A native of Maine, he has spent the last two years as Civic Activities Advisor to the Sector Commander of Delta Area in South Viet Nam. He has been advisor on government, health and welfare problems. This firsthand account should be very interesting.

The Portland Examining Station processes recruits for all branches of the Armed Forces. One of the interesting facts brought out was the high percentage of rejections, for either physical or mental reasons. The State of Maine, with 58% rejections, ranks 20th, there being 19 other states with higher percentages.
