

PROGRAM; This was our Club Assembly. Speaking of attendance, in November we fell to 46th place in the District with 71.67%. This is very poor. It appears that we will get up into the 80% range for December but we can surely do better than that.

John Henchey reported that our gross sales for trees was \$25,145, our cost of trees was \$16,450 which leaves a gross profit of some \$8,800. There are some other expenses to come out of this figure. We were short by about 250 trees which hurt as we were sold out very early. We did sell some 150 wild trees which added \$600 to our gross. John feels that we can easily sell 1900-2000 trees in 1983. For 1982 we will probably net about \$7,500. Our investment of \$1,500 in the Christmas lights in the Park was very well received by almost everyone. We plan to expand this in the coming year.

Ralph Miller reported that he has had 9 or 10 requests for information about this year's Rotary Foundation Scholarship.



Dave feels that the pendulum has swung too far toward the law breaker and should now start to swing the other way. We should do all we can to see that our laws are strengthened and enforced. It was interesting to note that Dave says that burglaries are down some 40% in Cumberland County in the past year.

We note the passing of Nick Pappas' father and extend our sympathies to Nick and his family. Mr. Pappas was well known in the Portland area and he touched the lives of many, many people over the years.

PROGRAM: Roger B. Wold of Kidder, Peabody & Co. spoke on "How Now the Dow". He noted that, on Friday August 13, the stock market exploded with trading amounting to 100 million shares which were worth over \$30 billion. This recent bull market is the first time that the Dow has gone over the 1000 mark when inflation was down and the economy very slack. 
LAST WEEK: (2/2) Meeting opened by Pres. Bill Brown; America by Bob Doe; Invocation by Dick Kennedy; Visiting Rotarians introduced by John Henchey; Songs by Jerry Paradis of the Scarborough club, which, as far as I know, is the first time we have called upon a visitor to perform. Jerry also introduced a comedy routine as well. Maybe we should do this more often.

Sce. Bob Carson has a new schedule of make up opportunities. If you need one, he has them available as you sign in.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Dick Jordan, introduced Roger Legere who has served on the committee for a new Portland-So. Portland bridge for the past 14 years. Roger had several pictures which shoe what the impact of a new bridge will be both on the Portland end and our end. The most favored plan would start above York St. on State and rise to 135 feet above water and descend just South of Waterman Drive at Broadway. All traffic in the Millcreek Triangle would become two way and would have easy access to the bridge from the Waterman Dr. area. The Bridge would exit Northbound traffic at the foot of High Street. This is the so called "High Level" one which would have a ship passage width of 200 feet in the center. This would allow all ships to pass easily to the upper harbor and would certainly cause much of the upstream land to be developed for any number of uses. Roger states that the grade of this bridge would be 5%. For comparison the Franklin St. Arterial is a 5% grade and both State St and High St are over 7%. Roger feels that such a bridge would cost in the area of \$70 million. He also says that there are estimates which go much higher than that. The various studies which address the transportation, environmental, economic and social impacts of the bridge are coming to completion and Roger feels that public hearings will be held later this year following which the Dept. of Transportation can make the final decisions. It now appears that construction can get under way late in 1984 or early 1985. The money spent on construction will generate 3 times as much in local businesses. Roger says that there are over 30,000 cars a day on the present bridge and, if it were to be closed, it would mean an additional cost to local commuters of some \$11 million to make the trip around to the Veterans bridge route. A most interesting program and an optimistic forecast. I certainly hope Roger is on target.

LAST WEEK: (2/9) Meeting opened by Pres. Bill Brown; America by Bill York; Invocation by Ernie Case; Visiting Rotarians introduced by Jim Doughty; Songs by Jim Ferguson with an assist from a "Stereo" Baton provided by Nick Pappas. The rendition of My Bonnie" was very good. Possibly the threat of the big stick helped.

PROGRAM: Dick Kennedy, Program Chairman, introduced Bill Alexander who is the Director of the So. Portland Public Library. Bill is an Army brat from the Carolinaarea who married a girl from Yarmouth, Me. whom he met when she was a student in a class he was teaching at Univ. of N. H. Bill is a graduate of Whittier College in L. A. whose claim to fame is that Richard Nixon is also a grad. Bill earned his Master in Library at Syracuse Univ. Bill gave us a few statistics. The Library has 72,900 volumes and 640 rolls of microfilm. It has 10,900 card holder. There are 9 full time and 12 part time employees as well as a substantial number of volunteers who are a big help. The budget for 1983 is \$240,000. There is a theft loss of some 400-500 books per year as well as some vandalism of books. Bill figures that each book costs \$20. With circulation growing at a rate of 10% per year Bill finds difficulty in handling the many manual tasks of a Library. He is in the process of trying to fund the purchase of a computer system which would free up some  $2\frac{1}{2}$  of his people to present new programs. The computer is one made by NCR which has a total cost of 23,000. Bill has already raised \$19,600 of this and is out beating the bushes to try to raise the balance. The City of So. Portland will fund the annual operating expenses after the computer is in place. Bill listed many of the short range advantages as well as those to come in the years to come. I hope our club can see its way clear to help. Incidently our club was responsible for the installation of the library's photo copy machine when we guaranteed the costs of the first years operation. It now stands on its own feet.


#### ATTENDANCE 33

Among our visitors was Jack Nicholson who is leaving Portland and the Civic Center for a new, unknownposition. Pres. Bill expressed the appreciation of all of us for a job well done by Jack and wished him success in his new venture. He will be missed.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Bill Kilroy, introduced Paul Aranson who is our new District Attorney. Paul is a Portland native, a graduate of Deering High School and Brandeis Univ. He received his Law Degree from the Univ. of Maine. Paul was in private practice for 5 years before running for his present position. Paul feels that he represents the people of Maine and has to consider many elements such as, the Police, victims of crime, defense attorneys, the courts, and the County Commissioners. He often finds himself in the middle in making his decisions as to how to handle a case. He feels strongly that there should be no "Plea Bargaining" for the professional criminal but also knows that plea bargaining is an integral part of the court system. The Superior Courts of Maine handle some 2,000 criminal cases per year. If a case goes to trial it requires an average of two days for handling which would allow only about 500 cases a year to be tried. The balance must be handled by some form of plea bargaining. The District Court system handles some 35,000 case per year. At present there is a delay of 6 to 8 months from the time a person is charged to the time of his trial. Hardly swift justice. Paul feels strongly about the rights of victims and is writing a manual for these people which includes information on how the court system works and what a witness may excect to find when he appears in court. Paul finds that people who are victims of violent crimes often need some kind of counseling proir to their appearance, especially the victims of rape. He feels that he should discuss with the victim the many reasons that he might opt for a plea bargain. He also favors restitution by criminals who are granted probation

In the question period which followed his talk, Paul expressed his belief that Maine's tough drunk driving law would slowly lose its effectiveness. He feels tha two days in jail is not a real detterant to a habitual drinker. If he is right, I hope something else can be found as the drunk driver is surely one of our biggest menaces on the highways.



John has developed his own ideas about life in Down East Maine and tried to impart his ideas to us with a series of amusing anecdotes some of which, I suspect, were a bit exagerated. 


#### ATTENDANCE 35

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Bill Kourakos, introduced Frank A. Chiaravalloti who is Senior Public Affairs Representative for Central Maine Power Co. Frank is a graduate of the Univ. of Hartford with a B. A. degree in Comm. & Broadcast Journalism. He joined CMP in 1981 after working several years in radio and acting as Exec. Director of Mid Maine United Way. He is a member of the Augusta Rotary Club and resides in Winthrop with his wife and daughter.

Frank spoke to us regarding the many changes in generating electricity over the past ten years, of dependancy on foreign oil and ways of reducing it. At present CMP produces 39% of its outputwith oil and is trying to lower that to 10% by 1992. Cousins Island is the only full time user of oil at present. CMP is working to add considerable hydro power and has already completed the plant at Topsham. There are some 14 other hydro plants which will be brought on line over the next ten years. The advent of surplus Canadian power is a big help and will continue to be for several years. This power is all hydro. Maine is buying some 6% of the Canadian surplus with the balance going to other users all over New England. Frank spoke of the many conservation measures CMP is offering. Users can have a CMP energy audit for a small fee and this can be implimented with a low or no cost loan to the user for such things as insulation etc. CMP is about to offer a kit for home owners to insulate their hot water heaters for a nomial 10-15 dollars. The past year has seen a growth at CMP of about 6%. This is mostly due to new customers. The company expects to see only a 2% growth annually over the next ten years. Our CMP bills are made up from two parts. One is "Base" costs and the other "Fuel" cost. Today they each make up about half our bills. CMP is producing power at Maine Yankee for 2¢ per KWH, the Canadian power costs 4-5¢ per KWH and oil produced power costs 6-7¢ per KWH. Having been a CMP customer for some 45 years, I think they have done a pretty good job in supplying the State with power at a reasonable cost. I own some of their stock and think I will hang onto to it for a while.

NEW MEMBER: Bill Stanton introduced our newest member who is Tim Whyte. Tim will be formally presented to the club at a later date.


The Portland Rotary Club is apparently still somewhat up in the air as to where they will be meeting. Their April 1 meeting will be at the downtown Holiday Inn.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Lloyd Knight, introduced Wayne Jackson, who is a forester for the S. D. Warren Co. Wayne works with some 860 "Tree Farm" families who supply S. D. Warren with its need for wood both for the paper making process and the new bio mass boiler which generates electricity. The boiler uses evry bit of the tree right down to the leaves. They have a storage reserve of about ten days for chips and are also able to burn coal. They have completely eliminated the burning of oil. They have a considerable excess of power which they sell to Central Maine Power Co.

Wayne says that 90% of the State of Maine is covered with timber. This makes us the most forested state in the union with New Hampshire in second place. The mix is about1/3 hard wood and 2/3 soft. Wayne works with the tree owners to help them get the most out of their woodlots by proper management. He showed us a series of slides demonstrating how growth can be increased in an overly thick lot by cutting a path through the trees. Apparently the trees' stomach is at the top and growth is increased when daylight can get to the lower portions of the tree. Wayne and his crew go through the lots and mark the trees to be harvested. On some occasions the whole lot is cut right down to the ground. A question as to the effect of this complete cutting on wild life was raised. Wayne says that, in two years or less, there is a growth of sprouts that wildlife finds delicious. He showed us the mechanical equipment used to harvest the trees. They now are untouched by human hands when they arrive at the mill. Wayne also spoke of some of the methods of fighting forest fires on the lots. Fine program.


PORTLAND ROTARY: The Portland Rotary Club will be meeting at the intown Holiday Inn on April 1, 8, 15, and 22.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Andy Mezoian, introduced Jeff Webster and Mike Holmes who are So. Portland fire fighters who are assigned to the So. Portland Fire Rescue unit. The two men outlined some of the intensive training which they must complete to serve on the unit and showed us two pieces of high tech radio equipment with which they are able to transmit to Portland hospitals EKGs and other vital information on the patients as they begin their life saving treatment as they arrive on the scene. The doctors can read these signs and tell the ambulance personell what steps to take as the patients are being transported. The So. Portland units answer some 2500 calls per year with their two units. One is stationed at Central Station and the other is in Cash Corner. The Cash Corner unit does not have telemetry equipment as of today but one of the local service clubs is raising funds to supply it. When this is in place both ends of the city will be very well served. The fellows got into their presentation only about two minutes when a question was raised and the balance of the program consisted of a barrage of questions from the floor and their time ran out before they could get back to the formal part. I suspect they could have contimued to answer questions for another hour. This is certainly a fine service for the city to offer and these are very fine men to operate it for us.
