Our Club Assembly is re-scheduled for February.



After expenses, \$6,076 for trees and \$480 for wreaths, plus misc. expenses, our profit was apparently \$3,350. Forty-eight trees and 10 wreaths were taken to the dump and apparently 175 trees were stolen from the lot. Don also handed out kudos to Bill Kourakos, labor chief; Phil Dube, wreaths; George Chandler, J. B. Maxwell, Fred Madore, Bill Stanton's son and Phil Dube, unloading; J. B. Maxwell, tags; Ted Wainwright, set-up; Dick Holden, Bill York, Fred Madore, Bill Stanton, Dick Kennedy, Bob Nigro and Dick Thurston, clean-up and last but not least special thanks to Dan Gacetta, the refreshment committee. Also, thanks to all the loyal foot soldiers that put in time selling trees.

President Dick presented Art Keniston with his 13 year perfect attendance pin and informally welcomed Peter Gervais, who will be introduced by Sam Giftos at a later date. The President's hat was passed and a collection was taken up for our waitress Bea Foster, as a sort of belated Christmas gift.

President Dick also stressed attendance. In December our club average was 70.46%.

Dick Kennedy introduced our own Bill Stanton, head bartender at the Portland Country Club, who presented a slide illustrated talk on the Wines of Germany. German wine imports to the USA have tripled in the past three years and 85% of all West German wines are white wines. The German wines are usually grown on the south slopes of the hills and have been grown in the same way for the past 2,000 years. German law prohibits the fortification of wine by the addition of alcohol. A German wine label is one of the hardest things to understand in wine labels, but by the time Bill was finished we had been exposed to such German label terms as Tafelwein, Qualitatswein bestimmten Anbaugebiet and Qualitatswein mit Pradikat. Bill ended his talk by showing a few special bottles of wine from his collection and by answering questions from the floor and Les Waters.

George Chandler introduced visiting Rotarians Al Milliken of Portland, Vern Lent of Scarborough and Peter Mills of Farmington.

Bill York, bravely exploring the deepest pages of the song book, led us in "Daisy Bell" and "You Tell Me Your Dream". Our hat is off to Bill for leading us in something new for a change. Art Keniston seemed to be having some trouble with the new songs as he was overheard counting "1-2-3-4 and 1-2-3-4."

Dick Kennedy introduced Burton Hejduk, Superintendent of Opportunity Farm in New Gloucester, gave us an extremely interesting talk about the farm, which cares for 40 boys from broken homes. The farm is located on the highest point in Cumberland County and is a working farm of 650 acres, of which about 250 acres are brush and timberland. The youngest boy is 5½ years old and the boys must leave the farm after they graduate from high school. The Farm places great accent on education and all of the boys attend the Gray-New Gloucester school system. The farm uses livestock and dirt agriculture as a means of therapy. Visitors are welcome at any time.

There will be a Director's Meeting at the President's house on Monday eve., January 31.





LAST WEEK'S PROGRAM: Nick Pappas introduced Richard L. Johnson of the Scarborough State Police unit who spoke on the use of the polygraph. There are three polygraph units in Maine (Orono, Augusta and Scarborough) being used by certified operators. The equipment is used to screen applicants for several state agencies. However, its primary use is on criminal cases. (Approx. 600 per year) A person must volunteer for a polygraph examination and may be accompanied by legal counsel. The person to be tested is pre-examined as to his background and physical fitness. This information is used as a basis for testing. The testing results are accomplished by measuring blood pressure, the reaction of sweat glands and chest or stomach breathing.

More on our new member Peter Drivas. Pete lives with his wife Dolores and their children, Pamela, Ross and Matthew at 42 Sylvan Road, South Portland. His education includes a B.S. from U. of M.
