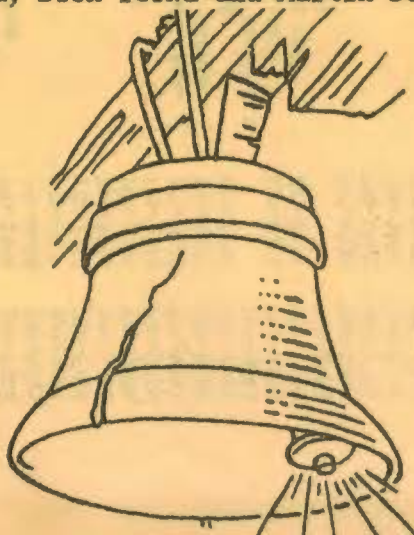

Pres. Jim announced a change in our next Ladies Night. It will be held on Aug. 22, not Aug. 29 as announced earlier. Tentative location is at Fort Williams. He also announced that the City of So. Portland will be having a Dedication Ceremony for Hinckley Park in the near future and our club will be recognized for its contribution to that effort.

He was impressed with the fact that we have 7 Paul Harris Fellows in the club and commented that last year this program of Rotary International raised 1 million dollars for student scholarships and every penny of it went to that end. He hopes we can add another this year. He looks to our club to recruit 10 new members this year and asks that be be young ones.

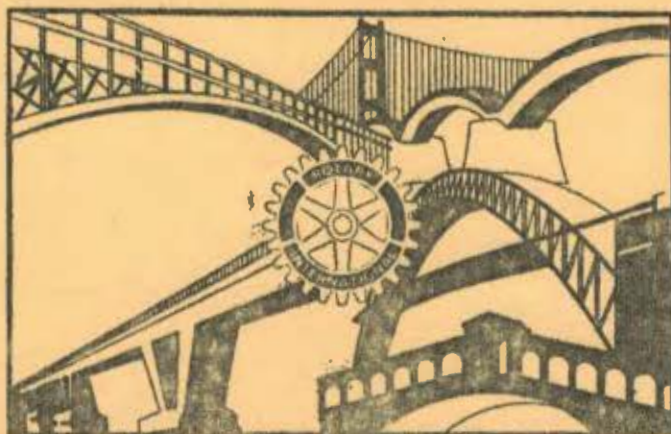
Marcel noted that water is a very pressing problem in the Dominican Republic and his personal goal this year is to raise as much money as he can from the many clubs in the district which will be matched on a 2 for 1 basis by the Canadian government. With these monies he proposes to have as many wells drilled in that country as the funds allow. These cost approx. \$3,000 each. If each of the 3,000 members of the District donated only a dollar he would have a total of \$9,000 for his project.

In closing Marcel played a tape from the President of Rotary International, Carlos Canseco, which included his greetings and stressed his theme for the year, urging all Rotarians to seek "A New World of Service".

Pres. Jim read a "Thank You" letter from the girl we sponsored for Dirigo Girls State. Tonight (8/1) our program will be six men who are visiting the Rotary Clubs in the area. Only one is a Rotarian. Two are firemen, two are policemen, one is a computer salesman and one a mortician. Let's have a good turnout.

Pres. Jim read a letter of resignation from Al Boudreau. Sorry to lose him.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Frank Hugo, introduced David Ogden who is regional manager for New England and New York for Lord Abbett Co. Dave is a graduate of Yale, was the first pilot of a B 24 to fly 50 missions over Europe and, prior to his joining Lord Abbett, was Vice Pres. of the First Nat. Bank of Wilkes-Barre, Pa. His company provides Asset Management services to some of the best known firms in the country including A T&T, A&P, IBM, F.W.Woolworth and Yale Univ.

Dave says that mutual funds represent some \$200 billion owned by 10 million people, from all walks of life. Most people make monthly payments into these funds which provide many advantages such as professional management, diversity, and liquidity. All of the good funds have outperformed the market over the long term. Open end funds are very liquid while, with the closed end funds, you must find a buyer. As to "Load" vs "No Load" funds Dave says that the load fund costs approx 1/3 of 1% per year while the no load ones actually cost 3-4%. The load funds also have a broker rep. as near as your phone The mutuals appear to be a very good place to have a regular savings program and according to Dave they are beginning to be a big factor in the IRA market. An interesting program and Dave is obviously a very good salesman for the funds.

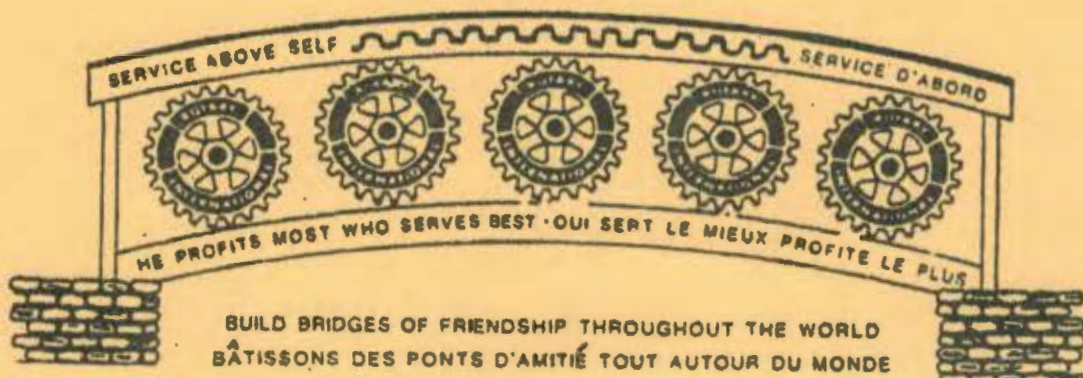

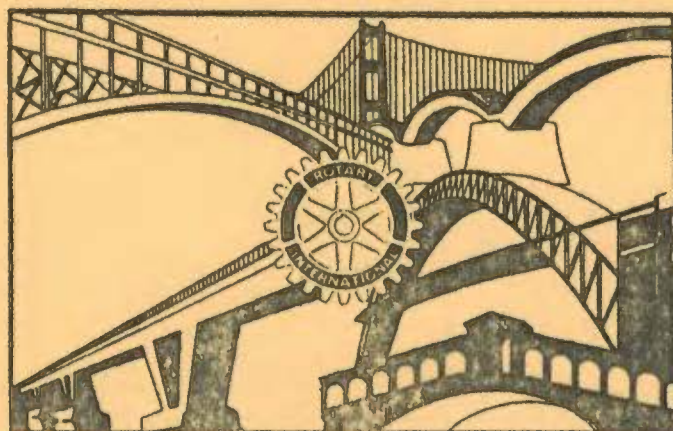
It was quite apparent that public transportation is relied on to a far greater extent than in our country. New homes are built with 12 to an acre which seems crowded by our standards. The new homes all were of brick in contrast to our many wooden ones. Living in the US and seeing what we think of as old, I am always amazed to see the antiquity of the English cities.

In his introductory remarks Jim Brown said that he was brought up in the northern part of Scotland. After the program I spoke to him and found that he grew up in Lossiemouth where my daughter and her husband were stationed for 4 years and he was born in the same hospital in Elgin as was my grand daughter. It really is a small world. The program ran over by almost an hour but was well worth it. This is another of the many Rotary Exchange programs which should be fostered and encouraged.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, George Chandler, introduced Mike Petit who is the head of the State Dept. of Human Services. Mike is a graduate of Bowdoin College with a masters from Boston College. He was with the Portland United Way prior to being appointed by Governor Brennan to his present post. His department is the largest and most vital one in state government with a budget of \$500 million, 2500 employees in 35 offices serving some 300,000 people. The department is made up of six bureaus.

Rehabilitation concerned with the blind, retarded etc. as well as with drug and alcohol abuse.

Health, concerned with water and plumbing standards and public health in general.

Medical Services, concerned with Medicaid and nursing homes. The State funds 85% of the nursing home costs in the state.

Social Services, concerned with protection of adults and children as well as foster care.

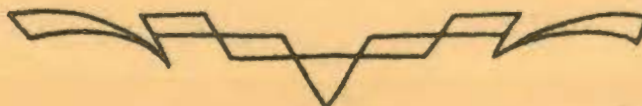
Elderly, serving a million meals a year.

Welfare, handles food stamps (140,000 people) and AFDC (55,000 people) Mike takes pride in the fact that fraud amounts to less than 1% and operating costs are only 3% in these programs. The state has been very successful in going after deserting fathers and now collects \$12 million whereas 5 years ago it was only \$2 million. The state has very high standards for nursing home care which has grown in 10 years from 4,000 beds to 9,000. The state is now stressing home base care for the elderly as opposed to nursing homes, feeling that people are more happy in that environment. Child abuse has become a big issue of late and is receiving strong attention from the department. Mike feels that prevention is the best and cheapest way to handle this and is trying to provide education and work opportunities for the people in the lower income brackets where much of the abuse occurs. Mike pointed to the states dental prevention program as an outstanding success over the last few years. Fine program.

Dan Gacetta was fined a dollar for appearing on international television with Joan Benoit at the Olympics. He reported that he had a tremendous experience and will report more fully at a later date.

Pres. Jim welcomed Dave Hitchcock back into membership in the club. Nice to have him with us.

The Board of Directors is reviewing seven new membership applications. GOOD! There are still a half dozen members who have not paid their 84-85 dues.

THE MEETING OF AUGUST 22 IS A LADIES NIGHT AND WILL BE AT THE SHELTER AT FORT WILLIAMS AT 6 PM. IF YOU PLAN TO ATTEND AND HAVE NOT MADE A RESERVATION WITH PHIL DUBE, GIVE HIM A CALL. THIS WILL BE CATERED AND WE MUST KNOW HOW MANY WILL BE THERE.

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Bob Doe, introduced Dr. Robert Sbrilli, who is a member of M.A.D.D. Mothers Against Drunk Driving. This organization was started two years ago by a woman in California whose child was killed by a drunk driver and who was appalled as she followed the judicial process as it applied to the man who was driving the car. The organization is one year old in Maine and has already achieved considerable success in its efforts to educate the public as to the perils of drunk driving. The State Motor Vehicle Dept. is now distributing M.A.D.D. literature at its license offices. The group is not advocating Prohibition but rather the responsible use of liquor. They now have people who attend court sessions to record statistics and observe the legal process. It is apparent that the mere presence of these observers is having a positive effect on the system. Dr. Sbrilli lost one of his daughters in a head on crash caused by a drunk driver who stretched out the process by 21 months but who is now in prison for several years.

1/3 of the population does not drink but the other 2/3 over 14 years consumes in one year, per person, 591 beers, 115 bottles of wine and 35 5ths of whiskey.

M.A.D.D is receiving support from the State's Inn Keepers, Bars & Restaurants and Independent Insurance agents. Their volunteers have had 58 speaking engagements in the past three months. They have recently hired a full time Executive Director and, I am sure, we will be hearing from them even more as time goes by. Dr. Sbrilli feels that we have adequate laws but they do need stronger enforcement. He says that the two day jail sentences being given to drunk drivers are a farce in that they are served an hour or two at a time at the convenience of the convicted one. M.A.D.D now need volunteer members and money. If you are so moved, get in touch with the Doctor. It can happen to you.

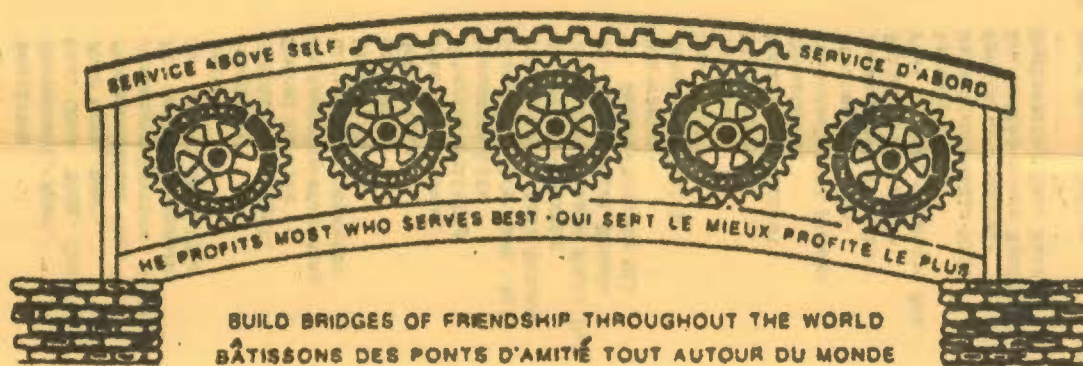
The proceeds will be used for scholarships. In the past few years this group has provided annual scholarships for 3 girls in the area.

They stayed with several Shiite families, ate their food and experienced the fears that come with war. The Shiite is the single largest religious group in Lebanon and Frank feels that the power has definitely moved from the Christians to the Moslems. He feels that the Reagan administration made a mistake in sending U.S. troops to Lebanon. In speaking with people from the State Dept. in D.C. the "off the record" comment is that they are glad to be out and want nothing more to do with the affairs of Lebanon.

The Ewells are part of a movement which is trying to restore peace to this troubled country. They feel that the United States foreign policy regarding Central America is very wrong. They see the the present government of Nicaragua as one which grew out of a revolution inspired by the people being inspired by Judeo-Christian teachings and financed by Marxist economics. They say that land reform is taking place at a rapid pace and literacy among the people has risen dramatically in the last four years. Education is very strong with the schools being in use from 7 AM to 10 PM. Free health care is available and polio has been eliminated and malaria greatly reduced. The Ewells say that the U. S. is waging a covert war using guerillas to hit civilian targets and strangling Nicaragua on the economic front. The people are looking at a bleak future and expect that the United States will soon invade their country.

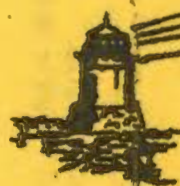

PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Harold Fralich, introduced John R. Colby who is Vice President in charge of sales for Norman Pullen Inc. dealers in rare coins located at Kennebec St. and Marginal Way in Portland. John was born and raised in West Springfield, Mass. and has been a collector since the age of 10. John received his BA from Geo. Washington Univ. in 1973, and his Masters from Springfield College in 1974. From 74-79 he was a rare coin consultant with Paramount Int. Coin Corp. in Englewood, Ohio and from 79-83 was Director of Sales for Williams Gallery of Rare Coins in Dayton and accepted his present position earlier this year. He spoke to us mainly on gold coins as an investment. He pointed out that gold bullion value rises and falls with the ever changing situation but that gold coins represent an ever increasing investment. He says to buy the best quality coins that one can afford and to have a goal such as gathering a complete set of the coins minted by the U.S. This collection will have a greater value as a set than individually. This is true of silver coins as well. In the last ten years rare coins have appreciated at an annual rate of 29-32%. John strongly suggests that one use the services of a good dealer to obtain the best results. Such a dealer stands behind the coins he offers and guarantees their authenticity. Having been collecting in a small way for many years I would point out to you that the bug bites very hard. It is a fascinating hobby.

Birmingham is located in central England and is near many popular historic places including the birthplace of William Shakespeare and Warwick Castle which is 1,000 years old. The convention was held in a new facility which seats 13,000 and is said to be the finest in Europe. Sam said that the bill for flowers in one room ran to over \$70,000. With so many people, housing was stretched to distances of 100 miles but shuttle buses handled the crowds very efficiently. The Birmingham Rotary Club has only 165 members and is the smallest club to ever host the International Convention. This was also the first time the convention has been held in England. The meeting in 1921 was in Scotland. It was quite apparent that Sam had a great time.

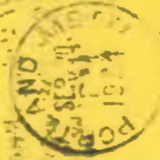
