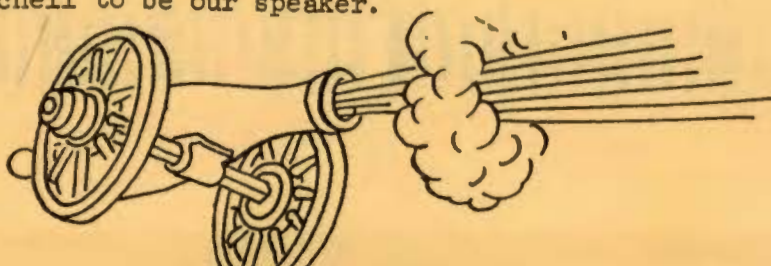

Pres. Bill announced that our own Harold Fralich has been appointed to the Nominating Committee to select Directors for Rotary International from the whole Eastern United States. Congratulations., Harold.

At our meeting on 7/8 we will hear a report from the group who were in attendance at the recent District Rotary Convention at the Balsams.

PROGRAM: Dan Gacetta introduced Senator George Mitchell. The Senator left a job as Federal Judge which was a lifetime one to enter the political arena which is precarious at best. He commented that he commanded much respect from everyone as a judge but as a Senator he finds very little as whatever decision he makes there is bound to be someone who disagrees, often very strongly. He said that a judgeship was a very dignified position whereas there is little dignity in the political arena.

The Senator explained the effects of the upcoming Tax Reduction package passed by the Senate and its effects on the business community.

The changes in business equipment depreciation is intended to help our industrial companies update their machinery in order to compete more strongly with Germany and Japan. In Germany and Japan 50% of their equipment is less than ten years old while, in the United States, only 28% of ours is that new.

Senator Mitchell said that his proposal to adjust the extent of Daylight Saving Time appears to have a good chance in the Senate, he is not so sure of its chances in the House.

The Senator thanked us for the pen which Prs. Bill gave him as a memento of his visit and said that he drinks coffee four times a day from the mug which we gave him the last time he spoke to the Club.

HINCKLEY PARK: After the regular meeting there was a discussion of the status of our position on the Hinckley Park issue regarding the changes in the plans from what was presented to us two years ago. It is the feeling of the group that we have committed our club to donate \$10,000 and we will stand by that commitment even though some changes have been made. We hope and will work for future development of that project.

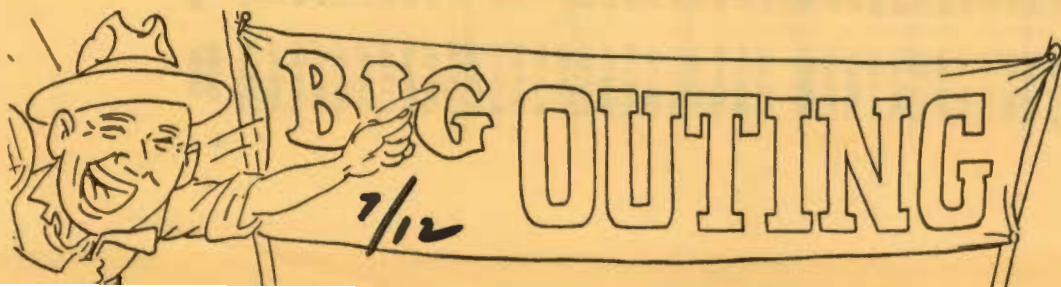
BOARD MEETING: At Bill Brown's home on July 14. Among subjects to be discussed will be the City Council's rejection of an exercise trail in Hinckley Park for which we donated \$10,000. There is some feeling in the Club that we no longer are committed to the project. The Board will report its findings to the Club.

PROGRAM: Carroll Beck introduced Clayton B. Clark whose hobby is Covered Bridges. He has an extensive collection of slides of these old structures from all over the country. Tonight he gave us a program on those in Maine and New Hampshire. These bridges were made of wood as it was plentiful and near at hand. There was a very practical reason for putting a roof over the bridges. Left open a bridge would deteriorate in 10 to 15 years while, with the cover, the structure would stand up for 50 to 75 years. The main idea was to protect the underpinning as the upper structure could easily be rebuilt. At one time Maine had about 160 covered bridges but now there are only ten left. New Hampshire has 62. Many of the old bridges have been washed down stream by storms and floods but have been fished out and returned to their former positions. Some of them were burned by sparks from trains and many were the victims of vandalism. There aren't many left today. Where would we be without the dedicated people who make a hobby of collecting photographs and facts about our State's and Country's past. Our thanks to you Mr. Clark.

LAST WEEK: (7/22) Meeting opened by V P Bill Brown; America by Tom Holden; Invocation by Visiting Rotarian Doug Jones; Songs by Rob Kilroy; Visiting Rotarians introduced by John Henchey.

ATTENDANCE 32

DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S VISIT will be the program for tonight, 7/29. Let's all make a special effort to be at this meeting. Jerry Fecteau is a member of the Quebec Cleub and will meet with the officers and board of our club before the regular meeting.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR: Program for 8/5 will be on office equipment, especially some of the new, amazing copiers.

Our annual outing at Two Lights State Park will be held August 19. Tell your wife to reserve that night.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Carroll Beck introduce State Trooper who has been on the force for 18 years. The first 14 years were on Patrol duty while the rest have been spent with the Inspection section. The first part of his talk dealt with the problems of the alcohol related accidents. In 1979 61% of the fatal accidents involved drinking drivers and in 1980 OUI arrests were up by 1500. In 1980, out of 10,000 OUI arrests, there were 75% convicted. It is interesting to note that the conviction rate drops off as the cases are tried from North to the Southern parts of the State. In York County the rate is only 60% while Cumberland is 70%, Somerset 85% and Penobscot 90%. It appears that the public attitude is more lenient in the more heavily populated area. On a Friday or Saturday night one of every 50 drivers is intoxicated. The typical offender is 20-29 years old and the accidents occur from 10 PM to 2 AM on week ends. In 203 accidents in 1980 there were 241 people killed and 81% of the drivers had an alcohol blood count of .17%. I doubt if I could even walk at that level.

The balance of the program was devoted to the Inspection program in which 1700 stations are supervised by only 9 State Troopers. He ran over the various parts of the car which are supposed to be inspected and the problems which may be encountered by the motorist. The State Police are trying to get the legislature to pass laws to outlaw the window coverings so popular today as these prevent an officer from seeing into a car when it is stopped and which offer a real possibility of danger to the officer in making an arrest. Also, the mirror type on the rear windows of many vans reflect the sunlight something fierce. If you feel strongly about this it would be a good idea to let your representative know how you feel. Having been a traveling salesman for many years, when I did not get what I thought to be a real good inspection, I took the car to another station. Interesting to note that the Troopers carry 357 Magnum revolvers loaded with hollow point bullets. This combination will really destroy anyone it hits. There wouldn't be much left.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Carroll Beck, introduced Philip D. Perrino who is with Locke Office Products on Route 1 in Falmouth. The company has branches in Augusta, Bangor and Portsmouth, N. H. Although the company used to be suppliers of various office supplies and equipment, they now specialize in office copiers exclusively. Phil described to us how these copiers have changed in the last 25 years. The early ones were slow, cumbersome, needed special paper and were very expensive. They have now come to using any paper of any color and are much lighter and less expensive to own and to use. Phil had one set up in the room which reduced his calling card down to postage stamp size and also enlarged it up to 11" X 17". It also is able to copy on both sides of a piece of paper.

Phil advised us as to what criteria to use if we are looking to buy a copier. There are many things to consider. How many copies per month, whether to buy or lease with purchase option and many other pitfalls. It appears that it would be a good idea to call in someone with knowledge of the machine and get expert advice. Your editor finds office machines a fascinating area and enjoyed the program very much.

The Group Home is longer term. Youngsters stay up to 18 years of age. There are strict rules and the boys are encouraged to work and get an education. Of late, a Community Care Program has been started, which provides Foster Parent Care.

Thanks to the many visitors helping the attendance reach "31". Where is everyone? Why not make it a point to come next week. The largest attendance recorded by your new reporter has been "31".

Paul Butler introduced Elizabeth Berry as our guest speaker. Mrs. Berry spoke to us in 1978 on "Campfire Girls". At that time our club contributed \$1,000 to help kick off a program at Redbank in South Portland. It made us proud to hear the results of this program that we contributed to. Now, four years later, it is going strong. It is called "Campfire" because it now consists of 40% boys. United Way lands 50% of the budget. Originally started out with the 4th - 6th graders at Redbank because of the large delinquency rate, today it is down to 1%. A Community Building has been leased. Some of the means for raising funds for special purpose trips are accomplished by the kids themselves. The Program has expanded to include a nursery for 3-4 year olds. Currently limited to 20 children, some of the originals, now in the 8th grade, continue coming back. They employ a full-time director, full-time assistant, and part-time nursery school director. Balance made up of volunteers, primarily from the University. Kids are taken on free local trips, with trips to Boston, Bar Harbor, etc. at nominal charges. Program is in full swing for the entire day during the summer. Recent tax cuts have taken away about \$16,000 per year, which must be raised. To accomplish this task, weekly bingo has been started. Outlay of \$35.00 was used for the investment in Bingo equipment and tables/chairs. We have been asked once again to provide whatever assistance we can. Also, Mrs. Berry asked if anyone could locate a safe for their building.

Attendance: 40 members - increasing the previous high of 31 recorded by this reporter. Our club has been averaging 76%. Lets make an effort!!! Also, are you one of the 12 who have not paid your dues?

Bill York introduced our newest member, Jim Fergusson - Welcome; read a "Thank You" letter from the First Congregational Church for the \$150.00 donation to Camperships; requested directors to submit budget items; announced the raffle for the "Purchase Prize" painting will be held in March '82.

Dave Hitchcock displayed his new look - no beard.

Charles Frizzle, Manager of Nuclear Support at Maine Yankee was our speaker. Subject was nuclear power's role of the future. Was the Three Mile Island incident the beginning of the End? He did not think so. Plants are designed to handle traumatic events. What happened at Three Mile Island plant was not considered major by the industry. Rather, we should look at what went right. No public health or safety problem resulted. Average radiation exposure was miniscule. One is exposed to the same amount of radiation visiting Denver for 2 weeks, due to the high altitude. The incident will make us better off than had it not happened, because of what we learned.

No new plants being built today, because the high costs demand has leveled off, and the regulatory requirements. Not so in other parts of the world - Russia, France, U.K. It now would take 14 years from start to finish compared to 6 years when Maine Yankee was built. It now costs less than 2¢ per kilowatt hour compared to 6¢ - 7¢ by oil. Only alternatives to oil today are coal or nuclear power. Hydro-electricity is being explored. CMP is spending \$31 million at Brunswick - Topsham. It will produce 12 mega-watts. It would take 70 times that to equal Maine Yankee.

Talk was most informative.
