Roosevelt as a result of his actions in combat against the Japanese forces on Peleliu Island in the South Pacific in September 1944.

Anyhow when he turned Sergeant-at-Arms Bill K. loose, the first sight after Bill's announcement that everyone without a pin would be fined was one of great relief. Several hands went self-consciously to coat lapels to assure themselves that the Rotary pin was there. Then the block-buster! "I don't mean the Rotary pin," sez Sgt. Bill, "but the UNITED WAY PIN!" Some of the boys had it, but it looked as if more pungled up quarters than didn't.

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Jim Doughty announced a charitable fund-raising presentation of "ANNIE" at the Thaxter Theatre in South Portland on Thursday, October 27, by the Portland Players. He urged that all Rotarians support this. Tickets will be available at the Rotary meeting on the 12th. Cost: \$8.50 per person.

PDG Harold Fralich appealed for some of our members to accompany him to an all-day "Think Tank" session of ways to improve Rotary to be held at Waterville on Saturday, October 15th. The session will be held at Howard Johnson's, Main Street. District Governor "Tex" Ranger will be there as well as several other Past District Governors. Harold said the input of our members who can attend will be very valuable. Call Harold to arrange for a ride. He said they expect to leave Portland for Waterville about 6:15 a.m.

Each Rotary Club is to have a Rotary Information Officer and Sec. Bob Carson will assume that duty for our Club. From now until the first of May he will report a bit of Rotary Information to the Club at each meeting. Next week, the 12th, his report will encompass membership, i.e., classification, how members are proposed. This will produce in each of us, as the weeks go by, an increased knowledge of the goals of Rotary and how we achieve them.

Our speaker at the meeting on the 5th was Major Everett P. Pope, United States Marine Corps (Retired), one of only about 260 living holders of the Medal of Honor, and one of only two living in the State of Maine. He spoke of the history and background of the Medal of Honor, from its inception during the Civil War, when it was authorized in the military service, but without its present requirement that it must be awarded for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty." Early medals were handed out for such things as agreeing to stay in service during the Civil War after expiration of the term of enlistment, which might have been only three months. In its present form and requirements it was authorized by Congress in 1918 to be presented by the President in the name of Congress. He earned his Medal in 1944 in combat against the Japanese on Peleliu Island in the South Pacific. It was presented by President Truman in the White House because President Roosevelt, who signed the citation, died shortly before it could be presented.

PROGRAM at the October 12th meeting, Jim Doughty as program chairman, will be a presentation on computers by Allen Dussault, president of the Electronic Business Systems of South Portland.

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

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Our speaker on the 12th presented a most interesting program concerning the growing use and importance of computers. Allen Dussault, president and founder of Computer House of South Portland, "just around the corner" he said from our meeting place. He began by asking for a show of hands of those who have business computers, those who have personal computers, those who have programmed a computer, and those who have used a computer. have programmed a computer, and those who have used a computer. Among those various categories it quickly became evident that the members of this Club, in Dussault's words, "is a pretty knowledgeable group", and he pitched his talk accordingly. He offered the members free tickets to the Cumberland County business show. Majority of business computers are sold for cost accounting purposes, not graphics and charts. He defined and elaborated on software, which is the term used to indicate the operating systems, the brains of the computer. A diskette can hold half a million to a million items of information by means of the iron oxide charge-accepting coating. The larger metal disk can hold 17,000,000. He warned that careful attention must be paid to what a particular program (application software) will do, or the buyer may find that what he has bought may not fill the purpose. He went into great detail in his talk which clarified ideas concerning the types and uses of computers. Several questions were asked at the conclusion of his talk. This was an interesting and useful program.





PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Peter Drivas, introduced Bill Pappas who is the principal of Mahoney "Middle" School in So. Portland. Bill objously feels very strongly in favor of the "middle" school concept. He gave us some history of the changes that have taken place over the past 80 years not only in the education of children but also in the children themselves. He feels that there is a need for the middle school as a transition from the ele-mentary system to the high school years and the middle school will provide it. The kids today are much taller, heavier and healthier than those of a generation ago and have a lot more problems to deal with. Consider the vast amount of knowledge which is thrust upon them at an early age, not only by the education system but by television and the other media. About half of these kids come from single parent homes and, often, there is nobody at home when they return from school. With the mobility of our population the kids have lost the support of the extended family, aunts, uncles etc. who in the past were a support as these kids went through the troubles of adolesence. Bill commented that these kids really need a lot of love, caring, responsibility and respect to see them through these troublesome years.

Visiting Rotarian Carlson from the Portland Club spoke to us in his capacity as a member of the Rotary Foundation's sub committee on annual giving. He feels that there are better ways to ease world tensions than to use armies. One of them being the Rotary Foundation's sponsorship of international exchanges of business men, international scholarships, and the Health, Hunger, Humanity program. These projects are funded by donations to the Foundation by Rotarians. Many are not able to give \$1,000 at one time so the committee is promoting the idea of giving \$100 per year over a ten year period to arrive at a Paul Harris Fellowship. They have had some success in this direction what with the Portland club having one member and the Lewiston-Auburn club having 16 in the ten year program. It's good for the clubs, it's good for Rotary and it's good for the world.

As a result of the resignation of 2nd Vice President, Ron Stewart, the nominating committee Chairman, Dick Kilroy, nominated Bob Carson to fill the vacancy. This was unanimously approved by the club. A very good choice.

CHRISTMAS TREES: It's that time of year again. Jim Doughty distributed assignment sheets to those present. If you were absent, get one from Jim and fill in the slots you desire. We are down to about 40 members so need all the help we can get. Trees will arrive on the Friday after Thanksgiving and a big crew is needed for that day. PROGRAM: Larry Carey, filling in for Program Chairman Harold Fralich who could not be present, introduced Dr. Charles F. Thurber who graduated from Colgate in 1961 and received his MD from Cornel in 1965. He was on the staff at Maine Medical Center and is now with the Scarborough Medical Center.

The Doctor showed us some slides and related some of his experiences during a three month period when he was a physician at a refugee camp in the northern part of Thailand. There were 25,000 people in the camp consisting of a cross section of the Laotian refugees including tribesmen, elderly, business people, and government employees who were trying to escape the communist regime in Laos and another 10% who were Thais trying to get to the United States. The camp housing was thatched huts in which the refugees lived for from 6 months to a year before they were transported to the U.S. Canadaand Australia for settlement. There was a 50 bed hospital. 25 for adults and 25 for children and another 100 patients per day were treated on an outpatient basis. Most of the staff was from among the refugees. The staff tried to educate the refugees to use breast feeding of babies rather than use formula mixed with contaminated water, Another problem was bites from dogs there being no program for inoculating pets. After watching a Chinese doctor practice accupuncture Dr. Thurber now feels that the practice has some merit.

Dr. Thurber says that, in spite of the many hardships and chronic diseases, the young children always had a smile.

Since Dr. Thurber's return the camp has been moved away from the Mekong river and is now under the control of the Thai government rather than the U. N. Things are much worse as the Thais are trying to lower the strain on their budget and have very little compassion for the refugees. In closing, Dr. Thurber commented that it was very gratifying to be able to help these people using only his knowledge and the elementary facilities available to him. He also said that a bar of soap and decent toilet facilities can have more medical impact than a host of our ultra modern, extremely expensive medical machines. A most thought provoking program.


The above slate will be acted on by the club at the meeting of 11/23.



CHRISTMAS TREES: Next load will arrive early in the week of 12/5. The week ends are the busy time for sales. Even if you are not scheduled, if you can spare an hour or two it would be greatly appreciated if you can come down and lend a hand.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Dick Holden, introduced our Secretary of State Rodney Quinn. Rodney has served in the Legislature for several terms and is now in his third terms as Sec. of State. His talk centered on Maine's very strong Drunk Driving Law. He is spending much time in speaking to service clubs and to all the high school seniors in the State. Drunks kill about 30,000 people in the U.S every year with the most horrible accidents usually involving young drivers. Under Maine's uniform law it is now easier for the police to get a conviction and they are vigorously pursuing the enforcement of the law. The law also provides unform sentencing so that each court handles cases in the same way. Most people who are convicted once have enough sense not to risk a second one. There are a few real problem drinkers who will continue to drink and drive and the State is having a hard time to solve that problem. Rodney says that, if you are stopped and asked to take a test, it is best if you comply. If you don't, you will be suspendedfor six months and any other conviction will be tacked on to the end of the first one. At present the State is concentrating on getting across to the teenagers exactly what the new teen law is and what it's penalties are. A fine talk on a very serious subject handled very well by Sec. Quinn.



PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Jim Ferguson, introduced Christine McHale who is the leader of the newly formed chapter of the "Guardian Angels". The group numbers 19 people who survived the 3 months of arduous training of a starting group of 112 applicants. They have had intensive physical training as well as instruction in the psychological and legal aspects of the situations in which they can expect to find themselves. They are not an arm of the law and have no power of arrest. They will use violence only to the extent necessary to stop a victim of a crime from being harmed. At present they have only enough people to provide two patrols of eight. They will be expanding their patrol area from the intown Portland area to the outlying districts as soon as their numbers permit. When they come upon a crime they will stop the violence, if any, call in the police or medical help and provide whatever first aid is necessary. They check for open windows and unlocked doors in shops etc. They are not subsidized in any way and pay all their own expenses. They try to provide the young people of the area with an image for good and for the elderly a feeling of security. They are patroling five nights a week at present and soon will be out seven nights. They try to provide a calming influence in any situation. Their motto is: "Live and let live is fine but Live and help live is better" Certainly a very dedicated group of people and we wish them all success!!!



Regarding the large Federal deficit George proposes that we hold the line on domestic spending for three years, greatly reduce proposed defence spending increases, and defer the third year tax cut. He says that this would reduce the deficit by 60%. George knows that this is idealistic and that some compromise will have to be worked out. This will be hard to do in 1984 what with the elections coming up. It is always a pleasure to have Senator Mitchell with us and we look forward to welcoming him again soon.


