Harris and three friends held what turned out to be the first meeting. It was called Rotary because the members took turns having the meetings in their respective offices. Business and professional men were invited to join in these meetings and from the beginning they were careful to include only one member from each business or profession. That was the origin of the present classification system in use in all Rotary Districts. Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary, died in 1947 at the age of 49 years.

After the Chicago club was formed, other clubs were organized throughout the country. San Francisco had the second club and, as clubs became more numerous throughout the nation, the entire group was known as Rotary National. Later, when clubs began to be formed in foreign countries, it became known as Rotary International.

Mr. Bennett, a native of South Portland, attended Cheverus High School and Holy Cross College. He was a navigator in World War II.

Mr. Bennett gave impressive details of the present problem of the S. D. Warren Company, a very old and highly respected manufacturing company, whose product, as we all know, is paper. What we didn't know is that S. D. Warren paper is of a very special kind, some grades of which will last 300 years. Water is the most important item in the manufacture of paper for the S. D. Warren Company. The problem is to have an enormous supply of water - clean water. Water has to be cleaned, and over \$150,000 was spent for what Mr. Bennett describes as the small cleaning tank which was built recently. We won't try to get into some of the rather technical aspects of paper making, but we are sure that everyone was genuinely glad to know even a little about a mill that has played such a big part in the industrial life of our neighboring city of Westbrook.

NEXT WEEK'S PROGRAM - The speaker for next week's program will be Mr. Harold F. Schnurle, Vice President and Manager of Public and Employee Relations of the Central Maine Power Company. Mr. Schnurle is from Augusta, and will speak on the Dickey Dam and Lincoln School Federal Power Dam proposal. Mr. Schnurle has been with the Central Maine Power Company for thirty years, is a former State Senator and served two terms on the Governor's Council.

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Guest speaker last week was Mr. Norman J. Temple, Assistant Manager of Public and Employee Relations of the Central Maine Power Company. Mr. Temple spoke in place of Mr. Harold F. Schnurle, who was unable to be with us. Mr. Schnurle was supposed to speak on the Dickey Dam-Lincoln School Federal Power Dam proposal, however, Mr. Temple confined his remarks to defending his firm's rate against those who believe that C.M.P. Company and other Maine power companies' rates are the highest in the nation. "This just isn't so", Mr. Temple stated. He explained that C.M.P.'s average rate for all types of usage is lower than those of 14 states and lower than the average of all other New England states.

Mr. Temple explained that the predominating factors which affect the utility rates are fuel costs, low population density and local taxes.

Reference to C.M.P. Co.'s tie-in with the "Big Power Loop" brought several rather cryptic questions regarding the recent big blackout which most of us remember was attributed to the big power loops.
