This was the last meeting for Jim Moore. His company is transferring him to New York State. Jim told us that he has qualified to run in the Boston Marathon on April 19. Jim says there are some 8,000 entries and it takes 10 minutes for those back in the pack to reach the starting line. We will be watching the TV coverage to see if we can spot Jim. ROTARY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP. Committee chairman, Doug Stewart, reported that the committee which includes Jim Ferguson and John Bjerklie, had sent out 30 notices concerning the scholarships to former students of So. Portland and Cape Elizabeth High Schools and to other organizations and institutions which would have qualifying applicants. About a dozen people expressed an interest. The committee recommended Margaret Kane, who is a sophomore at Smith College majoring in psychology, as our Club's candidate for the undergraduate scholarship.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Mike Park, introduced Mz. Rhoda Nute who is a native of New Hampshire and has worked for Y W C A all the way from Seattle to Boston, and who is now with the Cumberland-York Senior Citizens. Rhoda gave us a run down on the services which this group provides for the elderly people of the area. Their major program provides hot meals every day for the many people who would not otherwise get proper nutrition. These meals are provided at 18 meal sites where those who are able to get around are served. For those who can not get out, the meals are taken to them by a "Meals on Wheels" program. The group has a central kitchen in Saco where all 900 meals are prepared each day and moved to the various sites.

The group is also training older volunteers in an "Outreach" program which seeks to steer senior citizens to the proper places to receive needed services. They maintain an Elder Center on Congress St. in Portland to serve the many elderly in that area. Most of Portland's elderly live in 1 and 2 room apartments in an area from High to State St and Danforth to Park Ave.

Rhoda is mainly concerned with trying to get older volunteers for the group. These volunteers serve as tutors at the Youth Center and at Little Brothers where they try to help young people get back on the track. The average of volunteers is 75. Rhoda says that most people who retire are not interested in volunteering for a year or two until they find that their retirement has become very boring. The volunteer work takes up their minds and gives them a feeling of usefulness. Interesting program.

Harold Fralich announced that there were 27 candidates interviewed for the International Scholarship. Margaret Kane, sponsored by our club came in fourth for the two scholarships awarded.

Bill Brown announced that our club is exploring the possibility of sponsoring a function at the 350th Celebration to be held at Fort Williams Park on July 10th. Proceeds will be retained by our club. More to come later.

Our speaker for the evening was Gordon Weil, Director of Energy Resources for Maine. Mr. Weil feels that energy prices will not go down further, but will in fact go up at a moderate rate. We should not relax our efforts for conservation or energy exploration. "The time to fix the roof is when the sun is shining, not when it is raining." Federal government is considering a tax increase on fuel or a BTU tax. This is not popular and will meet with resistance. Most likely we will see a gas tax increase. Maine is fortunate to recognize a need for O.E.R. and in spite of a reduction in federal funding, we have a very active agency. The emphasis is to encourage energy conservation. There have been 78 of 126 policies adopted, saving millions within the state. Examples are loan programs for energy projects, coordinating home audits through CMP and Bangor Hydro.

Next week's speaker is Robert J. Cole, show producer, president and founder of American Show Producers, Inc., Northeast Trade Shows, Inc. and Dockside Productions, Inc. He will also be assisted by Bob Thompson and Bob Soucy, co-owners of Spring Point, and they will be there to comment on Mr. Cole's lease at this marina and the potential that it possesses with relationship to Marine Development on Casco Bay.

Our speaker was State Representative Sherry Huber, who is a republican candidate for Governor. Mrs. Huber is married to a state senator and has five children, and resides in Falmouth. She serves on a number of committees in the House in addition to participating in many civic organizations. To say she is most active would be an understatement. Mrs. Huber emphasized her talk on Maine Economics, pointing out that we are the 48th state in per capita income, but pointing to the fact that many people accept less to live here. There must be something positive about that fact. Elaborating on some positive points and offering suggestions for improvement, she cited that the productivity and reliability of Maine people is well known; that we have many renewable resources such as marine resources, agricultural resources, wood resources, and an abundance of water. She encourages a better business climate to encourage growth, such as incentives for business to build or expand; to increase jobs, regardless of the size business; strengthen local efforts such as Portland for BIW; encourage education and business to work more closely. We should have institutional reform such as changing the workers compensation law, which has Environmental Protection. Although the environmental laws are adequate we need better administration.

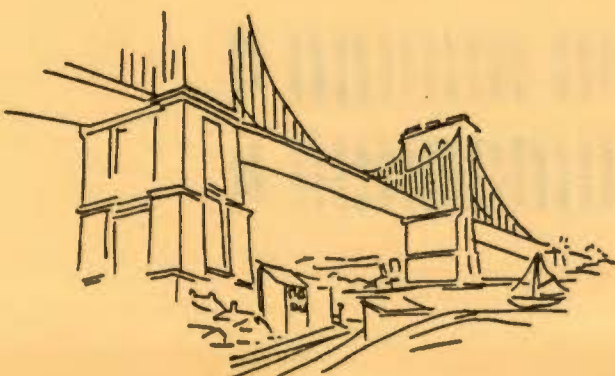
LAST WEEK: (6/2) Meeting opened by Pres. Bill York; America by Jim Ferguson; Invocation by Ernest Case; Visiting Rotarians introduced by Bill Brown; Songs by Nick Pappas (very nice I might add).

If you are planning to attend the Rotary District Convention, get in touch with Bill York for reservation forms. We understand that Bill York ran the Kennebunk Marathon on May 30 in 3 hours and 17 minutes. Very respectable.

Notice was made of Warren Simpson's being the new head of the Maine Commandery. It was nice to see Warren in attendance in view of the fact that he must run all over the State in his new capacity. He was wearing his Rotary neck tie as well.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Dick Yerxa, introduced David Amerin who spoke to us on the new bulk cargo pier which Merrill Industries has constructed at the West end of Commercial Street in Portland. This pier was the brainchild of Paul Merrill but was constructed under the supervision of Paul's son P. D. Merrill who took it over in 1979 and, after getting the necessary permits, got construction under way in 1981. The area had to be filled with several layers of gravel with membranes between each layer. Thousands of wicks have been inserted down through the sand to relieve the water pressure. These wicks go down 90 feet. The pier itself is on concrete posts which go down to the bed rock. The water is deep enough to handle any ship that can come through the draw bridge, about 35 feet. The main section is designed to handle bulk cargos of coal, scrap iron, fertilizer etc. There is another section to handle containerized cargo. The prime customer for bulk coal is the S. D. Warren mill in Westbrook but Merrill has already obtained a number of other users of coal such as school systems who find the use of soft coal to have large savings over oil. This coal comes in on barges which are 350 feet long and carry 10,000 tos. Merrill has 48 hours to unload each barge after which they must pay demurrage charges of \$6,000 per day. They unloaded their first barge in mid winter and it took 120 hours. They now have the time down to 46 hours. The unloading crane has a scoop which picks up 7 tons of coal at a time. The soft coal must be compacted as it is piled to prevent spontaneous combustion. Merrill is getting into the residential coal supply business as well. They were surprised and pleased to handle 130 cars of this in their first year and expect to triple that in their second year. This was a very interesting program and the facility is a most welcome one for the Portland waterfront.

One of the visiting Rotarians was Frank Urrvela from Guatemala, who is no stranger to our club. Frank will be here for a few months and, tentatively, he is scheduled to speak at our next meeting.

Our speaker for the evening was Dr. Victor Skorapa, a Radiologist at the V.A. hospital in Togus. Dr. Skorapa spoke on the dangers of the continuing arms race, and the affects of a nuclear war. In a full scale attack on the United States, it is estimated that 45 million to 160 million would get killed. This compares to 11 million Americans to die in all wars starting with the Civil War. Dr. Skorapa showed a film "The Final Epidemic" depicting the devastating affects of a Nuclear War. With only 15 minutes warning, about all we could do is trigger off retalatory warheads. Yet we talk of an evacuation plan that would take 8 days. It certainly would be a "No Win" situation. Why build more? We currently have enough weapons to destroy anything living. Even the stockpile of the smallest nuclear power could do imperable damage. I might add this movie was not pleasant, but one everyone should see. There is no survival.
