Some of the facts stated were that radio broadcasting is well over 50 years old. First broadcast being in 1910. The Hardy and Cox Presidental election was the first project program. Being free to the public, radio depends entirely on advertising money from the business industry. Reaching 83% of the population, over 12, per day and 90% of the people hear radio sometime during the week.

Other interesting facts are that 95% of the automobiles sold have radios and 64% of miles driven are with radios on. We were told how involved station operation is, how they advertise; billboards, bumper stickers, etc. The more specialized a station is the more work is involved. Radio is a public service and offers a lot to a lot of


Our speaker is a native of Dixfield, Maine but spent most of her radio life in Florida before returning to Maine.

MASON SMITH showed a series of slides which he took on his recent trip to France where he spent a day with Pierre Bourgeois who visited our club last Fall. It appears that Mason was indeed wined and dined in very fine style.

PROGRAM: This month's chairman, Dick Jordan, introduced Neva Cram who is the Executive Director of Ingraham Volunteers Inc. This program is, in effect, one which is a telephone service for anyone in the community who is in need of any kind of assistance and does not know where to turn. Ingraham Volunteers can put such people in touch with the proper agencies who can suppl a solution to the caller's problem, no matter what it is. The agency has grown tremendoulsly in its seven years of existence. From 1970 to 1976 it handled a total of 10,000 calls. In 1977 alone it handled 5,000 calss and 1978 looks to be larger yet. Well trained volunteers man the phones 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Each volunteer serves eight hours a week and there are monthly and annual intensive refresher course provided to them to maintain a high degree of proficiency in there work. Ingraham has recently installed a teletype machine which allows them to serve approximatelt fifty deaf people in the area by making phone calls for these deaf people. Neve also pointed ut that these deaf people are subject to the same stresses as anyone else and they are finding that these deaf people need the other services offered by the agency. Dick Jordan says that the month's programs will all be devoted to the Social Services of the area.

PROGRAM:

Dick Jordan introduced Dr. Joseph Kreisler, Head of the Department of Social Research at UMPG as this evening's guest speaker. Dr. Kreisler spoke of the program in his department. He said that all professionals in his area have an obligation to clarify services for which the taxpayers are paying. He said the three goals of a social worker are 1. To seek to help people having difficulty coping; 2. To help people to connect up with needed services; and 3. To understand society and promote needed services. He said that the profession had developed beyond the "do-gooders" to disciplined professionals. To achieve this level of professionalism, his department trains students with knowledge, skills and values associated with the profession. He said the basic message was not to solve problems for people, but to help people solve their own problems. Following the talk, Peter Drivas questioned the speaker about the proliferation of social services.


