PROGRAM: Program Chairman, Jim Rowe, in line with Youth Activities Month, introduced Lance Wieland who is Executive Director of Junior Achievement for So. Maine. Lance is a graduate of Univ. of So. Maine with degree in Political Science and Business. He was employed by Union Mutual and the Cumb County Civic Center prior to joining Junior Achievement. This movement was begun in Springfield, Mass. in 1919 as an urban alternative to the rural 4H Clubs. Its goals are to teach young people about business and economics throught it's many different programs. There are programs for 6th graders, eighth graders and high school students. In the 50s and 60s the program grew to national proportions with some 650,000 students participating each year. This year some 700 students in Cumb. County will share in the activities which are backed by approximately 700 companies in the area to the tune of \$75,000. Interesting to note that 84% of the kids who start the program see it through to the finish.

Come One, Come All!

REMEMBER that there will be no meeting at the Purpoodock Club on October 10. Instead we hope to see all of you and your friends at the THAXTER THEATER, South Portland, to enjoy a presentation of "GODSPELL" by the Portland Players. It had a splendid review so we expect a most pleasurable evening.

LAST WEEK: (10/3) We met at the Maine Youth Center on Westbrook Street, South Port-land. Those who got there at 5 o'clock had a most instructive and interesting tour through the spacious facilities. The tour was conducted by Anthony Sesto, assistant superintendent, who has been at the center for 18 years, accompanied by David Berenson who has been there for 11 years.

The grounds are well laid out and attractive, with recreational areas, and since the location is high, good views. The buildings range from the original large, grim building built in the mid-1800s, to modern and well-kept cottage type buildings designed to accommodate about 20 (more or less). Each of these cottage is equipped with kitchen, dining room, recreation area, individual bedrooms or dormitories. Each is staffed with round-the-clock supervisors, strict discipline is maintained. The cottages are divided in assignments so that those with psychological problems are The in one, those with violence and sexual problems in another, etc. There is an academic program with certified teachers generally following a high school curriculum, and a vocational program also. An infirmary, gymnasium, and swimming pool are also located on the grounds. The inmates are sent to the Youth Center after conviction as juven-ile criminals. Normally they must be released when they arrive at the age of majority (18) unless the Court specifically directs that they be retained until they are 21. Some of the offenses of which they have been convicted are arson, robbery, car theft, assault with weapons, and sexual assault.

The institution is among the first five in the country in its standards of treatment and the excellence of its programs. Visitors from similar institutions in other states have commented that they can learn much from the Maine Youth Center. It is the only such institution in Maine.

In the question and answer period, Tony Sesto commented on the great change in the type of youngsters now at the center compared with those 15 and more years ago. He said those today are more sophisticated, very knowledgeable as to their legal rights, into the drug culture, not only as users, but as purveyors, also there are many more sexual offenders, many of whom were themselves sexually abused when younger. Also more incidences of violence, such as manslaughter. One questioner asked if there was evident any particular pattern as a cause of the offenses. The answer was that there is no set pattern; sometimes to support a habit, sometimes "just for the hell of it", sometimes when asked, "Why did you do it?", the answer came, "Ah, to have some fun. There's nothin' to do in my town." Sometimes there is influence from older people who deliberately or by example direct a youth to crime.


This was a very useful and educating program with its direct view into some of the results of trends among youth which obviously will lead to greater trouble in the future if some positive types of programs are not found which can gradually turn this dangerous direction around.



LAST WEEK: (10/17). After two weeks away we were back at the Purpoodock Club. The previous week (10/10), of course, was the theatre party instead of a meeting, to attend Thaxter Theatre to see "Godspell". The theatre appeared to be sold out. Secretary Bill York asks that any Rotarian who has not yet turned over money from the sale of tickets to do so paromptly, please, so that he can close his books.

IMPORTANT: President Jim has called a Directors' meeting on Tuesday, 30th October, at 5 p.m., at the office of Blake, Hall & Sprague. MARK YOUR CALENDAR.

NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP semi-finalists from Cape Elizabeth High School, Jeff Reardon, John Metzger, and Steve Spear were introduced by Tony Wagner. Each gave a short resume of his school background. These young men are versatile, not only in academics but in athletics and band. They are intensively competing nation-wide for the final National Merit Scholarship awards. We were impressed with and happy to have them as our guests.

FROM AWAY: Larry Carey presented the Club with banners from Rotary Clubs in Kyoto and Hong Kong together with interesting comments on his visits to these clubs and the way in which they differ from ours. At Kyoto he said the Club welcomed him with the American folk-song, "Oh Susanna", on the organ. At Hong Kong, which Club met in the Hilton Hotel, and appeared rather exclusive, he met the District Governor, who had 65 Clubs under his jurisdiction in Hong Kong, Macau, and Taiwan. 57 are in Taiwan alone and he had just returned from two months there visiting clubs. He spoke many different languages; including Mandarin, Cantonese, Portuguese, and English.

<u>R.I. CONVENTION:</u> Harold Fralich invited attention of the Club to the upcoming R. I. Convention in Kansas City, the 26th to the 29th of May. He announced that Rotary International has requested that every club in our District be urged to act as host to a Rotary family either one week prior to or one week subsequent to the Convention. He asked that any member of our Club who would like to have as guest such a family of no more than 2 or 3 members at the times mentioned for about 3 days get in touch with him.

DRINKING AND DRIVING: President Jim asked Al Livingston, chairman of the Safety Committee, to inform the Club of a proposal which had been presented to the Board of Directors concerning a program in which this Club could be involved in education together with the Maine Safety Council and the National Safety Council aimed at reducing the incidences of drinking and driving. This would be a program which would be a first for Maine. The Board has already seen a presentation by an organization which has done this in Massachusetts for 60,000 students, which had proven to be very successful. It would probably involve an initial financial commitment by the Club of about \$3000. Al noted that this program would be invaluable aid to students coming through our school system. President Jim noted that this would be presented at a meeting which would be open for all members of the Club to attend and give their ideas pro or con. He also noted that in addition to be very useful to the community it would be an excellent image-maker for our Club.

MEMBERSHIP: President Jim urged increased activity for obtaining new members. He noted that very little had been done by the two teams, which may be attributed to the chnges in meetings in the last couple of weeks. We have lost four members recently because of attrition or moving. Not only do these need to be replaced, but additional are needed if the Club is to fulfill its functions.

THE SPEAKER: Dick Goodine introduced Dwight Fisher of Andover College. He is the Director of Cooperative Education. He gave a most interesting and informative talk on the benefits accruing to students who at certain periods in their business training at Andover College can utilize their skills by actually working at them in various firms thereby increasing their confidence in themselves and their skills as well as gaining experience which is of assistance when they look for permanent jobs.



Think of someone that you can propose for membership in Rotary.



THE SPEAKER: Bob Carson introduced Steve Simonds, Director of the Institute for Human Services Development at the University of Southern Maine, which he has held since 1971, He is a former Fulbright Scholar at the University of Bristol, England. He is a former Rotarian. As he began Steve noted that his talk would be "totally apolitical". He kept it so, not once mentioning his candidacy for the Legislature. He thanked the Club, as a member of the Town Council, for the tremendous amount of public service the Club has rendered to Cape Elizabeth. He described how Halsey Smith, Fred Green and he as "three entrepreneurs" began this "new enterprise in town which may foreshadow some of the future of this State in terms of its overall economic development." It is an information intensive enterprise, meaning that most of the time is spent in collecting, analyzing, interpreting, and dissemimating information. Most of the information is disseminated to the state, but they do send some nationally. The enterprise is the Center for Research and Advanced Study. He noted that it is heavily involved in public service and outlined the various ways in which this work can be of economic benefit to the state. It now consists of three institutes, the New Enterprise Institute, Marine Law Institute and the Human Services Development Institute. He was an articulate, informative, and interesting speaker who gave a very clear idea of the beneficial impacts of the Center upon economic life in Maine.



DRINKING & DRIVING: Alec Livingston introduced John McCarthy, Regional Director for the National Safety Council, who has already had discussions with our Board of Directors concerning the program reported at the Club meetings of October 17 and 31. The program involves training young people at the sophomore level in Cape Elizabeth and South Portland High Schools regarding the problems of drinking and driving. This is the age when these young people are eligible to receive their licenses and permits to drive. Pres. Jim noted that the Board had committed \$3300 to this program and urged members to see John McCarthy after the neeting when he would be available to answer their questions. Mr. McCarthy thanked the Club, on behalf of the National Safety Council, for the strong support of this program. He mentioned that throughout the country this program has been presented successfully to more than 50,000 students, and that the Rotarians of South Portland/Cape Elizabeth are now making it possible to bring the program to Maine.

ROTARY FOUNDATION MONTH: This month, being Rotary Foundation Month, Bob Doe invited the attention of the members to the excellent article in the current ROTARIAN. If you have not yet read it, please do so. He also asked if some member would please see that our, new member, Jeff Hobbs, gets a copy of the magazine as part of his introduction to Rotary. It takes awhile for his own subscription to start. Also, how about bringing some copies to meeting, when you are through with them, to give to other new members as they are received?

THE SPEAKER: John Henchey introduced Charles "Chuck" Faucher, Executive Director of Regional Waste Systems, which was formed by the Greater Portland Council of Governments in 1974 to meet the problems of the disposal of solid waste. In 1978 Regional Waste Systems began the operation of a solid waste bailer, which achieves a 65% reduction in volume by crusing the waste into solid blocks which are disposed of in a 133 acre site in Scarborough. This was recognized as a first step process. New means must be found because only about 7 years availability of disposal sites are left. This is getting close to restrictions imposed by the Maine Supreme Court which says that if only 3 years are left that meet State criteria then there can be no substantial economic development in the community. All methods were evaluated, until finally there has been reached what was found to be probably most suitable both economically and also meet State criteria, that is, burning of solid waste to produce steam for heating or electric generation to be sold to CMP. There is no market for the first in the greater Portland area, which leaves the second. He went into considerable detail on the means being used by Regional Waste Systems, both financial and operational, to achieve this.

He recalled the exchange team we had had from England this year responding to the team we sent there the previous year. He also informed us that the Rotary Foundation had made two changes in regulations governing makeup of team members. Previously, no Rotarian or member of his family could be a team member, but the revision permits members of a Rotarian's family to be named now. Also, the former rule restricted members to men. That has been relaxed and women now may be named. Prexy Jim then noted that the contributions to Rotary Foundation from this District came to about \$43,000. He also mentioned that the money received from Paul Harris Fellow awards goes to the Foundation.

WELL PROJECT IN DOMINICAN REPUBLIC. Prexy Jim noted that he had a letter from DG Marcel Morrisette thanking us for the money we sent to him for this project. He asked us to determine if we could get the Women of Rotary to make a contribution also.


THE SPEAKER: Our own Harold Fralich, Past District Governor, presented an excellent talk on Rotary Foundation, which is an integral part of the International Understanding program of Rotary International. He explained the four divisions of this program:

Rotary Foundation Scholarships, Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants, Group Study Exchange,

Special Grants.

He made especial mention of the parts of Rotary Foundation programs which have involved this club, i.e., Scholarships and Group Study Exchanges. He urged particularly that each Rotarian become involved by personal contributions for the expansion of this program and that the Club become involved by determining that an annual contribution by made by the Club of \$1000. He complimented the Club for its growth in its 26 years to a Foundation plateau of 2100%. He explained that contributions to the Foundation from a club equal \$10 per member, that it rises another 100% for that year. He noted that with our membership, a Club contribution of \$1000 (approximately) would equal a 200% rise. He invited the members to study the Rotary Foundation annual report in the November issue of The Rotariah for an excellent outline of this very important Rotary activity. (Perhaps this issued might be kept on file for future reference.)



Andy plans to be at the lot taking pictures during the sale for a special project coming up, which will be announced later. Warren Simpson was thanked for lining up several of our past members to will also be on hand to help out during the sale. Tony wagner listed those members who have volunteered to help unload the trees on Friday: Dave Bagdasarian, Marty Donovan, Phil Dube, Alex Livingston, Bill Stanton, Bill York (and a couple of names garbled on my tape recording!) He also announced that students from Cape Elizabeth High School will be providing a crew on December 8th. We thank them.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Bob Carson announced that John Henchey is chairman of the Nominating Committee for a slate of officers for the 1985-86 Rotary Year. He will form his own committee.

THE SPEAKER: Nancy Masterton, a four term member of the State House of Representatives, and now a candidate for the Town Council of Cape Elizabeth, gave a comprehensive exposition of to matters of considerable public concern; education and the proposed south Cape sewer system.

She referred to the Education Reform Act of September 1984 which is designed to improve the quality of education in Maine. It provides increase in Sate support to local school districts by increasing the State's share of local costs to 55%, which includes all local costs in State sharing, a change from the previous in which some costs were excluded from sharing. A second aspect is the provision of a bonus to teachers in each of two years, beginning in 1986, of \$1,000. The purpose is to try to improve the quality of teaching by attracting better qualified teachers. Maine is handicapped by being very low among the states in teacher compensation--48th out of the 50 states. Another help in improving the quality of education is the mandating by the state of requirements for graduation from high school--including increasing the requirements for study of English, History, Science with laboratory work, mathematics. The state will provide financial help for the upgrading of these requirements. The greatest effect will be in the rural school districts.

She then turned to the subject of the sewerage for the south Cape which has a history going back to 1971. There have been five studies in all on this matter. During the years the scope of the proposed sewer system has been reduced three times. In 1984 the Town Council voted 4 to 3 to accept the plan, but a referendum petition was presented which resulted in the Town rejecting the plan. A new research was instituted. The committee delved very thoroughly into the total aspect. The public was invited to all 15 meetings of the committee a received many testimonies from both objectors and supporters of the plan. There were also two public hears after the plan had been formulated before it was voted on by the Town Council. It was accepted by the Council on a 6 to 1 vote. Now a new petition has been presented which will mean another referendum. She noted that State regulations will require a sewer plan to be implemented or the Town will be subject to punitive fines. She also noted that delays contribute to increased costs, such as construction costs, user fees, and debt service, plus reduction, or complete loss, of financial assistance from both State and Federal governments.


