May 4, 1966

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - We hope that you did not miss that very fine program! Our guest speaker was Mr. James Handley, Special Agent in Charge of the F.B.I., Boston office. Mr. Handley gave a most dynamic discussion of the duties and the responsibilities of the F.B.I. He began with a clarification of the Bureau's activities, explaining that the F.B.I. is strictly an "Investigative" not a "Protective" organization. The Bureau is not responsible for local law violations, unless of an interstate nature. He gave as an example, the "Red Cross Act" which makes it a federal violation for unauthorized persons or groups to use the Red Cross insignia. He became increasingly serious and intense when citing facts regarding the apathy of the general public in cases of assault and murder, some of which were committed in full view of as many as 30 to 40 citizens, without even one of them picking up a phone to alert authorities. He stated that there were 57 police officers murdered last year with one out of every 10 police officers assaulted. Mr. Handley cited one case of a young man arrested, and, instead of the usual sentimental tattoo of his girl's or mother's name, was found to have tattooed across his entire torso, the words "born to hate cops".

We were indeed fortunate to have a speaker so close to his subject every day and one with the great ability to keep his audience so spell-bound.
