

NEWEST MEMBER: Pres. Al informally introduced our newest member, Miles Potter, cock, who resides on Fowler Road in the Cape. He will be formally introduced by his sponsor at a later date. Welcome aboard, Miles.

TREE TRADER: Apparently Nick Pappas has expanded from trading in securities to trading in Christmas Trees. He took, in trade, a tree which had been bought at another lot and allowed the buyer \$6 toward a \$15 tree. He then marked the trade in at \$9 and Sam Giftos sold it.

PROGRAM: Program chairman, Dave Hitchcock, introduced Bob Woodbury, who is the new president of the University of Southern Maine. Bob's credentials include a PHD from Yale and a long experience in college teaching and administration. He feels that a college president has three main functions. The first is to provide football for the alumnae, the second to provide parking for the faculty, the third to provide sex for the students. Bob discussed the changing student of the eighties. In the sixties and seventies we saw the college student as one from 18 to 22 years, full time. Now, as the baby boom is subsiding, we find a distinct change in the make up of the student mix in our colleges. Many now are working women who are divorced, have several children, are career girls and need a B A in subjects such as Social Welfare. More and more programs are being developed for groups of people with similar needs and backgrounds such as those in Medical fields and Urban Renewal. Many people are interested in updating their education to meet the needs of today's businesses, professions and society. He feels that the schools which meet these needs will be the ones to survive the dropping college age young people. Bob says that this drop in young people will approach 25% by the year 2000.

Maine ranks 50th in the number of high school students who go on to college and Bob feels that many of the people who do not go one to college will, in later life, feel the need of higher education and be locking for programs to suit their needs. The University of So. Maine now has 8,000students of which 4,000 are full time and another 4,000 part time. Interesting to note, Bob says that by year 2,000 half the people in this country will be 50 years of age or older.

PROGRAM FOR JAN. 9: Robert Porteous will present a program on the Portland Museum and the exciting developments in its future. Should be a good one.


January is a month with five Wednesdays so we will have a Ladies Night on January 30. Gramps Nye will be our entertainment for the evening.

Bob is an old hand at fund raising and commented on what a great group of people live in the greater Portland area. They have always strongly supported community betterment. We have only to look at the downtown Portland area and the new library to see this.

The expansion program for the Museum began in 1978 when Charles Payson who is 81 years of age, donated to the Museum 17 Winslow Homer paintings which have a total value in excess of 6 million dollars. The new building will have a permanent exhibit of Maine Art as well as many, many other features. There will be a 200 seat auditorium and meeting room for lectures and film programs. Traveling exhibits from around the country and the world will be featured. An imteresting side light will be the classes for school children from all grades. With the money crunch of today we are seeing the art programs being cut from the school budgets so the Museum will help fill this void in the childrens' education. Bob says that the new Museum will increase tourist business in the area by ten per cent. We can certainly stand that. Bob finished his presentation by showing a film which gave us an idea of how the new building will look from various angles around Congress Square. This is a fine addition to the area and surely we should do anything we can to assist the program.

## LADIES NIGHT IS JAN. 30

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Dave Hitchcock, introduced Charles Craigin. Charlie was a candidate for Governor in 1978 and was chosen as Maine's Outstanding man in 1975. Charlie was fortunate in having an opportunity to visit China with a group of young politicians and gave us his impressions of that country. His first impression came on his ride on a China Airline plane which was piloted by a converted MIG fighter pilot and was without any of the genteel niceties we have come to expect on such flights. The pilot started down the runway almost before the doors were closed and gave then a real terrifying ride to Peking. He commented on the fine hospitality of the people and the excellent food. The Chinese have no idea as to U. S. geography. Many think New York and Los Angeles are very close to one another. The primary transport in China is a black bicycle for which one must pay cash and wait six months to obtain. Charlie attended a function where there were 40,000 people who had parked their bicycles in a lot and he was amazed that they were able to find their own bike and clear the area in about ten minutes. Chinese economy is strictly a cash one. It has total wage and price controll with much rationing. One must give a ration coupon for one third of a bar of soap. Factory workers receive \$40 per month, doctors \$150 and lawyers \$70 and there are very few lawyers. Women receive a 56 day post natal vacation and must report for work on, the 57th day. Living quarters are provided with three families of five sharing a unit. Each family has a room 12 X 12 to itself but all three must share on small kitchen and one bath. Rent is \$5 per month with no heat or hot water provided. Food costs 10 to 12 per month. With all this the Chinese manage to save approximatelt 25% of their wages. The society is very well organized with everyone working at some job. Very interesting program.



## ATTENDANCE 46


Pres. Al announced that our attendance for December put us in 19th place in the district with a percentage of 84.44. This is an improvement but we can do better. Also announced that the Rotary Foundation Scholarship screening will take place on April 25-26 in Waterville.

PROGRAM: Program chairman, Dave Hitchcock, introduced Kilt Andrew who spoke to us on the L. L. Bean Co. in Freeport. Kilt started his talk by telling us that, in his youth, he used L. L. Bean Co. for a cheap date. He would take a girl out there and browse around the store and wind up the evening by buying a pizza. Leon Leonwood Bean in 1911 invented the now famous leather top rubber hunting boot and started a mail order business. Such businesses were viewed with suspicion in those days so Mr. Bean offered an unconditional guarantee and backed it up. The retail store service began in the 30s when people were allowed to stroll about the factory and make purchases. In 1951 the store began to remain open for 24 hours a day, 365 days per year and has been such ever since. The success of the operation was still based on Value, Service and Guarantee. Mr. Bean died in 1967 at the age of 94 and was succeeded by his grandson, Leon Gorman. It was in 1967 that an NBC crew filmed the operation for TV and the comment was made that the company was a combination of grandma's attic and a roller coaster. Under Mr. Gorman's guidance the company has grown from 42 million in 1967 to an estimated 91 million in sales for 1979. The basic philosophy still remains solidly conservative to give good merchandise at a reasonable profit and treat customers as human beings. Interesting to note that L. L. Bean rebuilds each year 10,000 pairs of their hunting boots. A most interesting program.







He is a graduate of the University of Colorado and has graduate degree from Columbia. Jim comes to us after service in Illinois, Nevada, New Mexico and Colorado. The Council consists of representatives from 16 towns and cities in Cumberland County. These representatives are elected officials of the towns and, and, as such, they are better able to render decisions than appointees might. The Council has a staff of 14 people with expertise in such areas as water quality, waste disposal, land use, zoning, housing proposals, law enforcement, and port planning. This staff enables small communities to take advantage of services which they might otherwise be unable to afford. Many of the towns find that they save enough on buying winter salt through the Council to pay their annual assessments. The Council also provides help in obtaining much Federal money and planning assistance for the towns. Jim feels that, as the energy crunch becomes worse, there is a good possibility that we may be able to have railpassenger service from Portland to Boston. With the price of gas apparently going up to the \$2.00 level this might be advantageous to us all.



She researches both sides of each question to prepare her report. She recently took a car with one bad spark plug wire to ten service stations from Kennebunk to Augusta and found five that took care of the problem properly and five who did excess work. She has recently been checking a mail order offer of an emerald for \$5.00. She ordered one and had it appraised by a jeweler who said it was a piece of green rock and worth nothing. Joanne is now working on new Landlord-Tenant laws which are in the legislation in Augusta as well as many energy related problems. A very interesting program.



## ATTENDANCE 31

ROTARY 75: Ron Palmquist read an article from the local paper written by Bill Caldwell which detailed the involvement of a man named Hiram Shorey, a tailor from Litchfield, Maine, who was one of the four original founders of Rotary in Chicago seventy five years ago. He was the first Rotary Secretary. There seems to be very little information about this man but we are all happy that he was involved in Rotary's foundation and are proud that he was a Maine native.

PROGRAM: John Henchy introduced our own Rob Kilroy who spoke to us about President Titao of Yugoslavia and the history of his strong hold on that central Europian country. Rob earned his Masters degree in London and his thesis was on the economy of eastern Europe. Yugoslavia has a mountainous terrain which lends itself to guerilla fighting. It is made up of seven nationalities and was formed at the end of World War I. Being so young it has very little national history. From 1945 to 1948 Tito established himself as dictator and ruled strongly and rather well. Tito served in the Austro Hungarian army and was captured in Russia. He served in the Russian revolution on the Communist side. He returned to Yugoslavia in 1924 and was jailed for five years for Communist activities. During world war II when Germany over ran his country Tito was a strong man in the guerilla movement and by 1944 had over 800,000 troops. The Casa Blanca conference recognized that Tito was the power in Yugoslavia and that Stalin could not control him. At the end of WW II Russia tried hard to keep Yugoslavia under its control but did not deliver promised economic aid and Tito was forced to turn to the West resulting in the 1948 break with Russia. Rob feels that, on tito's death power will be distributed to seven men, one from each of the seven nationalities. It will be interestin to watch the developments from this part of the world. Very interesting program.

NOTE: Sometime in April we will be making a new printing of the back cover of our Club Bulletin. Will you please check you listing to see if the on-formation is correct. Notify Bob Carson of any changes. We know that there are a few ommissions and these will be corrected.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Ed Theriault, introduced Neal Allen III who is the director of the Portland Regional Solid Waste Disposal Unit. "Regional Waste Systems' is an outgrowth of the Greater Portland Council of Governments but is maintained as a separate corporation. It is funded by the communities of Portland, So. Portland, Scarborough and Cape Elizabeth whose solid waste materials are hauled to the baler where they are compressed into heavy bales which measure 3 by 3 by 4 feet and weigh from a ton to latons each. These are hauled to a landfill site in Scarborough and promptly covered with fill. The site is an old sand pit which has a liner of a plastic material which prevents the leach from contaminating the soil and which is drained by pipes and collected and periodically sent to the Portland Sewer Treatment plant for disposal. The baler has resulted in the closing of all burning dumps in the communities. In its initial phases the operation had many pains of growth which were well publicized in the newspapers but for the last fourteen months has operated very smoothly which fact has drawn no comment from the media. Neal feels that the system is operating far below its potential and thus the cost per bale is running higher than original estimates. With the view to increase the effienct five towns in York County will soon be sending their solid waste to the unit which will reduce the per bale cost. Even with running below capacity the operation has been returning some money each year to the participatin towns. The baler itself is a very sophisticated piece of machinery standing about forty feet high and which needs much maintainance. Neal thinks that the Scarborough fill area will be adequate for about twenty years. He looks forward to the possibility of selling some of the waste to private companies for use in generating their heat requirements which will lessen the amounts to be buried and also recover some of the operation's cost. Neal feels that there is not enough local volume of waste to permit the separation of metal and paper etc. as well as the generation of steam. It would take a much larger community such as Los Angeles to make this type of operation pay. Very good program.





PROGRAM: Program Chairman Ed Theriault introduced Ed Langlois. Ed is a South Portland resident, a graduate of Maine Maritime Academy in 1944, and who has been with the local Port Authority since 1956. Ed commented that he is usually called the night before a speaking task when no one else can be found but that this time Ed contacted him last August, checked with him again in December, and called him 5 times in the last ten days. Ed gave us some details of the new fish pier which is coming to the port and for which an 18 million dollar bond has already been approved by the voters. This pier will cover 18 acres and give employment to some 2100 people. There will be a number of new births for unloading fish as well as facilities for processing, freezing and distributing fish products. It will cover the area of 5 present wharves and is due to start in September of this year. Ed also commented on the million dollar bridge situation and its replacement. A new bridge will permit the development of the area to the West of the bridge but the main need for the new bridge is safety both now and in later years. The present bridge has serious weaknesses in its structure and could easily be put out of commission from a slight accident. As we have heard there is a serious plan under way for a replacement and we all hope it comes soon. Ed also discussed the efforts to have a container facility in the Port of Portland. We recently lost a container contract to Portsmouth for lack of a place to unload these ships. This facility would cost from five to seven million dollars but should be well worth it. Good program.



According to the District Governor's letter our attendance record is making rapid progress but in the wrong direction. In Dec. we were 19th in the district, in Jan. we were 23rd and in March 30th. Let's reverse that record now.

## ATTENDANCE 3/19 42

PROGRAM: Ed Theriault introduced Ed McDuffie who is one of two Portland Harbor docking pilots. There are two sets of pilots in the harbor, one to bring the boats into the port and one to take the boats to their docks. Ed's father and grandfather before him were pilots and among them they have 150 years of docking experience. Ed has no sons and apparently his two daughters have no interest in the business. Maybe he can work out a 'son in law' type of deal. McDuffie Pilots use Moran Tow boats and have 18 to 23 boats a month to take through the draw bridge and back out to the harbor. They also dock 15 a month at the Pipelind and 5 at Chevron as well as a few at the State Pier. They also dock tankers at the Central Maine Power facility at Cousins Island. As the number increases cur light bill rises to pay for that oil. The largest ship to go through the draw was the Achiles in 1965. It has a width of 93.6 feet while the draw has a width of 95 feet. This left a space of 18 inches on either side if the pilot was dead center. Apparently it is not unusual to have a ship rub against the pilings of the draw and that causes much smoke and the always possibility of fire. The average weight of ships through the draw is 30, 000 tons and at the pipeline 120,000 tons. The channell is only 35 feet deep so it gets touchy to bring a 40 foot ship up the harbor. The tide must be just right. Also an empty ship must have proper ballast to make the trip out through the draw. Ed discussed the problems of stopping a ship in case the draw failed to open. If a ship hit the bridge we would all be in trouble for quite a while. In line with this, each of our last several speakers has pointed out the fact that the automobile traffic over the bridge is not slowing down at the draw and we could very easily face a situation where the bridge must be closed to all traffic. This would be a very congesting experience. Please slow down on that bridge.
