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

LAST WEEK: (7/13) In the absence of our new President, John Henchey, who is off in Hawaii practicing his hula, the meeting was opened by V P Jim Doughty; America by Bill Kourakos; Invocation by Ernie Case; Visiting Rotarians introduced by Ron Stewart, four, all from Portland. Our new Sargeant at Arms, Larry Carey, made a dent in our budget deficit by clipping each of us a quarter.

Bob Carson has made up a new schedule of Make Up opportunities which include some of the clubs in New Hampshire and Mass. Get one from him. If you plan to make up at Scarbourough be advised that on 7/19 and 7/26 they will be having a breakfast meeting at 6:45 AM rather than at their usual time of 6:15 PM.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Al Baldwin, introduced Ernest Randall and Fred Iler who are members of the So. Portland Fire Dept. and are Medical Technicians with the Rescue Unit. They have a total of 20 years experience and outlined to us the role they play in Cardio Pulmonary Resusitation. The idea behind CPR is to keep the patient alive until he can be transported to a hospital with its vast array of special equipment. The process a very tiring one and two men can perform it for only about one hour. Our speakers have been invloved in the process approximately 70 times and find that it is about 33% effective. The process is quite effective in drowning victims with those in fresh water having a better chance than those in salt water. CPR is begun when the patient has no heartbeat of no breathing and is continued until a doctor is able to take over. People who have been subjected to smoke inhalation usually have heartbeat and breathing and thus do not require CPR but ratner they are given oxygen. The process is very demanding and usually requires that a fire engine be dispatched to give the necessary manpower to move the patient while the Techs are using CPR. It is not unusual for some patients, especially older ones, to suffer cracked or broken ribs from the use of CPR but this is a risk that has to be taken. The So. Portland Fire Dept. is prepared to give CPR courses to small groups. This is a 6 to 10 hour course and does not include a certificate. The Red Cross has a more extensive course that does include a certificate .


You may recall that we helped out the Cape Special Olympics Team to go to the Internation Olympics in Baton Rouge, La. Jim Doughty reported that there were some 80,000 people at the event and one of the boys from Cape Elizabeth won three medals in the games. Jim is trying to arrange a program to show us some slides with commentary about this event.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Carroll Beck, introduced Alexander Jaegerman who is the Chief Planner for the City of Portland. Alex has a BA in Economics from Antioch College in Ohio and his Masters in City Planning from MIT. He has been with the City for a little over two years. He commented on the very successful development of the Old Port area and the Downtown section with the new Eastland Hotel and the Museum of Art in Congress Square but his main thrust to us was about the present and future development of the Commercial Street waterfront area. In 1981 the City published a plan by American Cities Corp. for the area which recommended condos, hotels and marinas as the best use. Nobody seemed to like the idea so it was scrapped and the City began to develop its own plan. The area adjacent to the Old Port will be a mixed use one with offices, residences and retail outlets and the balance, to the East and West, to be marine use. The City expects a strong fishing industry and that will be fostered and protected. The Casco Bay lines terminal will be relocated to the West side of the State Pier. The new fish pier is in place as well as the Bath Iron Works facility and these are expected to be anchors for much private development. Commercial Street will have to be upgraded to handle much more traffic than it now serves and Alex envisions a new parking garage in the area which will serve 400-500 cars. He is also working on plans for a walkway to run from the Eastern Prom to Central Wharf. He says that Gulf of Maine is working toward a new large Aquarium. If you have had occasion to drive Commercial St. lately, you should have seen much private development completed and under way. The next two years should see a big change in the Eastern half of the area. The City of Portland has done, and is doing a really tremendous job of urban renewal and Alex and his department are to be congratulated. Having worked in the Commercial Street area for more years than I care to remember, I am getting a big kick out of seeing this development.

Bill York reported briefly on our booth at the Cape's Family Fun Day last Saturday and thanked those who participated. As Tony Wagner was out of town, we will have to await his return for a financial report.

Pres. John read a couple of Thank You notes. One from the Guidance Dept. at Cape Elizabeth High for the three scholarships which we gave that school and one from the City of So. Portland for the \$2500 which we donated for the extension of Christmas lighting in Millcreek Park. In addition to the lights on Ocean St. this money will pay for lights on Hinckley Drive and Cottage Road. Surely a nice addition and one which will enhance our own Christmas Tree Sale as well.

We have some members who have not paid their dues for the coming year. The rules of Rotary International require them to be paid by July 31. If you are among these, please take care of it as soon as possible.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Lin Beck, introduced Bob Schwartz who is Deputy Chief of Police for So. Portland. Bob spoke to us regarding the city's problem with drugs. He says that small amounts of marijuana are very common in the schools as well as in the general population and there is very little to be done about it. While we do not have as big a problem with heavy drugs as some other communities, there are three or four large dealers in the city who are being watched by the police. The force knows pretty much what is going on through informants and surveilance but usually must make a "buy" before an arrest can be made. The force does use under cover people but this is rather expensive for a small department. Bob says that a video recorder would be a big help, not only in drug cases but in other phases of police work. These cost in the neighborhood of \$1200 and they have not been able to squeeze out the money for it. The 4th ammendment protects people from illegal search and seizure, not only in our home but in our vehicles as well. An officer must have probable cause before he can make any search. Drugs are a big money business with a gram (the weight of a paper clip) selling for \$150. Cocaine that is. It is easy to understand how anyone who has a serious drug dependance must turn to crime to support such an expensive habit.

The Lewiston Club is entertaining a French couple, both of whom are teachers, and this couple will be visiting various clubs in the area. They will be guests of Sam Giftos over the weekend and will be Sam's guests at our meeting on the 10th. I understand that they speak no English so let's make a special effort to see that they are made welcome.

Tony Wagner reported on the Family Fun Day at Fort Williams. In spite of some hastyplanning and lack of experience, the booth made a profit of \$274. Some \$125 of surplus food was donated to some needy families. Tony expressed deep appreciation for the tremendous cooperation shown the committee by Shaws and Uncle Andys.

Sam Giftos reported that plans are being made for a joint ladies night with the Scarborough Club. This will be on Friday Evening, Sept. 30 and will be at the Black Point Inn. This will take the place of our regular Wed. 9/28 meeting. This should be a fine time so mark your calendar. More as plans progress.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Al Boudreau, introduced Chuck Wilson who is Director of Warehouse Operations for Hannaford Bros. Co. which is the largest wholesale grocery distributor in northern New England. Hannaford services 102 super markets of which 51 are fully owned, in 21 Hannaford has a controlling interest, and 30 are independents. They also sponsor 26 Welby Drug Stores. The present warehouse contains an average inventory of \$17 million which is turned over 23 times a year. They ship over 5000 tons of goods every week on a truck fleet which travels over 25 million miles per year. The So. Portland operation is now strictly a warehouse one with the office complex having recently been moved to their Scarborough location. The addition now under way will add some 86,000 square feet of space and will be 30 feet high. When completed in January of 1985, Hannaford will have about a half million square feet of space which will be adequate until 1988 to 1991 depending on business conditions. It is interesting to note that the company has a program in which their employees participate in making the decisions as to how new programs and layouts will be accomplished. This cooperative effort results in a higher productivity rate and in much lower costs. Hannaford Bros.is certainly a big factor in the labor market locally as well as a substantial tax payer. Nice to learn some of what is going on with one of our larger businesses.

PROGRAM: A Rotary Information one concerning Rotary International's Chateau Lafayette Program. This is a program where American teachers of French and French teachers of English assemble at the Chateau where General Lafayette was born and raised. It is located in Central France and dates from the 11th century. The chateau is full of old paintings and antique furniture and is a very fascinating experience for the French teachers as well as those from America. The teachers undergo intensive training in the language and culture of both countries including visits to Rotary Clubs in the surrounding towns. The program is seven years old. The first year there were five American and four French teachers enrolled. This year there are ten Americans and eight French. After the three week course the teachers have the opportunity to visit each other's country. Our guests were Christine and Yves Bouvard. Christine is a teacher of French and Geography in Larochelle, France. The Bouvards are guests of District 779 and are traveling about the District visiting as many clubs as possible in the allotted time. They have been with the Lewiston club and stayed at the St. Hillaire's summer home at Ocean Park. For the past few days they have been the guests of Sam and Helene Giftos and will be spending the next few days with the Stan Brewers of the Portland Club. This is not Christine's first visit to the United States. She has been involved in advance studies at Atlanta and in New York City. However, it is the first time she has visited outside large cities and she was very impressed with beautiful forests and rural atmosphere of New England and finds it very different from the notions held by the French average citizen about the United States. These ideas are mainly from movies and television and are about California odd balls, gangsters and cowboys. The French students are exposed to their first foreign language at age 11 and have the opportunity to study one or two more as well as Latin in the following years. This is another of Rotary International's fine exchange programs.


#### ATTENDANCE 26

PROGRAM: As many of you are aware, Bob Doe spent a good part of his life in the Hawaiian Islands. He was in the military for many years and was a college professor after he retired. Acouple of years ago he and his wife returned to Maine and he joined our club. Bob gave us a fine slide presentation which showed the Islands from the very beginning up to the present. The Islands all developed from the same undersea volcano and have slowly moved to the North and West as a result of movement of the earth's plates. There is about to be born another island. This to make its debut in the next hundred years or so. Bob described the migration of the Polynesian peoples from the area of Southeast Asia across the islands of the South and Southwest Pacific. The people who originally populated Hawaii were the losers in a battle between two tribes on an overly populated island far to the Scuth of Hawaii. They made three double pontooned boats with stone tools from logs and cocoanut fiber. After sailing North for some time two of the boats landed on Hawaii with the third lost at sea. This migration occured in the time frame of 900 AD. It is interesting to note that noone landed on Hawaii for the next 800 years. Capt. Cook landedthere in 1778 and, after loading provisions, he sailed North to the Bering Sea in search of a passage around the North American continent. He ran into considerable and returned to Hawaii where he was greeted less enthusiastically and was killed in a battle between his men and the natives. Bob showed us a number of beautiful slides of the many active volcanoes on the islands as well as the volcanic black sands created when the lava reaches the oceans. He finished his talk with a series of slides showing the transformation of Hawaii which has occured over the last 60 years. In the twenties the Royal Hawaiian Hotel dominated the skyline but is now dwarfed by the long string of skyscrapers. A fine program. (Eat your heart out Warren)

Carroll Beck introduced, as his guest, his son in law Rev. Frederick Ingold who is a missionary in Sumatra. Fred is a member of a new Rotary Club in Sumatra where the nearest make up opportunity is 1500 miles away. He has been in the area 15 years. His Club has bought and converted an old fishing boat to serve the many isolated islands as a medical clinic. Rotary International has recently given them a three year grant and they now have on board a Rotary Doctor and Dentist who serve for a month at a time and travel about the islands delivering their service. This is Rotary in action.

DIRECTORS MEETING At John Henchey's home at 5:30 PM on Tues. Aug. 30.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR The Dist. Governor will be visiting our Club on Sept. 7. This will be a Ladies Night. Please make plans for that night. We will be taking a count at the 8/31 meeting so Tony can make his plans.

PROGRAM Program Chairman, Larry Carey, introduced Bill Guosse who is Asst. Chief Pharmacist at the Maine Medical Center. Bill discussed our personal medicine chest and said that this is the poorest place to keep our drugs as the heat and humidity shorten the effective life of drugs very rapidly. A much better place is in a cool dry closet. This is particularly true of the nitro pills used by heart patients. Bill suggested that we turn on the lights when taking any medicine at night to prevent our ingesting some deadly item such as cleaning fluid. Bill had a number of suggestions for us. He said that it is very easy to get hooked on the use of laxatives and this is a bad thing to do. This is also true of nasal sprays and they should not be used for more than 4 or 5 days at a time. As to vitamins, if you eat a balance diet, you really don't need supplements. If you must use them, he says that the one a day type is the best. As for cough syrup, the old time Robutussia is all one needs. As for steam vaporizers, these should be cleaned at least every 3 weeks to prevent them from spreading germs all over the house. Sleeping pills can be dangerous as one can build up a tolerance or addiction. Bill says that a glass of warm milk or a highball can be a good sleep aid. The Medicine Chest should contain stomach settler such as Maalox, aspirin or tylenol (if they smell of vinegar throw them out), an antibiotic such as Neosporin, iodine, and band aids. Bill suggests that we stick to one pharmacist so that he can have a medical profile of us and can make suggestions as to what side effects we may expect from the various medications we use. Very important to follow the Doctors orders for prescriptions.

PROGRAM 8/31 Program Chairman, Bob Carson, will present Wayne Schaab of the Brokerage firm Moseley, Hallgarten, Estabrook & Weeden. He will tell us of his experiences and impressions of the Portland area since his arrival 6 years ago as a Maine Mariner and his transion into the business community.


PROGRAM: Orville "Tex" Ranger reported that he found our club to be in pretty good shape but with some room for improvement. He also gave us a run down of the District Governors' conference in Florida whose theme was World Peace by Building Bridges of Friendship. This was attended by 408 District Governors from all over the world. He reported briefly on Rotary International's 4 major programs:

Rotary Foundation Scholarships (15 million in '84) Group Study Exchanges (more below) Special Grants for Education & Charity. The 3H Program (Health, Hunger, Humanity)

Relative to Group Study, our District this year will send 5 men of business to England where they will tour the Rotary Clubs there and, in 1984, we will receive 5 business men from England who will tour District 779. He is also encouraging individual clubs to get involved with clubs in foreign lands in any way possible. Tex commented that membership in the established clubs had been slowly declining over the past few years but that the trend has been reversed and, at present, is showing a slow but forward gain. Tex has set a goal for his term of a 5% membership gain for the clubs in our district. This is not a very high goal and we should be able to do our share quite easily. Tex also wants a Special Rotary Information officer in each Club, wants each Club to visit another one which is at least 100 miles away with 5% of membership making the trip. Tex also suggested that each club become incorporated and have adequate liability insurance to cover any accidents occuring at any of our functions. Tex also wants to increase the District's funds by about 25¢ per week per member. This to offset rising administrative expenses.

Lin Beck was presented with a one year perfect attendance pin. Bill York conducted our first weekly raffle and Dick Pyne went home. \$11.50 richer.



PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Bill Brown, gave us a Classification talk on Kentucky Fried Chicken, it's history and present status both locally and nationally. It all began with the Colonel's serving his product in a small restaurant which was displaced to make room for a super highway. The Colonel then franchised his recipe to other restaurants with a hand-shake as the only binder. The franchisee was to buy the spices from the Colonel and pay him 5¢ per pund for the chicken used in the operation. The Colonel sold out to J. Y. Brown in 1964 and, when the stock went public, several people became millionaires over night. The company was sold to Hueblein which was later sold to R. J. Reynolds which is now the parent company. Bill feels that the Reynolds assets and know how have put the company on the path to a much brighter and more profitable future. He also discussed the many trials and triumphs of the franchises in the Northen New England area. With the introduction of its new "Biscuit" item the local stores are showing a 34% increase this year. Bill says that it costs some half million dollars to buildand open a store. This makes the franchises very hard to come by. He says that the average store takes in some \$8,000 per week. It is interesting to note that the Colonel, after selling out, still had a contract to do the commercials which netted him some \$200,000 per year.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, George Chandler, presented Dick Jalkut who is Vice President of New England Tel. & Tel. Dick outlined some of the changes we will face when the phone company is deregulated on January 1, 1984. For the past 50 years the company has operated on a "social" pricing structure which was dictated by the Federal Government. This structure mandated that almost everyone was entitled to have a telephone even if he lived in a remote area. It resulted in the subsidizing of residential rates by the long distance lines. With the break up of A T & T the local units will no longer have the income from long distance lines which will result in a rise in residential rates to more accurately reflect their costs. We will also seea lowering of long distance costs. Your cost for a home phone will probably rise from double to triple what it is today. New Eng. Tel. & Tel. will no longer be in the business of selling or leasing telephones. This phase will be taken care of by A. T & T. The coming rise in phone costs will cause many "social" problems which will have to be faced in the next few years. A welfare family will find it difficult to pay the much higher phone costs and will probably have to be subsidized by someone. Over the next five years there will be a revolution in the spate of services available via phone lines. This will include a host of "Touch Tone" services as well as the rapidly incteasing use of home computers. At our house we have already returned our phone company units and purchased a good Touch Tone phone and two "throw away" cheapies to use as extensions. Since Congress is still wrestling with this problem it might be a good idea to have Mr. Jalkut return once a year to give us an update.
