Interesting to note that our district 779 is the second largest in area in the world. The largest is in Africa. Another interesting fact is that one of the four men who originated Rotary was a tailor from Litchfield, Maine.

Following District Governor Ken's talk, Warren Simpson showed us his movies of the June 1977 District Convention at The Balsams. They were very well done ad should encourage any one who has not attended a convention at The Balsams to give some thought to attending the 1980 convention which will be held there and be sponsored by the Westbrook Club. PROGRAM Andy Mezoian introduced Mr Roy Spugnardi who is the Director of Polution Abatement for the City of South Portland. Mr Spugnardi's talk centered around the treatment plants and gave a lot of interesting statistics about the plants. For instance, did you know that the estimated cost is \$17 million dollars. That 75% of the monies will come from the federal government. A total of 2.7 billion gallons of waste water will pass through the plants and 90% of the waste will be removed.

During the question and answer session there seemed to be concern over the storage of the sludge and its eventual use as fertilizer.

LAST WEEK: (10/17) Meeting opened by President Al; America by Ron Palmquist; Invocation by Warren Simpson; Songs by Dick Shaffstall; Visiting Rotarians introduced by Paul Butler.

Pres. Al introduced Mr. Willard Egli who is a representative to our club from Rotary International in Evanston. This is apparently a new system being tried with Mr Egli and five other men being representatives for a part of the United States and Canada. Willard's beat is the Northeastern part of the U.S. and also part of Canada. Any problems we have will be funneled through Willard to R. I. He spoke to us about the Rotary building in Evanston, apparently a beautiful building, and invited any and all of us to call in when we are in the area.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman Andy Mezoian introduced Dana Perkins who is the assistant Manager of the So. Portland sewer treatment plant. Dana has a B S degree from Bates College, served three years in military electronics, and has eight years experience in waste water treatment. He showed us slides of the inside and outside of the plant which showed the process from the time the water enters the plant, is treated with bacteria. has the solids settled out and is discharged into the bay. So. Portland's sewer system is one which combines sanitary sewage with storm water run off. On a normanl day the plant handles approximately 6 millions gallons of water but, in a storm, the level rises to 80 million. Apparently the solids taken from the water are now being mixed with sand and spread on the city dump until such time as a disposal area is ready. Some of this sludge has been spread on the grass at the plant and it sure made the grass green. It was interesting to note that the plant cleans up the waste water in the same way as nature would but does it in a much shorter time. The plant operators must monitor the incoming water to be sure there is nothing to upset the bacteria count in the plant. Either raising or lowering the count would result in problems. There are many problems with industrial waste as it may contain toxic substances which would upset the chemical balance of the plant. Very interesting program.



PROGRAM: Program Chairman Andy Mezoian introduced Roger Legere who is chairman of a committee which is looking into alternatives to the present bridge between Portland and So. Portland. Roger gave us a history of the bridge which is 65 years old and cost a million dollars to erect and has had several millions spent on upkeep since. The draw machinery is pretty well worn out and the present low speed limit on the bridge is an effort to make the mechanism last as long as possible. Roger posed the problems which would arise if the bridge became inoperative and 28,000 cars per day had to be pushed over the Broadway - Lincoln street area. Since 1975 there have been 26 instances in which boats have hit the draw and the worry is that the next one may lnock it out for good. There have been many alternatives considered but it is generally agreed that a high level span is the best answer. Such a span would have cost 20 million in 1970 and now is up to 69 million and getting dearer every day. It is interesting to note that a tunnell would cost about double as much as a bridge. Roger is quite optimistic that we will have such a span and we should all get behind the project and push it every chance we get. There are many benefits to be gained not only to the two cities but to the whole area.

Portland and how important it is for all of us to get out and vote in favor of the several bond issues on Nevember 6. If any of these bond issues fail to pass it will be a sever set back to many of the ports future plans. There is Federal money available but it needs to have matching state funds which are provided through these bonds iddues. Dick commented on the progress already made around the port. The new Marina in Portland and another about to become a reality in South Portland, the revising of many zoning laws to permit an orderly development of the port as to resisences and fishing and commercial entities. There is under consideration an 8 million dollar condominium complex for the Knightville area. Peter Drivas is already building a steel fishing vessell at his facility and the Spring Point Marina is about to become a reality. Dick pointed out that the Pipe Line has dropped from 500,000 bbls a day down to 100,000 bbls a day . We need all the development we can get. It was interesting to note that as the harbor becomes cleaner from the clean up by the local sewerage plants the marine worms that have been unable to live in the past polution will now become a factor in destroying the docks along to waterfront. You gain on one side and lose on the other

Andy was congratulated on having a month of very fine programs. And rightly so.



MAKE UP NOTE: Scarborough is now meeting on Tuesday nights at Dick Murphy's place across from Scarborough Downs.


PROGRAM: Program chairman, Nick Pappas, inroduced Mrs. Mabeth Yowe.who is a graduate of Cassovia College in New York. Mabeth spent three years doing physical therapy work at the Maine Medical Center and became very interested in spinal cord injuries. She found that most paraplegics and quadraplegics were hustled out of the hospital as soon as insurance benefits passed. They were usually sent to instutions or homes where they practically vegetated. She realized they needed a lot of help and decided to do something about it. Mabeth went back to college and got her degree in Social Work in May, 1978. She is now involved in program called Independent Living which is designed to get these spinal cord injured off relief and into productive jobs. There are about 500 such cases in Maine who need help. These are mostly young men who have been injured in an automobile accident or from diving or gunshot wounds. This program tries to learn how much ability each person has left and what jobs he can expect to fill. Mabeth has received \$70,000 to get the program off the ground and has traveled widely to research methods and job options. Although Mabeth has been in the program only a short time she has already managed to get several local businesses interested in helping by assessing work programs and has recently placed her first man in a job. She expects to have two or three more placed in the next week or so. Tufts Univ. is of tremdous help in making prosthetic devices and in modifying machinery and equipment to fit these injured peoples abilities. Independent Living program needs community support. Talk it up when you can.

President Al announced that we are in the process of purchasing a used travel trailer to serve as a shack at the Christmas Tree Sale. Our old shack has about had it. Al also expressed the club's hearty thanks to Ted Wainwright for his great efforts in setting up, taking down, wiring and storing our old shack for all the years we have been in the tree business. PROGRAM: Program Chairman Nick Pappas introduced Bob Penty who gave us a Classification Talk on his duties at Haig International. Bob has a Masters degree from Cornell and a PHD from Lehigh. He is a materials engineer at Haig and works in developing new materials to meet the demands of the energy crisis. Apparently these materials must be such as to withstand extremely high temperatures to operate efficiently. Where metals have been previously used we now must shift to ceramics because of the intense heat. Bob showed several slides depicting devices used in heat transfer operations. These allow waste heat to be recovered and fed back to a furnace in order to cut down on the amount of fuel used to fire the device. These recovery units will pay for themselves in about a years time. Bob ventured the opinion that at \$25-30 a barrel for oil it becomes cost effective to convert coal to gasoline. It appears that this figure is just around the corner now. As we always find, this classification talk was a real good one.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Jim Doughty, introduced Lee Allen who is the chairman of the Maine Highway Safety Committee Lee is only 5 feet 2 but she gave us a real, hard hitting message about the drinking driver on our Maine highways, and the efforts of the authorities to combat this problem. In Sept of this year a new law went into effect which mandates a fine of 250 to 1,000 on conviction of operating under the influence plus a 30 day license suspension (6 months if personal injury is invloved) on the first offense, automatic 6 months suspension on 2nd offense and 2 years for 3rd. Also a driver must complete a driver ed. program before his license may be restores. Lee cited statistics showing that of the 242 deaths on Maine highways in 1978 60% involved liquor. Also the increasing incidence of young women- homemakers who are driving drunk in the daytime. Some of the problems in combatting the drinking driver are crowded court dockets and plea bargaining. It is reassuring to see in the newspapers that the courts are now hitting these drivers with large fines and also jail terms. Remember, 12 oz beer or 8 oz wine or 1 oz of whiskey are the same in their intoxicating effect and it takes a 175 pound person an hour to burn off this amount of alcohol.



PROGRAM: Jim Doughty introduced Bill Cullinan who is no stranger to most of us. Bill is consultant on the expansion of the Portland Airport. He had two floor plans showing what the end result will be. The present airport has 24,000 square feet and the new will have 88,000. The need results from the tremendous increase in passenger loadings in the last ten years (220,000 in 1977) and also the security needs. The first phase, the new baggage section, is almost complete and cost 1.3 million. Phase 2, the expansion of the terminal proper will start in January with completion scheduled for March 1981 at a cost of 4.6 million. The terminal will be on 2 levels and will grow to 600 feet in length. The garage across the street has already had its cement poured and will have the superstructure put in place in the spring at a cost of 1 million. I have listed the costs and point out that no local tax money will be spent in the construction. The local funds will come from the sale of bonds which will be retired with money received from leases of facilities at the airport. The Federal share which is less than 50% will come from user taxes. Should be great when completed.


