George Chandler opened his first meeting as our new president by leading the club in the Pledge of Allegiance. Warren Simpson gave the invocation and Lloyd Knight led the club in the singing of America.

Following the meal Sam Giftos directed a chorus of "In the Good Old Summer Time" and "Sing a Song to Rotary", Don Jenis then introduced the visiting Rotarians and

George Chandler named Don Jenis the distinguished Rotarian of the week. He also read thank you notes from the two scholarship recipients. The club had awarded a scholarship at both the South Portland and the Cape Elizabeth High School graduations several weeks earlier.

Art Keniston, our treasurer, has submitted his resignation. He was pressed by a variety of commitments. The nominating committee will meet to nominate a successor.

Dick Kennedy asked for members to look for postcards that would be representative of South Portland and the Cape. These will be used at the district conferences on the bulletin board to introduce our area to other Rotarians.

When all other business had been completed George Chandler called to order a club assembly for the purpose of examining club direction during the coming year. It was George's intent to outline some of his goals and eliciting ideas from the members. The club's governing structure includes George Chandler, President; Al Boudreau, Vice President; Bob Carson, Secretary; Bill Stanton, Vocational Service Director; Ed Corson, Community Service Director; and Ed Gaw, International Service Director. George Chandler emphasized the necessity for the membership to take an active role on the committees because only through active support will the club's efforts become successful. Bill Stanton reported that he was attempting to establish criteria for a Businessman of the Year Award. Bob Carson spoke concerning the internal budget of the club. He said it was based upon a membership of fifty and that it could only be maintained by a continuing search for new members. He went on to explain the \$11,130.00 internal budget. He also reported on the external budget which took in \$4800 and spent \$6400 in the past year. He said that despite these figures the budget was healthy with commitments made and \$1500-\$2000 surplus.

George Chandler stated that one of his goals was to build the club membership to He said that we must look for committed Rotarians. 60.

In another area of importance George said that he hoped the club would initiate a second money making project. The Christmas Tree project is successful, but he feels that we can support a second project. A show of hands indicated nearly unanimous support for a second fund raising project. Nick Pappas and Rob Kilroy volunteered to form a committee to investigate various possibilities. Any ideas from members would be appreciated by Nick and Rob.

George also placed importance on fellowship and attendance. Questions from Rotarians included Paul Chantal's regarding status of the directory - It is at the printers, - and Don Jenis' regarding the shadowing program.

In closing the meeting George asked for the active support of all the Rotarians.



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George Chandler opened the meeting by leading the club in the "Pledge of Allegiance". Harold Fralich gave the invocation and Dick Holden led the club in singing "America".

Following dinner, Paul Butler led the singing of "Give My Regards to Broadway". It was rumored that this is not South Portland's own Broadway. Al Boudreau introduced our visiting Rotarians and guests.

It was announced that Ed Corson is in the New England Baptist Hospital for surgery. Bill Kilroy is also ill and in the Maine Medical Center. We extend our wishes for a speedy recovery for both of them.

George Chandler directed the project committee to report on their progress in development of a second club project. Nick Pappas and Rob Kilroy would welcome any imput to their committee. Sam Giftos as acting Sergeant at Arms handed out fines to every member except Rob Kilroy in his short quiz. George Chandler asked Harold Fralich to speak about what it means to be a Rotarian. Harold's message was that the person who has the greatest fun in Rotary is the person who is willing to give the most of himself. He said that Rotary needs a person's most precious commodity - their time. Harold implored that we all "be willing" during this coming year.

The nominating committee was to meet following this evening's meeting. They were to nominate a replacement for Art Keniston as treasurer. George announced that Keith Dennison and Dick Pyne were also resigning.

Rob Kilroy our program chairman introduced Mike Pendergrass of Data General. Mike spoke about the 3 year old Westbrook Facility and about the Corporation. Data General is the 3rd largest manufacturer of minicomputers with sales of \$420 million and 16 facilities around the world. The ten year old company does 46% of its manufacturing at Westbrook where it has 8 acres of floor under one roof. The plan when fully operational is targeted to employ 1600-1800 workers. Data General's aim is to hire all employees from within the state.

Data General has involved itself in our state. Their commitment includes gifts of computers to the University of Maine at Orono and to the City of Westbrook. They are also building a softball park in Westbrook for use by the public.

He then headed his own advertising agency for 7 years before joining Conifer Industries as Vice President of sales and marketing. Bill is a Past President of the Business Ethics Division of the Greater Portland Chamber of Commerce and President of the Advertising Club. Bill is also a former director of the Portland Kiwanis Club. Bill was responsible for the formation of the Hunter's Safety Committee for the State of Maine. Bill lives on Two Lights Road on the Cape with his wife Joyce and three children Debbie, Mark and Billy. We welcome Bill to the club.

Tom Holden introduced Bill Warren, Dean of Instruction and acting Director at Southern Maine Vocational Technical Institute. Mr. Warren spoke about the 32 year history of the vocational technical institute. The current system has 6 campuses, 3200 regular students and 12-15000 adult part-time students. In recent years the VTI's have changed from their former male brientation to a curriculum that engages both men and women. He spoke briefly of the various studies that have advocated merger of the state school systems. This is yet to come about. The VTI education philosophy is to prepare a student for a job cluster. This is designed to provide for upper mobility within a trade.



The evening's speaker was Norm Olsen, the Executive Director of the Maine Fishermen's Association. Norm is a native of Cape Elizabeth and comes from a family closely associated with Maine's fishing industry. Norm has himself worked as a fisherman before assuming his current role. The Maine Fishermen's Association was incorporated to represent the various fishing interests in the state. The group includes fishermen, processors, and shippers. Until its formation there was no single group that extended itself statewide and represented all the commercial fishing interests. The prime objective of the Maine Fishermen's Association is to lobby the various federal, state and regional agencies that regulate the fishing industry. The group is particularly concerned with the quotas that resulted from the 200 mile limit. These have crippled many local boats. The association is also concerned about fish imports particularly fresh Canadian fillets. In the case of the Canadian fish, government subsidies allow the fish to compete unfairly with Maine fish on the Boston and New York markets.

Harold did take what he considered a few minutes, to personally thank some of the people who helped make his year as district governor so successful. He was especially grateful to his wife Marge for all she had done.



CLUB DIRECTORY: For those members not attending last week's meeting, the directories are ready and may be picked up at the next meeting.



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
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Rob Kilroy announces that this week's program is by Alan Monroe who is manager of The Portland International Jet Port. Should be good.

Program. Steve Kennedy gave a Classification talk. Steve works for a stock broker, Hornblower & Weeks, which has been around for about one hundred years. Originally started in Boston as a partnership between two men, became a member of the New York stock exchange, and opened an office in Portland in 1915. It is now the 5th largest Wall Street firm. Steve informed us as to how the market works both as to listed stocks and those dealt over the counter. He gave us a couple of instances of how values have changed from time to time. Westinghouse was at 289 in 1928, in 1932 it was at 15 and today is at 24. Bethlehem Steel was at 150 in 1928, down to 8 in 1932 and today is at 24. My trouble is that I can remember the thirties only too well. Steve feels that the Stock Exchange may well decline in importance in the coming years if stocks are allowed to be sold by brokers directly rather than through the Exchange. As usual, one of these Classification Talks turned out to be a real hit.



DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S VISITATION: September 13th, District Governor Phil Matte will be making his visitation at our Club. This will also be a ladies night. Committee chairmen are asked to have their reports completed and turned in by the 13th for review by the District Governor.

LAST WEEK: President George got the meeting started at 6:17 p.m., singing of America was led by Bob Nigro and invocation was given by Dick Kennedy. V.P. Al introduced the four visiting Rotarians. As a tune-up for the District Gövernor's visitation, Sam Giftos had us sing "O' Canada".

BOARD MEETING: Will be held at George Chandler's home on August 31.

PROGRAM: It's always interesting to have a speaker whose subject matter concerns most of us. Al Monroe, the Director of the Portland Jetport for the past seven years spoke on the growth and future expansions of the airport.

In 1968, the first year that the present terminal opened it handled over 96,000 passengers. Last year it handled over 200,000. It was built to handle only 100,000 passengers.

The first expansion of the terminal is due to begin this winter. The baggage claim area along with the restaurant will be enlarged. Phase two will hopefully begin next summer. This would include new and enlarged airline ticket counters, a holding area for passengers waiting to board their flights and three jetways, which will do away with passengers being exposed to the elements, at least those passengers traveling on Delta Airlines. Parking will also be improved with the construction of a ramp covering half of the existing parking area.

THIS WEEK: Program unknown at press time.

Last Week: Meeting called to order by President George, America the Beautiful lead by Tom Holden, invocation by Nick Pappas, visiting Rotarians and guests introduced by Al Boudreau.

President George read a letter of thanks from the Lamy family for the Citizenship which our club recently awarded to them.

Program Chairman Rob Kilroy introduced George Mitchel who is the U. S. Attorney for Maine. George gave a very interesting talk on the drug smuggling activities currently going on in Maine and what the authorities are doing and have done to combat this situation. It apprears that Maine is becoming a popular place to bring in drugs because the south west and south east parts of the country are being very strongly watched by Federal people and Maine's long and secluded coast offers a better place to operate. In one recent case George pointed out that his people were able to confiscate 20 tons of marijuana along with a ship valued at a half million dollars and 18 to 20 pickup trucks and all but four of the men involved in the landing. Most of the men working this trade are young men who have no visible means of support and who buy trucks for cash as well as renting shore property for cash. While Maine's coast is long, the best areas for smuggling can be narrowed down as the smugglers need a deep water facility which is quite secluded. George pointed out that, while the Federal enforcement people are few in number, the cooperation among them and State, County, and local officers has been very good and excellent results have been recorded. In most criminal cases plea bargaining is a good tool for the officers but not in the case of smuggling. Apparently there are such huge profits in this trade that people caught are well taken care of and do not talk about their connections. George commented that the recent catch of dope was worth several millions of dollars on the street and the cost of operation is only in the 15% range. With sums of money this large involved it would seem likely that anyone who talked out of turn might wind up with a mouthful of cement. The enforcement people try to make the operation as unprofitable as possible by confiscating everything they can get when they make these raids.


