
LAST WEEK: Meeting called to order by Pres. George, America led by Peter Drivas, invocation by Dick Jordan, singing led by Dick Yerxa. Al Boudreau introduced visiting Rotarians including the new Town Manager of Cape Elizabeth, John Henchey. Warren Simpson made up last week in Helsinki, Finland and brought back a flag from that club. He also made a few comments on his trip all over Europe.

President George announced the names of three new candidates for membership in our club. They are: Mike Adams, John Henchey and Robert Penty. As usual these names will lie on the table for ten days and if there are no objections, they will be accepted into our club.

A letter of thanks was read from Mrs. Joseph Klenk for our recent contribution to her Campfire group.

On Tuesday, Oct. 3 there will be a Rotary Information Meeting at Harold Fralich's home on Stoneybrook Road. This is for new members and their wives: Dick Goodine, Steve Kennedy, Bill Brown, Andy Mesoin, Rob Kilroy, and Lin Beck.

Program Chairman Lin Beck introduced Dick Anderson, formerly of the Me. Audubon Society, a Director of the Dept. of Environmental Protection, and now a partner in Land Reclamation Inc. who spoke on Solid Waste and its problems. He commented that the last ten years have seen a tremendous improvement in the rivers of the country, noting that this year there were 400 Atlantic Salmon caught in the Penobscot River where ten years ago none could live in it. He said that the next ten years will be the decade of learning how to handle solid waste. Apparently land fill dumps are not the answer as nobody wants one near him and only from 5 to 10 per cent of the State of Maine has soil suitable for such dumps. Dick indicates that re-use and recycling are the best answers. Many regulations work against recycling as in the case of shipping iron ore by rail at a very low freight rate whereas scrap iron takes the same high rate as new automobiles. It was interesting to learn that a pound of aluminum made from scratch uses 32¢ worth of electricity and sells for 55¢ while a pound of scrap aluminum can be recycled using only 5¢ worth. Obviously there is economic gain to be had by using scrap. He said that there will soon be a new plant in Auburn which will burn solid waste to generate steam which will be sold to nearby plants. We are using such large quantities of paper in this country that by the year 2000 the production of wood for pulp will not be able to produce the paper needed and we will be forced to turn to recycled paper. He closed by saying that the ever increasing cost of disposing waste will provide the incentive to conserve and recycle our resources.

She feels strongly that we need to reform our welfare programs and get as many people as possible off the welfare rolls and onto payrolls. She cited many cases of families who have been on welfare for three generations. She feels that we sorely tax reforms but is not convinced that the State should take the current surplus and rebate it on a one time basis to the taxpayers. She cited many cases where maintainance of State properties has been held up in the name of economy and which will require substantial sums to be brought up to standard. Barbara is very strongly in favor of keeping the legal drinking age at twenty years. She said that, when the age was 18, liquor was common down into the grade school level. A lively question and answer session elicited many views of our legislators. Some feel that they are insensitive to the peoples' opinions, that they are much disposed to spend rather than look for economies. The point was raised that, in the wake of four years of Governor Longley's spartan reign, the next administration may embark on a spending spree. One opinion said that, if this occured, the people would let their feelings be known, and loudly. All in all, a very lively and informative program.



Mr. Berry announced that the waiting period between traffic and criminal arraignments and trials will be reduced from three months to about three weeks under a new trial schedule.



LAST WEEK: President George opened meeting with pledge of allegiance, Bill Stanton led America, Dick Kennedy with invocation. Excellent meal. Singing was omitted in order to shorten meeting to allow for hockey fans. which included our speaker. Al Boudreau introduced visiting Rotarians.

President George announced that the board of directors have approved a grant of \$1,000 to Cape Elizabeth High School to send two people to a seminar on combatting use of drugs in schools. There seems to be a serious problem in the Cape. George also announced that the board has approved a second fund raiser for the Club. It will be an international auction and more details will be forthcoming soon.

Al Boudreau passed out forms for each Rotarian to indicate his choices of time to sell Christmas trees this year. If you did not get one be sure to ask Al. Pick three or four times in which you can work. Al announced that Hodges Furniture Co. has contracted to buy 250 tress from us to be used in a Christmas Promotion sale. This makes a good start for this year's sale.

President George took an informal poll to determine if there is any interest in starting our meetings at 6 PM rather than 6:15. This to allow hockey fans and others to get away a bit earlier. It looked to me as if there was much approval for this.

NEW MEMBER: Bob Carson introduced formally our newest member who is Mike Adams. Mike is a niative of Southern California a graduate of UCLA and the University of Maine, is a former Marine Flight Officer. and was Executive Vice President of New England Ins. Co prior to starting his own business. Mike's wife's name is Patricia and they have three children Welcome aboard Mike Adams.

Dick Kilroy completed his political month by introducing David Emery, who is running for re-election from the first district of Maine for the House of Representatives in Washington. Mr. Emery is a graduate of Worcester Polytech College with a degree in Electrical Engineering. He has served two terms in the Maine House and two terms in Washington. He spoke of the 36 hour session at the close of the last session of Congress and of the necessity of the next session to clear up some mistakes by the tired congressmen. He spoke at lenght on the energy crisis we are facing and what Congress has and has not done to alleviate it. He commented that the administration's program of early 1977 called for a raise in the price of a barrel of domestic oil to the value of that imported from abroad and a graduated tax which would have raised the price of a gallon of gas by 50¢. These were defeated. There are incentives for auto and appliance manufacturers to make their products more enery efficient along with tax credits for people who insulate their homes and others who wish to experiment with wind and solar power devices. He said that we would have natural gas deregulation by 1985 and that this would give us a tremendous source of energy at a fairly reasonable cost. He is looking forward to addressing such problems as what to do with nuclear wastes and how to best use our coal resources which offer us energy for at least 500 years if we can learn how to use them effeciently.


SPEAKER: Program Chairman Bill Stanton introduced Paul Cain who represents Conn. Mutual Life Ins. Co. at 836 Sawyer St. in So. Portland who spoke on The Crummey Trust---Is it really? Paul attended the University of Hawaii, Harvard Extension and University of So. Maine. He spent 10 years in the Submarine service, the last three of which he was a teacher at the Submarine School in Conn. He explained that the Crummey Trust is a device whereby one can avoid income taxes on part of his income by setting up trust accounts for his children in the amount of \$3000 per year (\$6000) if his wife is involved). There are some pitfalls in this as the children must have full access to the trust amounts for at least a part of the year and there must be something in the trust for them to obtain. The fact that they do or do not avail themselves of the opportunity to draw funds from the trust has no bearing on the situation. Some of this was over my head and I think I would consult an attorney before I got too involved in such a situation to be sure of the direction which I should take.

LAST WEEK: Pledge of Allegiance led by Pres. George, America by Lloyd Knight, Visiting Rotarians introduced by Al Boudreau.


