


ATTENDANCE - Another 100% meeting, two in a row, but don't become complacent, because our margin over Shawinigan Falls is too slight to relax those make-ups.

PROGRAM - "APATHY OR ACTION", a slide presentation by the Legislative Affairs Committee of the Greate Portland Chamber of Commerce. The presentation outlines the outstanding job which organized labor is doing in presenting their policies and platforms to both National and State Legislatures. This presentation urges that business and professional men do likewise.

> The speaker who will provide the commentary on the slides as they are presented is Mr. Eugene W. Wilkin, the Executive Director of the Guy Gannet Broadcasting Services. He is Chairman of the Legislative Affairs Committee of the Greater Portland Chamber of Commerce and is responsible for such programs as the "Meet the Candidates Breakfasts" and this presentation -- "Apathy or Action".

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM - Mr. Edward C. Hinckley, Commissioner of Indian Affairs Department for the State of Maine presented a talk on some of the problems facing our present day Indians. We have about 1200 Indians on Reservations and about 800 off Reservations, in the State. Maine is the only State in the Union to have its own Department of Indian Affairs, all other states being administered by the Federal Government.

> The most pressing needs of the Indians today is Schooling, Housing and Sanitation. Scholarships to the five State Vocational and Nursing Schools are now available and progress is being made in other areas. It is hoped to increase interest in native handicrafts and that Maine Indians will soon be a source of pride to the State.

Another letter has been received from David Aikman, reporting on his films and other experiences upon arriving home.




- PROGRAM This is one meeting you will not want to miss. Art Keniston is chairman of this week's program and while we are unable to disclose the details we know it will be a dandy.

THE SPIRIT OF ROTARY


