

This Week's Meeting - October 6, 1976

PROGRAM: The program chairman for the month of October is Dick Day. This week's program to be announced.

LAST WEEK: Meeting called to order at 6:30 p.m. by President Dick Holden. Invocation was given by Dick Kennedy. Song "America" was led by Dick Day.

Richard Sittinger was welcomed and recognized as the club's newest member. Rich will be formally introduced at a later date.

Dick Pyne surprised us with a display of hidden talent by playing the guitar while leading us into song. The song selection was quite appropriate for ladies' night, "I Want a Girl" and "Down by the Riverside".

Last week's program featured Mr. Russell I. Burleigh, manager of the Portland Symphony Orchestra and Mr. Bruce Hangen, director and conductor of the P.S.O. Mr. Burleigh has been managing the Portland Symphony since 1969. His talk centered around the workings of the P.S.O. They are beginning the year with a deficit of \$65,000. They hope to erase this and finish the season in the black. With close to 2600 season tickets sold to date, and with anticipated sponsorships from the local businesses, I would say they're well on their way. In closing, he informed us on how Mr. Hangen was chosen over 150 other applicants for conductor of the P.S.O. This decision was made by the board of directors and members of the orchestra after a season of trial conductors from the seven finalists.

Mr. Hangen is a native of Pennsylvania, raised in Montana, graduated from Eastman and has studied at Tanglewood. Currently he is associate conductor of the Denver Symphony. He has guest conducted the Buffalo Philharmonic, Syracuse Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic and for the past two years, spent a month touring and guest conducting in New Zealand. Mr. Hangen is very excited about the upcoming season. He feels that the orchestra needs to go back to the more traditional symphony sounds, therefore, the series this season will reflect his way of thinking. I feel certain that the exuberance displayed reviewing the concerts will also be evident in his conducting of the orchestra. We wish Mr. Hangen a most successful season.

The close of the program included a live "commercial" presented by a group of symphony singers. It was comprised of nine ladies who sang tribute to Mr. Hangen and the upcoming concert series.


Congratulations to Al Boudreau for the fine job he did with the programming for the month of September.

- 3. Tell your printer what you have to spend.
- 4. Discuss your problem with your printer.

 J. B. explained the 5 processes of printing; letter press, offset, engraving, silk screen, and Xerox. There are 3 types of printing, (1) Instant, while you wait; (2) Commercial, large quantities and (3) Specialty, pens etc. J. B's talk was informative and could prove helpful if his advice is followed.

The visiting guests have been taken to such towns as Montreal, Quebec, Lewiston, Durham, New Hampshire and Portland.


Thanks is extended to those club members that gave of their time and facilities during their visit to our club. The visitors extended the greetings from District #168 of France by presenting a banner to our club.



Program Chairman, Hal Fralich, introduced Cecil Goddard, known in many circles as "Mr. Rotary", with 35 years of service. Past District Governor Cecil worked for Colby College in many capacities for 19 years, then he went into the Insurance field and built one of the leading Insurance Agencies in Waterville and is presently retired.

Past District Governor Cecil spoke on interesting facts about Rotary. Cecil said did you know that? ...

.... Harry Ruggles, the 5th Rotarian, started Rotary singing and developed the symbol of Rotary, the Wheel.

....Arthur Shelton, a super salesman, installed many new clubs and developed the Rotary slogan, Service above Self.

....The Founder, Paul Harris, studied law at the University of Iowa, was a newspaper reporter in Frisco, Denver and Washington; an actor, a cowboy, hotel night clerk, traveling salesman, and then decided to practice law in Chicago at the age of 28. At age of 30 he founded Rotary. In 1900 he had the idea of a social businessmen's club, and in 1905 Rotary was born - a new kind of Club, where men received nothing material but actually paid for doing good. Paul Harris became 1st President of Rotary International.

Close to the Speaker's heart is Rotary Foundation. In 1917 he suggested the Club have an endowment fund. Little was done for 30 years (\$56,000 raised in 30 years). \$1,500,000 was raised in memory of Paul Harris when he died in 1947. 10,000 young men and women have received awards from the Foundation since then. Need \$8,300,000 by this July - increase of 20% a year. The average Rotarian gives \$10.00. There are 16,000 paid Harris Fellows. Next three years the program will cost \$18,000,000! At present there are 1,200 students in 100 countries.
