They lost all their Federal funding last July and have to depend on donations and many volunteers to operate their program. Bill has been trying to get the several local Rotary Clubs, Westbrook, Scarborough and Portland, along with ourselves, to support this program as a community project. Westbrook and Scarborough have indicated their willingness to participate and we should hear from Portland in the next week or two.

Harold Fralich asked the Club to sponsor him in a Swim-A-Thon for CROP which is an interdenominational group trying to supply food to some of the very needy third world nations. The board of directors will consider this request at their meeting at Jim Doughty's office on Tues, April 12, at 5 PM.

PROGRAM: Ralph Miller introduced Sung Kim who is an immigrant from Korea. Sung is a graduate of Nasson College and Bangor Seminary and is the Pastor of the Korean United Methodist Church on Washington Ave. in Portland. Kim told us how it feels to be a member of an ethnic minority in the United States. He feels that the U. S. should not be a melting pot but rather a salad bowl. He feels at ease among his own people but awkward among others. He says that it is difficult to keep up when only English is spoken and one doesn't catch the jokes that are told. Kim has been here nine years. His folks are in Tacoma. When he first landed in the U. S. he had no idea of where to turn or what to do. He saw an Army recruiting poster and joined the Army. I gather that he was able to learn a lot that way. Kim was studying English in Korea and was a convert to Christianity at home. He tells us that, while Budhism is the prevailing religion in Korea, Christianity has grown rapidly in the last ten years and now represents about 25% of the people. There are about 500 Korean immigrants in Maine and some 70 are college graduates. There are a few programs in the area which are attempting to teach English to his people. It is very difficult for a Korean to find employment if he is unable to speak English. Kim commented as to how grateful he is that the Methodist people have been so hospitable to him and his people. A very thought provoking



PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Warren Simpson, introduced Donald L McDowell who is Senior Administrator and Chief Financial Officer at the Maine Medical Center. Mr. McDowell outlined the history of the Medical Center from the Old Maine General which was built in 1868 after the Great Fire and, in 1961 with the aquisition of the Childrens Hospital and the Eye and Ear Infirmary it becamethe Medical Center. It is the largest north of Boston and serves Maine, New Hampshire, and parts of Canada. Its infant care program has given Maine one of the lowest infant mortality rates in the country. Statewide responsibilities, a growing population and expanding technology in the past ten years have caused severe overcrowding and expansion is imperative. The new building is now under way. It will be a 4 story addition with 200,000 square feet. The expansion will include the renovation of 100,000 square feet of the present facility and an additional parking area for 420 cars. This effort will cost some 50 million dollars. Bonds in the amount of 35 million have been floated and the Center is now seeking donations for the balance needed. Each million donated saves some $3\frac{1}{2}$ million in costs of interest monies etc. The campaign is proceeding very well. The employees had been targeted for \$400,000 and they pledged \$580,000. The Docotrs were targeted for 2 million and pledged 2.8 million. The Trustees are now out in the community and are meeting with much success, L. L. Bean has pledged 1 million and Shaws 250,000. With a goal of 11.2 million the program should meet its objective by late this summer. Mr. McDowell concluded his presentation with a very professional slide show covering the whole subject. A fine program, Warren.

TORONTO CONVENTION Bill Brown announced that there is a nine day bus tour that has been arranged which includes the Toronto Convention. If you are interested, you can contact Bill who has the brochures.

Bill York, our resident jogger, offered a toast to Joan Benoit who set a new World Record for women in the Patriots Day Boston Marathon on April 18. I am sure you are all aware that she is a native of Cape Elizabeth. Dan Gacetta also suggested that it would be appropriate for our Rotary Club to honor Joan in some fashion. Our Board of Directors will take up this matter at their next meeting.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Nick Pappas, introduced John Fortier who is the Associate Dean of the College of Osteopathic Medicine at New England University in Biddeford. John was Director of Health in the Rhode Island prison system before coming to Maine 5 years ago. John commented that the practice of Osteopathic Medicine in New England was dying out in the early 1970s with the age of the average Doctorat 70 years. There were no schools in New England and it was practically impossible for New England students to enter the State schools around the rest of the country. This was the reason for starting the College in Biddeford. The school graduated 35 in 1982, will have 51 in 83 and, with a total enrollment of some 280 in 1984, will settle down to a graduating class of 70 students. This number is dictated by the fact that the Osteopathic hospitals around the country are able to accept only a limited number of interns each year. The osteopathic physicians receive the same training as other MDs plus a philosophy of caring and treating the "whole" patient including the family, employment and recreation segments of his life. This philosophy tends to result in the Osteopathic physician's going into the area of general practice rather than specializing. 80 to 85% are GPs. The students are given hands on experience from the very beginning of their college life as they sit in with doctors, work in emergency rooms, on ambulances and, as they progress, do the health checking for many of the school systems in Maine including our own in South Portland. I was very impressed with the complete knowledge of his subject that John demonstrated and the ease with which he fielded the many questions at the end of his talk. A very illuminating commentary on a very interesting subject.

The Bath Rotary Club is sponsoring a photo contest in connection with their plans to publish a Dist. 779 Rotary calendar for 1984. Details will be posted on the bulletin board.

BOARD MEETING: May 10, a Tuesday, at 5:15 PM at Jim Doughty's office. This is a very important meeting as the year is drawing to a close and the board now is deciding how to spend the money we have generated this year. If you have any suggestions, you would do well to attend or make your wishes known.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Ron Stewart, introduced Fred Yalouris who is part of a team of people who are salvaging parts of the clipper ship Snow Squall. Fred, .. who is a So. Portland resident, came to the U.S. from Greece at the age of 5 years. He is a Nautical Archeologist with a degree from Harvard and a Doctorate from Oxford University. The Snow Squall was built at Turner's Island in So. Portland in 1851 and set a speed record from New York to Rio that has never been equaled by a sailing ship. She was damaged in a storm near Cape Horn in 1864 and limped into the Falkland Islands for repairs. The cost of the repairs was so exhorbitant that the skipper finally had to turn over the ship to the natives who used it for a wool warehouse for many years. It is still moored at a pier in the islands. The salvage crew has managed to recover a large piece of the starboard bow along with a large quantity of ribs, planksetc. They have had these pieces transported to England and are now trying to have them shipped to So. Portland. The bow section will be set up at SMVTI as a memorial. There are no plans of these ships in existance as the builders made them from scratch. This salvage effort will result in having at hand a set of plans as to how the ship was built. The falklands lie close to the Antartic Circleand Fred showed us beautiful slides of the salvage effort, life on the island, the results of the recent war and described for us the apparent indolence of the population. They have sea all around them but don't sail on it. They have an excellent fishing source but don't fish. They even send their wool to England to be processed. We will be looking forward to the arrival of the Snow Squall in So. Portland. A most interesting program:::
