

- THIS WEEK This should be something special. Frank W. Lee, who has spent the past two years teaching and adventuring in West Nigeria, Africa, will tell us of some of his experiences. Frank is a former member of this Club, and those who remember him I'm sure will agree that his wit should make this a most unforgettable meeting. Let's have a large attendance to welcome Frank home.
- LAST WEEK Donald DeMuth, who works for the County in the field of mental health gave us an awful lot to think about, in a most earnest and forthright presentation. Beginning by defining illness as a malfunction of many parts of a person, he next stressed that emotions can affect the anatomy, finally producing actual physical changes in the anatomy. Mr. DeMuth pointed out that 12 Billion a year is spent on the research of "Things", while only 150 Million goes towards the research of the person himself.

He sees two of the reasons for the magnitude of the mental health problem as being: The high cost of adequate treatment and the critical shortage of trained people. He fears that change will come only when enough people become sufficiently concerned, concerned enough to make mental health the BIG BUSINESS that it should be. This was a most powerful talk, and was followed by some most powerful questions. I'm certainly glad that I heard it.





- THIS WEEK First Classification Talk of the Rotary year will be our treat Wednesday. Ed Inness - Photography developing and printing, will explain to us what he does in that room out back at Inness Photo Service. These have consistently been our finest programs, and I'm sure that Vice President Ed's talk will be no exception, but exceptional.
- LAST WEEK Donald Lowry, President of the Portland Regional Opportunity Program (PROP) described the work done by this division of the Office of Economic Opportunity. The guiding principle of this organization is the attack the <u>PRoblems Of Poverty</u> in much of Cumberland County. Included in the program are three primary groups: Project Head Start, The Neighborhood Youth Corps, and Neighborhood & Rural Centers Component. They are also looking into the possibility of organizing an on the job training program. As opposed to merely handing out money, the attempt is being made to break the Cycles of Poverty in this area by striking at the roots of poverty.


Since its conception in 1965, the total cost of all programs has been \$802,682, of which \$671,566 has been furnished by the Federal Government. A breakborn of expenses shows \$75,000 in salaries for Administrators, \$216,500 in non-Administrative salaries to those performing services to the poor, and \$251,000 in salaries to the poor themselves. PROP is overseen by a 30 man Board of Directors, of which 1/3 come from the poor of the Community.

This talk certainly shed light on the program to the editor, and I imagine most of those in attendance. Mr. Lowry's presentation was followed by a spirited question and answer period. We thank Mr. Lowry for taking time to visit with us, and for his fine presentation.


- THIS WEEK Jack Geary of Cole's Express will make a slide presentation of "The History of Trucking in Maine" commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the trucking industry which is being celebrated this year. Two young musician singers will assist Jack and will entertain us during our dinner hour. This will be a little change from our usual program and should prove to be very interesting.
- LAST WEEK We were extremely fortunate last week to have Ralph Leavitt give a presentation of a film entitled "Bridging the Seas." Ralph is an active member of the Propeller Club and his running commentary of the film made it one of the most enjoyable and instructive programs of the year. He explained that the reason for keeping the Propeller Club alive was due to its keeping freight rates lower. By keeping ships in all places at all times it saves us at least a billion dollars a month. Ralph told us that we now have more than 900 ships in our merchant marine. We did have five or six thousand shortly after World War Two. The smaller number of ships now carry a very large amount of cargo because of the method of packing it. We now use containers, each of which contains 46,000 lbs of cargo which previously was shipped loose and it consumed a great deal of time loading and unloading, while it can now be handled in containers in a much shorter time.

Not only was the film very interesting, it was also very beautiful.

Secretary Ron Tripp introduced our thirteen visiting Rotarians and one guest.


President Keith announced that our meeting next week will be at 6:15 at Howard Johnsons. We will order from the menu and after dinner we go into the motel for our meeting.


