June 6 - Al Ellsworth gave a most informative program on Junior Achievement. Al is a resident of Kennebunk and a graduate of Hartford University and the University of Indiana. Al has been with Junior Achievement of Southwestern Maine for the past three years.

Al presented a series of slides entitled "Junior Achievement - What's It All About?" The series was developed here in Portland and was well promoted. A discussion followed the slides.

### WHAT IS JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT?

It is an international business education program in which high school students organize and manage their own small-scale companies under the guidance of adult advisers from business and industry.

Junior Achievement of Southwestern Maine had 21 separate companies in 1973. Of the 21 companies, 14 showed a profit before taxes of \$870.57. The total program has a membership of 350 students. Company Honors in 1973 went to Visicom, producers of the local T.V. show "Up In The Attic". The program is aired Sundays from 12:30 to 1:00 on WGAN. Individual Honor went to:

This week's meeting - June 6, 1973

Meeting of May 30, 1973 had excellent attendance of 37 members and 14 visitors who were introduced by Vice President Sam. Undoubtedly the large attendance was due to the many people wishing to hear Duke Blewett's talk on R. I.

President Harold again asked for anyone knowing where the club banner is to please let him know.

This week's extra money raising program was a raffle by the White Horse Rotary Club of the Yukon Territory. President Harold offered tickets for sale.

The final results of the Guy Lombardo dance show a profit in excess of \$3,000.

V. P. Sam read several letters from the guests at the Rotary dance expressing appreciation for an excellent evening.

Dan Mooers reminded the club that the district conference will be held June 21, 22, 23. This is the last opportunity to make reservations.

It was not necessary to introduce our speaker, Dr. Edward Blewett so Dan merely told us that Duke Blewett would talk about his visit to the International Conference in Switzerland. Our speaker, as always, gave an excellent presentation, to which it was a pleasure to listen. He went to the conference to attend a reunion of District Governors from '51-'53. Also he wanted to see how the International Conference operated.

His reactions were mixed with good and bad effects. First it was overcrowded with 16,957 paid attendance plus 230 guests under 16. Housing had to be arranged as much as 50 miles away with daily commuting by steamship or railroad.

Disorganization or poor preplanning resulted in registrants having to stand in line for 2 hours and then some had to return to the end of the line if they did not have the correct preregistration form and the right kind of money (Swiss francs). This started the program giving people a poor attitude.

The meeting itself was too large and became impersonal. The talks were heard over simultaneously translation systems in English, French, German, Spanish and Japanese. The Japanese were the second largest delegation at the conference. Unfortunately many of the sound systems did not work for the Japanese translation.

Duke believes that international conferences should be held only every 3 or 5 years and should be attended by representatives of zones in order to reduce the size and the confusion.

However, he found much to be pleased with at the conference also. His reunion of 20 year veteran governors was the oldest group present.

He was impressed by the attitude and enthusiasm of the retiring and incoming presidents and the president elect.

William Carter president '73-'74, he reported to be a sincere eloquent speaker who will emphasize the importance of the individual in Rotary.

William Robbins president elect for '74-'75, he found to be equally impressive and expected to be a great leader for the future.

The South Portland-Cape Elizabeth Club was indeed fortunate to hear such a fine report on this meeting.

Frank Lyman - Classification Talk: "Transportation For A Growing America."

All our facilities that we have today are taken for granted such as water, gas, food, clothes and are dependent to a large extent on the trucking industry.

The United States has the most successful economy. As the transportation industry increases and continues to expand it is expected the economy will also grow. 90% of a person's household goods were involved at some time with America's transportation industry. One of five jobs in America is associated with or part of this industry. This amounts nation-wide to about 13,000,000 jobs.

The Trucking Industry pays 40% of taxes.

Trucking Industry is constantly researching means to curb further pollution from motor vehicles. With the development and improvement in safety standards truckers feel they have saved numerous lives. Frank said the trucking industry will continue to grow and flourish as their industry is of benefit to the United States. They pay their own way and cover their own expenses without subsidy, which indicates they cost the public little.

- MAY 9, 1973 Frank Lyman one of our older members will give a classification talk. As you know Frank has been in the trucking business for many years. His topic will be "Transportation For A Growing America." This is a most timely subject and should prove most interesting.
- MAY 2, 1973 Dan Mooers, as Chairman, introduced his panel for Law Day Program. All three panelists gave a short talk in their particular specialty as follows:

Dean Edward Godfrey: It appears in recent years every student has shown a desire to go to law school. University of Maine School of Law received 1320 applications and can only take 80. Many qualified people are unfortunately unable to enter law school except for some minority groups, who because of a deprived background, are accepted for law school. Some work out well - some do not. In ten years projection it is figured there will be 29,000 lawyers for about 14,000 jobs.

Arthur Peabody: Discussed mechanics of his specialty, which is Probate Court. Probate work takes time and fees are very high. In order to alleviate this somewhat Mr. Peabody was of the opinion that some of the mundane routine work could be done by Para-Professionals. Maine Probate law is somewhat cumbersome and Mr. Peabody felt that some of the paper work could be streamlined.

Dan Lilly: Criminal Work is Mr. Lilly's specialty. He directed his address of drugs and specifically possession of and smoking of marijuana, plus being knowingly present where marijuana is being used. Mr. Lilly indicates we have to be realistic and think of a time in the future when major legal changes will have to be made concerning use of and purchase of said drug. Many intelligent young people have had marijuana convictions on their record and this has handicapped them in many ways. Many experts have contended that one marijuana cigarette is no more harmful than a glass of beer. Mr. Lilly did state that as long as there are laws against this drug they will have to be enforced.

Wednesday, April, 25, 1973 -

Club was fortunate to have two speakers discussing special treatment of Kidney Patients. Ken Cadigan, a kidney patient himself and now assisting the Kidney Foundation indicated that if it were not for the modern treatment of kidney ailments he would not be doing as well as he is. He said 14 persons were presently awaiting kidneys.

Dr. Donald Marshall also gave a short history of the work that has been done regarding treatment of kidney disease. Dr. Marshall stated the idea of possible kidney transplants started around 1900 with research by Ulmond Jenner. Work began in the United States when Dr. Correll came here in 1904. The first kidney transplant was done in Boston in 1953. The artificial kidney machine was developed in Holland by Wilhelm Bolloff during World War II.

A patient who is severely ill would have to use the machine three times a week in six hour sessions. If this treatment is available these people can function normally. Following Dr. Marshall's lecture, slides were shown of the facility at Maine Medical Center.

This Week's Meeting - April 25, 1973

LAST WEEK - April 18 - Mr. Courtney Kronk of VOICE (Volunteer Oil Industry Communications Effort) and Gulf Oil Co. U.S. with his assistant Mr. Larry St. Pierre, was our guest speaker last week. His 16 years with Gulf and prior to that with American Oil gives him much experience for his talk "Petroleum and the Environment".

......Mr. Kronk gave a slide presentation concerning the petroleum industry in general beginning with the early history of oil exploration and drilling, explaining the advancements that have been made through today's technology. The main social problem in the petroleum industry is the pollution from three major sources: automobiles, refineries, and fuel oil sulfur. Mr. Kronk explained that the oil industry is concerned with petroleum pollution and is taking steps to abate it.

The auto industry now has better emission control to the extent that now emissions from automobiles are down from the 1963 levels even though there are many more automobiles on the roads.

Improved refinery emission control has come in the form of new complete primary purifying systems and special burners that are added to refineries for the sole purpose of preventing contaminants from entering the water and air.

Reduced fuel oil sulfur requirements have already significantly reduced sulfur dioxide and sulfur trioxide concentrations in the air surrounding large industrial cities. For Maine, the Environmental Improvement Commission (EIC) has enacted rules and regulations pertaining to the sulfur content of fuel oil that will become effective November 1, 1973.

In the area of water pollution control, the industry has invented new safety devices for their off shore wells and claim no permanent ecological damage from any of their 16,000 marine wells.

With 77% of the energy used today deriving from oil and 318 million gallons a day going through our own Portland Pipe Line, oil is still an important commodity.


### Dear Fellow Rotarians:

The Board of Directors and Officers met with interested club members following last Wednesday's meeting to discuss the recent board action relating to quarterly prepayment of meals. The meeting was, in the opinion of board members, very beneficial, and helped to clear the air. Quite frankly, the board was surprised at the extent of opposition by some members and at some of the reasons given for the opposition.

As was pointed out, the prepayment of meals was first discussed at the Club Assembly last year when it was suggested by District Governor Cote as not only a partial solution to the internal budget problem, but also as an incentive for better attendance at our meeting. His suggestion was discussed at various times amongst board members and officers during the year and began receiving serious consideration three weeks ago. At the board meeting on March 21, before final action was taken, the proposal was debated for over two hours. The pros and cons were fully discussed, including all of the points raised by club members at last week's meeting.

It is rather obvious that the central difficulty is attendance at our club's meeting. We are required to guarantee Purpooduck Club thirty-five meals each week, and to pay \$500 per year rent. The cost of each meal is \$2.75, with the extra 25 cents going towards the rent. On several occasions, we have failed to meet the guarantee, and because of attendance, the extra twenty-five cents per meal has not contributed sufficient revenue to cover the rent. While our overall attendance has been consistently good (approximately 80-85%), attendance at our club's meetings by our club's members has not (approximately 45-55%)..

Rotary International encourages members to attend the meetings of their own clubs. The make-up rules are designed to allow members the opportunity to "make-up" when it is inconvenient to make the regular meeting. Such make-ups, however, should not be treated as a substitute for attendance at our meetings whenever possible. By the same token, while the rules "require" only 60% attendance, the objective is always 100%. Major emphasis, at all levels of Rotary, is placed on perfect attendance, and in many instances (perhaps without full justification), the "success" of a club is measured by that standard.



The dilemma facing the Board of Directors, therefore, was the development of some fair method within the objectives of Rotary, to assure sufficient revenue to meet the internal cost of club operation. One means that received serious consideration was an increase in the cost of the meals. The board rejected this for several reasons. Besides already having about the highest meal cost in the area, it would have also asked those members who attend our meetings regularly to bear the full burden of the needed revenue. In all candor, the board felt that it was only equitable for the members not attending to also bear their fair share of the expense of operating the club.

By no means, however, was the quarterly prepayment of meals viewed as a "penalty" for non-attendance. Rather, the board sincerely hoped that it would encourage members to attend our meetings, or to make-up so that credit would be received on the next quarter billing. It was also viewed as a means for reducing the amount of cash handled at the meetings, of easing the bookkeeping, and of increasing the efficiency of internal budget planning.

Certainly the board does not want to initiate any action that will be divisive, or that will create a hardship on any member. Because of the degree of opposition by those attending last week, the board has reconsidered its March 21 vote. It continues to feel that quarterly prepayment of meals, with credit given for all made-up meetings, will be beneficial. Naturally, since it has not been given an opportunity to be tried, the exact effect, particularly on club attendance, cannot be ascertained. Unless tried, however, its effect will never be known.

Therefore, the board has reaffirmed its action to the extent of establishing a system for the quarterly prepayment of meals by the membership. The board has, however, voted to make the system voluntary.

While all members will be billed \$39 per quarter beginning April 1, members who do not elect to pay larterly may continue to pay \$3 each week they attend club meeting. Members so paying will not be expected to pay in the event of a massed meeting. Members electing to pay quarterly in advance will be credited for any made-up meetings and for excused absences, as was provided in the original board vote.

Unless there is a sufficient number of members who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity to pay in advance, there will be no reason for continuing the system beyond this quarter. However, the Board of Directors felt, and continues to feel, that it is a good system which, if given the opportunity, will prove itself beneficial. The board strongly encourages members to pay the \$39 before the 10th of April, and asks for the cooperation of the membership in initiating the prepayment system on a trial basis. Irrespective of individual feelings unrelated to the merits of the system, the proposal does deserve a fair trial period, and the board asks only that it receive one.



During the discussion last week, it was also pointed out that the prepayment of meals would not in-and-of-itself relieve the pressure on the internal budget. It is apparent that other action will be necessary so that succeeding secretaries and Boards of Directors will not be continually facing this problem. Therefore the present board has initiated a dues increase that will take effect at the beginning of the next club year. The increase will be \$10 from \$40 to \$50. Inasmuch as there has been no increase for over five years, this is a small raise when compared to other clubs in the district.

Finally, the board encourages the membership to more actively seek out and propose new members. While the procedure will be discussed at the upcoming Information Night, any member who now has someone in mind should see Ray Frost at Wednesday's meeting. Ray will provide you with the necessary sponsorship card and information. We will continue to be a strong, active club only if we are constantly alert to gaining new members who want to constructively contribute to our communities.

It is expected that differences over internal affairs of our club will occasionally develope, and that is only natural. The board does attempt, however, to operate within the confines of the rules of Rotary International, and it takes full responsibility for its decision. In reflecting on this most recent decision, individual members of the board are reminded of the words of Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary, as he describes in this book, My Road to Rotary, the first two years following the founding of the Chicago Club:

"I took no office of any character during the first two years of the Chicago Club, but I nominated the officers and my judgment was generally followed in the administration of the Club. As I look back at it now, I must have seemed very dictatorial at times. If so, it was because of my devotion to the undertaking."

It is the "devotion to the undertaking" that makes us Rotarians, and despite our occasional differences, each member of the club, we are sure, will continue to work for the objectives of Rotary.

### LAST WEEK'S MEETING - MARCH 14, 1973

While J. B. Maxwell was absent due to illness, Dan Mooers introduced Angus Ferguson, Executive Director of the Maine Civil Liberties Union. Mr. Ferguson spoke on "Children's Rights - Corporal Punishment in Maine Schools."

The MCLU, an affiliate of the American Civil Liberties Union, has taken the stance that corporal punishment should be outlawed and is not only a manifest denial of civil liberties, that can actually injure a student physically and mentally, but "serves no vital purpose consistent with educational or even disciplinal purposes which cannot be served by less drastic, more constitutional means."

Mr. Ferguson methodically explained the reasons of the MCLU's position. The right to corporal punish a student is a constitutional issue that has been brought before the Courts many times. Aside from this, there are instances where the punishment does not produce the intended result and in fact may encourage the dissatisfactory behavior.

As a constructive alternative, a modified punishment-reward system has been found to be effective where the punishment is simply the lack of a tangible reward.

The MCLU is now supporting a bill in the legislature prohibiting corporal punishment of pupils.

Raymond explained how the agency had changed its method of operation, in an effort to make Maine more competitive, from one of "selling Maine as is" to one of increasing Maine's industrial attractiveness by changing some of the State's industry related laws. The idea is "a better life for ALL Maine people" by upgrading the existing companies and attracting the best companies with high quality wage standards. A 6 page pamphlet was presented to the Rotary members describing the 9 proposals the DCI has introduced to the legislature. The proposals range from the encompassing "Maine Development Act" to tax reform and State cosponsored quick training programs for employees of new industries entering the State.

A primary goal of the DCI is to help achieve 20,000 new jobs in the next 2 years to match the number of applicants entering the job market and thereby reduce the outflow of Maine's young people from the State.

### MEETING - FEBRUARY 28TH

Program Chairman, Don Jenis, introduced Don Nielsen, an agent with the Internal Revenue Service, whose specialty is the auditing of life insurance companies. Don Nielsen gave us some interesting statistics from the IRS. The service employs 70,000 throughout the country in 7 regional centers, 10 data processing centers, 58 district offices, and 900 satellite offices. In 1972, 112 million tax returns were processed resulting in 95 billion dollars from individuals and 35 billion dollars from corporations - a surprising statistic. Along with its tax chores, the IRS has had the responsibilities involved in the implementation of the federal wage and price phases. Not given to slogans, this year the IRS is becoming more aware of public relations and has as its slogan, "We Want to Help". And in conjunction with this, several steps have been taken to ease the filing of this year's returns, such as; the reintroduction of short form 1040A which can be used by about 31 million taxpayers; the assistance of taxpayers in filing, and in some cases the actual preparation of returns; the extending of office hours beyond the normal working day; and, in general, the assuming of a much more helpful attitude. To sum up his talk, Don felt that we would all be well advised to scrutinize the new changes in the tax laws as to how they might affact us.

This meeting was a joint one with the Scarborough Club and was a good one that might well be repeated more often. The food, as has been the rule lately, was excellent.

### MEETING, FEBRUARY 21ST

Les Waters introduced our guest speaker, Dick Davis, the President of the South Portland Board of Industry. Dick is a graduate of Worcester Tech and employed by General Electric in South Portland. He was instrumental in getting the General Electric Company to locate in this area. The South Portland Board of Industry was chartered in 1940 to assist local businesses and its purpose is the same today. Current projects of the Board are as follows; a new South Portland Post Office Building which will include Cape Elizabeth; Finding a source of funding for a possible high level bridge to replace or supplement the Million Dollar Bridge; and, the sponsoring of community activities and assisting the City Manager with future goals.

Bill said that he and the Post Office welcome any gripes so that they may be more aware of their shortcomings. He said that he would now classify the mail service as "lousy" but has great hopes for the future. It was a very interesting and informative talk.

### MEETING, JANUARY 10TH

Ron Hall, Program Chairman, introduced Archie Higgins of the State Health and Welfare Dept. His topic was "People with Problems". Archie defined a problem, relative to his work, as the difference between what people have and what they want. By this definition, I would say that most of us must have a problem or two. Social changes that have affected all of us have also had a tremendous affect on the State Dept. of Health and Welfare. No longer do needy people feel that they have to get along without, and their demands cannot be ignored. The Dept. is facing 20th century problems with 19th century solutions. Not only has the attitude of the poor changed but they have become much more mobile and the responsibility for the welfare of these people has created a tremendous amount of researching and record keeping to determine their points of origin. Archie was emphatic in saying that the poor were no less moral than the more fortunate contrary to the public image of the welfare recipient. Some statistics on South Portland: 1500 people are receiving help at a cost of \$73,000 per month. Among the 1500 people, 867 are children, 93 disabled, 158 old age, 6 blind, and the balance - parents of dependant children.

For example, the Australian Rotarian mentioned previously had frequent professional contacts with farmers in his community. As he observed the farms, he could see the beginning of soil erosion. He could see the rivers which once ran clear carrying a heavy load of silt - rich soil washed off the upper reaches when the plows stripped off natural cover. He could see gullies forming in the wake of recurring floods.

This Rotarian took his special knowledge - and his concern - to his club. The club, in turn, embarked upon a project of making a motion picture about soil conservation - a film to be promoted for public showing.

It would not be accurate to say that this one thing reversed the process of erosion in Australia. The problem remains, but a man and his club, armed with specific knowledge, initiated constructive action which has importance far beyond the confines of a single region, since conserving the soil is one of the basic concerns of

Rotary helps to make a man sensitive to need; it impels him to bring his special knowledge and excerience to the task and, above all, to act - alone, if he can, or in company with his fellow men if this is the better way. The Rotarian himself gives immediate and concrete meaning to "service above self" and "he profits most who serves best." The compilers of dictionaries do not build the meaning of such mottoes; nor do they dictate that Rotary should be known as a "service" club. These concepts are made meaningful by men of action, their action defining the words.



He who serves must act . . . for service is not a state of mind -- as necessary as is the proper state of mind. Voluntary service implies freedom to act, too. Admist gathering war clouds in 1940, the international convention at Havana, Cuba, adopted a resolution which said, in part: "...Rotary is based on the ideal of service, and where freedom, justice, truth, sanctity of the pledged word, and respect for human rights do not exist, Rotary cannot live, nor its ideal prevail."

Rotary is not a substitute for any other organization; it flourishes only where other free institutions are strong. The ideal of service is put into practice by

each Rotarian who, as a resolution of another convention put it, is "a loyal member" of his church or religion and "a loyal and serving citizen of his own country."

What is Rotary?

It is the experience of men of different faiths and different opinions and different nationalities growing in fellowship wherever they may be. It is men discovering their responsibilities toward one another and finding themselves in purposeful action.

Rotary may be—and is—a man in Australia pondering the destruction of uncontrolled water and initiating a program to conserve the precious soil. It may be—and is—a school for underprivileged children in Sao Paulo, Brazil; a hospital in Indiana, U.S.A., where children can go to repair the ravages of the great child cripplers. It may be—and is—a school for deaf and mute children on the island of Cyprus. It may be—and is—a remote village in India struggling upward with the help of its "foster parents," a Rotary club. It may be—and is—a Rotary—sponsored student wending his way from his home to a university across the seas.

At no point in its development have men been able to say: "This is Rotary. This is the place where we can stop, and the world can move on." For the world does move on, and Rotary moves with the men who move the world. More than 30 years after Rotary's beginning, when lesser men might have thought in terms of solidifying the stream of progress, Paul Harris, the founder, wrote: "This is a changing world; we must be prepared to change with it. The story of Rotary will have to be written again and again."

The story's setting has been more than half of the terrible and magnificent twentieth century, the century when man probed the atom and found there the power to destroy himself. It is the century of more material progress than in all the rest of man's time put together. It is the century in which man pushed back the frontiers of Outer Space while at the same moment he was confounded by the gaps of misunderstanding and selfishness within the "inner space" of mankind. In spite of this lag, however, it is the century in which individualism ascended to a very high place, a century in which increasing numbers of men found ways to fulfill a sense of personal success.

Out of such a social context came Rotary. And Rotarians have been so deeply concerned with the deeper meaning of what they have created that they have pondered it and debated it in convention.

## WHAT ROTARY IS (Continued) FROM ADVENTURE IN SERVICE.

Technically, too, a Rotary club is an association of representative business and professional men of the community who have accepted the ideal of service as the real basis for attaining success and happiness in personal, business and community life. And the ideal of service? In general, it is an attitude that relates persons and things with action - constructive action; thoughtfulness of others is the basis of this service, and helpfulness to others is its expression.

Rotary also has been called "an ideal in action" and "friendship organized."

Translated into deed, it is thoughtful action, quick response to need, and the giving of the most valuable possession of any man - himself. In the beginning, Rotary came from a lonely man's hunger for friendship and fellowship. The first meeting of "Rotarians" was held in the name of acquaintance, but that acquaintance was designed to lead to increased business for each man. The meaning of Rotary, however, grew as the men grew, and the new organization expanded and deepened its challenge. Rotary became a spirit of service which men took into the market place, or into the office, or to whatever point they struggled to create order where there had been chaos, beauty where there had been ugliness, and fellowship where there had been loneliness and misunderstanding.



ROTARY HISTORY: Another businessman, Frank Collins, president of the newly organized Rotary Club of Minneapolis, in an impromptu speech at the second convention in 1911 used the phrase "Service, not Self". It also became a popular expression and was later adapted to "Service above Self". Within a few years both phrases had become the unofficial slogan of Rotary, until eventually made official by convention action in

Rotary's Golden Anniversary Convention in 1955 was held in Chicago. The actual anniversary memorializations began on 23 February culminating with the pageantry of the convention on 29 May - 2 June, but the outstanding element was not the convention, fine as it was. It was the way in which clubs and Rotarians throughout the world seized the opportunity for re-dedicating themselves to the ideal of service. Countless numbers of "golden anniversary" projects were initiated, some for completion within the anniversary period, others extending far into the future; some, as a matter of fact, became permanent activities, a perpetual commemoration. One of the outstanding developments of Rotary history, The Rotary Foundation, provided the central theme of a motion picture, "The Great Adventure", and called attention far and wide to Rotary activity.

## LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

Ed Langlois of the Bureau of Waterways, a very familiar face to most members spoke on the recent oil spill in Hussey Sound.

Ed first went about explaining that the Bureau of Waterways gets involved only when the source of the spill is a mystery. In this particular case the source was clear, but the how, when, and where is about as clear as the oil spilled in the bay.

The personnel at the bridge of the vessel claim the incident occurred within the Sound when they hit a ledge, reason being they had not seen any oil before this point.

Ed theorizes that the vessel must have struck something outside the Sound based on the fact that oil was found on the beaches stretching from Portland to York.

Contingency plans had been laid out for such mishaps. What their plans did not include was spilled oil reaching shore, making their clean-up and disposal more difficult with the oil mixed with seaweed and hay. Their plans called for booms to surround both the ship and spills and to siphon the oil into closed barges before it ever reached shore.

Ed had high praise for Captain McCann of the Coast Guard, who is relatively new to the area on his decision making during the crisis.

Ed closed his program on the note that Portland would be an ideal place to have a school sponsored by the federal government on fighting oil spills.

The following year at the convention in Portland, Oregon, U.S.A., he again used the phrase, in slightly altered form—this time, "he profits most who serves best." The delegates liked it so much that it was picked up and added as the last paragraph of the "Rotary platform" which that convention adopted.

## LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM

Our Speaker was Dr. Lewis J. P. Calisti, a native of New Jersey. He came to Maine in 1971 and became the first president of the University of Maine, Portland-Gorham campus.

His talk centered mostly on the "trends of higher education". He pointed out that across the nation there are around 300,000 vacancies in the colleges. Reasons for so many vacancies are a) Smaller pool of 18 year olds, b) Reduced pressure from military draft, c) Rising cost of College education, d) Questioning of the value of a liberal arts education, e) Stop-outs or the more familiar term drop-outs.

It was a surprising note to hear that Maine has the lowest proportion of students going on to higher education, and also that graduate programs have suffered tremendously throughout the states because of lack of federal grants.

With the referendum questions coming up in November, the Doctor's final remarks were spent promoting the universities bond issue. By the question and answer period that followed one would assume there is much controversy involved.

## ROTARY HISTORY

In 1915 a sixth object was added to the club objects, "to stimulate the desire of each member to be of service to his fellow men and society in general". There were slight differences between the objects of the international organization and those suggested for the Rotary club until 1922, when the same objects were established. There were six objects until 1935 when the Mexico City Convention adopted four objects. In 1951 the convention agreed that Rotary had only one object with four parts. These parts, then became the "four avenues of service", club, vocational, community, and international respectively.







## HISTORY OF ROTARY - PART IX

The 1922 convention also witnessed the refinement of the "Objects of Rotary" The early versions had emphasized the "business motives" but the gradual evolvement of goals reflected concerns common to a new organization; e.g., in 1910 the first object was "to extend and develop Rotary principles by the organization of affiliating Rotary clubs throughout America." The 1912 convention talked about "standardizing" Rotary principles, and the first model constitution and by-laws for a Rotary club was approved, with five objects covering such things as promoting the worthiness of all legitimate occupations, encouragement of high ethical standards, increasing efficiency by exchanging ideas, promoting acquaintance, and quickening the interest of each member in the public welfare and civic development.

### HISTORY OF ROTARY - PART VIII

"Rotary crossed the boundary between Canada and the United States in 1910 and in 1911 crossed the Atlantic Ocean to Ireland and Great Britain; thus, the term "National" was no longer appropriate. In 1912 the organization became the "International Association of Rotary Clubs." By 1921 the 1,000th club had been chartered (York, England) and the Rotary banner had been planted firmly in such places as Hawaii, the Philippines, China, Japan, Australia and New Zealand.

The first international convention to be held outside the United States was held in 1921 at Edinburgh, Scotland. The Rotarians made quite an impression on the Scots as they landed singing "I'm Just a Little Prairie Flower." But there was also a seriousness about the delegates in session, and there were signs of concern about principles and an emergent idealism. A past president put it into words when he told the convention, "In the past, missions have been either political or commercial. We come as neither. We come as men."

The American Society of Dowsing now has a membership of over 1080; so there must be something to it. As Mr. MacLean said, "There's no good explanation for it — it just works."

## HISTORY OF ROTARY - PART VII

"At the Houston convention amid a great deal of talk as to "just where Rotary is going", a Philadelphian named Guy Gundaker, who later was R. I. president, was appointed to head a special committee charged with studying Rotary principles and objectives. Ultimately, Gundaker produced a small book, a combination of four earlier pamphlets, under the title, A TALKING KNOWLEDGE OF ROTARY. Besides being the birth of Rotary program literature, it was the first definite formulation of principles and objectives.

From this little book grew a widespread development of codes of ethics for various non-Rotary organizations. This began in 1922 when Rotarian Gundaker, a restaurateur, was asked by his trade association, the American Restaurant Association, to draft a code for it. When adopted by the Association, this code became the model for many other trade and professionsl groups—mot only in the United States but also in other countries as well."
