By 1930 it was world wide and, by 1955, it was operating in 89 countries. Today we have 985,000 members in 154 lands around the world.

The program stressed that Rotary is only as good as its members and we all must give "Service Above Self" in the four avenues of Rotary.

The Rotary Foundation each year sends hundreds of young people to study in foreign lands and these people are goodwill ambasssdors who help to spread peace abroad and who give us some insight to the lands where they have spent their year of study when they return.

LAST WEEK: (10/20) Meeting opened by Jim Doughty; America by Ed. Theriault; Invocation by Ralph Miller; Songs by Bill York assisted by his daughter Joanna; Visiting Rotarians introduced by Bob Carson.

Dave Bagdasarian reported that, during the recent Blood Drive, 7 members of our club showed up to donate.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Ed Corson, introduced Frank Morong who is Mayor of the City of South Portland and Chairman of the City Council. Frank was born in Massachussets but moved to So. Portland at an early age. He is a graduate of So. Portland High School and has earned his B S, MS, and Doctorate at the Univ. of Maine. Frank taught for seven years and is now at So. Maine Voc. Tech. Inst. as Chairman of the Social Sciences Dept. While Frank is not a Rotarian he likes our tenets and the aims of Rotary. He thanked our club for its contribution of \$10,000 which got the Hinckley Park project off the ground. He reports that the work on the two dams at the park is now finished and that the trails are being dressed. If you haven't done so recently, you might profit from a walk through the park. Frank also commented on the Spring Point Walkway which is now about completed. This is a mile long walkway from Spring Point through SMVTI and over to Willard Beach. Ten years ago this shoreline area was inaccessible to the public. A great addition to the city. Another walk you might take.

Frank also reported on a "Well Employee" program which the city has put in place. In this program the employee is "stress screened" and then given a 12 week program of exercises followed by training in stress management and diet counciling. If an employee completes the program his net cost is only \$15. The program is targeted for 100 employees this year. Fine idea.

Frank commented on the recently completed Ferry Village project in which some \$450,000 of Federal money was spent for sewers, lights, trees and parks. Delapidated housing in the area is now down to 18%. A new Knightville project is just getting under way with a first year grant of \$260,000. Frank feels that the Knightville area will be the hub of the city for the next 15 years. A lot will depend on when, where and how the new bridge is constructed. The property valuation of the city is up some \$30 million this year and the Nov. referendum on the C I P of \$550,000 is the lowest in the last ten years.

The Maine Mall expansion, when completed, will have a floor space of 25 acres with 119 stores. There is a serious problem in the Clarks Pond area. The natural watershed of the whole area is through the pond and if this is not facilitated, all that water will have to go through the sewer system and the treatment plant. Much cheaper to let it run off naturally. Good program.

LAST WEEK: (10/27) Meeting opened by Pres. Bill; America by Bob Doe; Invocation by Carroll Beck; Visiting Rotarians introduced by John Henchey; Songs by Sam Giftos with a most welcome assist at the piano from Cleo King who was making up with us.

Pres. Bill read a letter of thanks from the City of So. Portland for our donation of \$1500 to provide Christmas Lights in Mill Creek Park. These will be along Ocean Street from Broadway to Hinckley Drive. These should be very pretty and also will not hurt our own Christmas Tree Sale.

BOARD MEETING: At 5 P M at Jim Doughty's office, November 4.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Jim Doughty, introduced Chris Simons who has been involved with Workman's Compensation for 15 years as an insurance underwriter. Under Maine's law workmen who are injured on the job receive the third highest benefits in the country. He gets 2/3 of his pay to a maximum of \$396.47 and it is tax free. He also has all medicals bills paid. This goes on for as long as he lives and may also continue for his widow and children. One man permanently disabled for 30 years received 1,269,000. Because of the high benefits Maine, premiums are extremely high and will rise another 25% late this year. Chris says that the insurance companies really need an increase of 100% to meet the problems they have in Maine. There are moves in Maine to reform the law but the labor forces fight these strongly and have much influence in Augusta. Change must come but it will be very slow. The state of Florida is the only one in the country to have made successful reform and it took five years to do it. At present the insurance companies are paying out \$135 for each \$100 they receive in premiums. Chris feels that this situation keeps new business from relocating to Maine far more than the energy costs. A very sobering program. This is something which we should push with our legislators.

ANNUAL CHRISTMAS MEETING: Bill York, Bill Stanton, and Duane Rancourt who are in charge, are going to try a new system of recruiting our guests. Instead of going to the nurses association in the two towns, they suggest that each Rotarian in the Club invite one or two people who, in his opinion, would enjoy such a party. The trees are costing us an extra 50¢ per tree this year but we are planning to eat this increase and maintain last year's prices. The first work day will be on Saturday, 11/20. This will be to set up the lot with racks etc. John will have the material at the lot by 9 AM. If we have a good crew on hand, the whole task should be over and done well before noon. The first load of trees will arrive on Friday, 11/26. This is the day after Thanksgiving. We will need all the help we can get for this. John is negotiating with the Boy Scouts to give us a hand as last year. He will have tags etc. so the set up should go smoothly. Members present signed up for sales slots and, if you were not present, you will have a chance this next meeting. You will hear much more as the month wears on.

A Navy veteran of WW I, a successful business man in the community for many years, a Rotarian for 47 years with 37 years of perfect attendance. Ray was the founder of our club as well as the club in Kennebunk-Wells. He was Secretary of our club for many years before becoming President. He served as Secretary of District 779 during the time Harold Fralich was District Governor. Ray was our first Paul Harris Fellow. Ray would have been 90 years of age on Nov. 15. He always more than fullfilled his duties at the Christmas Tree Sale and we will all miss his lusty leading of the Railroad Song. Truly a fine man.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Peter Drivas, introduced Evan Richert who was formerly So. Portland City Planner and who is now Treasurer of Marketing Decisions Corp. Evan is Chairman of the So. Portland Community Development Advisory Committee which is involved in the Ferry Village Improvement movement. This program is now winding down after four years work by a group of people including business people, residents and city government. It has been a fine effort and the results are very evident if you will drive through the area. Homes have been brought up to standard, and repairs to streets, sewers and sidewalks have been made with no municipal tax money being spent. The group operates under the Federal Neighborhood Housing Services program and is the only one in Northern New England. The program is now expanding to do a similar job in the Knightville area with a grant of some \$260,000. Experience in the Ferry Village program shows that, for every grant dollar spent, three private dollars are generated. You will be hearing much more of this effort as the months pass.



CHRISTMAS TREES: By the time you read this the lot should be all set up and ready to receive the first load of trees which will arrive the day after the Thanksgiving holiday at 8 AM. The Boy Scouts will be on hand to help and you might as well come down and work off some of the turkey dinner. The second load will arrive on Dec. 9 at 3 PM. John Henchey gave work schedules to all who were present at the meeting. If you do not have one, see John. There will also be a large copy posted in the trailer. Remember, if you cannot fill your time slot, it is up to you to get a replacement.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Phil Dube, introduced Jean Smith who is the coordinator for Southern Maine for the Foster Grandparents Program. Jean, who has been with the program for six years, showed us some slides and told us how the program operates. The Foster Grandparents are older people from the lower income sector who are screened and trained to work with small children in various institutions. Most of these kids have some handicap ranging from very minor ones up to terminal illnesses. Some programs in this area are at the Maine Medical Center, Youth Training Center and Pineland. The Parents spend three or four hours a day with the kids and many of the youngsters are able to leave the institutions at an earlier date as a result of this kind of attention. In the South Portland Program there are fourteen people and Jean had one of them, Agnes Bennett, tell us of her experiences in working at the Medical Center in the Pediatrics section where she spends three to four hours a day with kids who are undergoing treatment for cancer. She tries to make the ordeal a little easier for them. The Program is funded by a mix of Federal, State, and private money. The administration takes 23% with the remaining 77% going to the grandparents as a stipend. The budget for 1983 is \$238,000 and is a tight one. The program obviously is great for the kids but it also gives the elderly people a feeling of being needed and a sense of satisfaction in helping others as well as supplemental income. Everyone is a winner.

LAST WEEK: (11/24) Meeting opened by Pres. Bill Brown; America by Harold Fralich; Invocation by Ralph Miller; Visiting Rotarians introduced by Bill Brown who also introduced his two sons present as his guests and who were fortunate to receive two tickets to the evening's Maine Mariner hockey game from Sam Giftos; Singing was conspicuous by its absence.

NEW MEMBER: Sam Giftos introduced our newest member, Ron Stewart. Ron is not really a "new" member but rather and old one who has returned to the fold. Ron's association with Rotary goes back a long way. He is a Past President of the Madawaska Club and a former member of our club. When he left city government he resigned from our club and joined the one out in Westbrook. His business is now such that he can return to us. Welcome aboard, again, Ron.

PROGRAM: Pres. Bill introduced our own Jim Ferguson who gave us a Classification talk on the advantages of converting our automobiles to run on compressed natural gas rather than on gasoline. His presentation included a video tape which was a sales pitch by a company which makes the conversion kits and compressors. He also fielded questions. Jim has converted his personal car to run on natural gas. He has two tanks in the trunk of his car which hold enough fuel to travel about 150 miles per filling. These can be refilled by fast charging in about five minutes. The use of the natural gas shows a saving of about 60¢ per gallon of gasoline. Other advantages include the fact that the natural gas does not pollute the air we breath and also lowers maintainance costs and allows the engine to last up to three time as long as when gasoline is used. The gas is methane and is generated at landfill dumps, sewer treatment plants, fish waste plants and, more practically, from the gas lines of Northern Utilities. One can switch from one fuel to the other while driving along the highway with no interuption. Around the world there are about 5 million cars using methane and there have been no failure or accidents connected with its use. Jim cited a school system with 31 buseswhich is saving \$50,000 per year and which paid for its conversion in a bit over two years.
