ATTENDANCE IS A MUST

President Bob reminded us that turning up regularly at the meetings of the club is one of the obligations that a member agrees to accept when he joins Rotary. He would like to have the attendance at 90%. The club attendance was 83.40% for November. Our club was not in Governor Sam's Top Ten for November.

Rotary rules state if a member misses four meetings in a row, fails to attend at least 30% of the meetings in his own club during each half year or fails to attend 60% of the weekly meetings, his membership is automatically terminated unless he is specifically excused by the Board of Directors.

In Maine regulations related to boxing have been changed at the urging of the medical profession although the AMA believes boxing should be banned totally because there is no effective protection for fighters.

Banning radio and television advertising for cigarettes in the early seventies also removed anti-smoking ads which were gaining in effectiveness. The most effective of these antismoking ads starred William Tallman, the DA on the Perry Mason TV program, who had died of lung cancer. 1,000 people per day die as the result of cigarette smoking in the United States.

ADMINISTRATION OF THE EXTERNAL BUDGET

At the Board of Director's meeting on February 4th the following policy was adopted by the board in response to concerns that the club was accumulating money from our increasingly successful fund raising events and not disbursing all the available funds.

The Club shall designate a minimum of 10% of it's net External Revenues to the Rotary Foundation, the amount to be determined in June of the Rotary year. A Paul Harris Fellow shall be designated when deemed appropriate by a vote of the Board. The selection need not be restricted to Rotarians.

The Club shall maintain a minimum balance of \$5,000.00 in the External Account from one year to the next. In the event of a compelling need the minimum reserve may be waived and the money made available immediately by a majority vote of the Board.

Funds may be encumbered from one year to the next, separate from the \$5,000 minimum, for approved projects that cannot be financed in a single year. Any commitment for funds over \$5,000 shall not be approved without Club consultation prior to a final vote of the Board.

The Director of each Avenue of Service shall request funds for projects approved by the Board by the first Board meeting in July. Remaining funds in the External Budget shall remain available to fund annual requests and Club projects.

The External Budget Committee shall review all requests for funds from the external budget. Recommendations from this committee shall be forwarded to the full Board for a vote. The Committee shall consist of the four Service Directors.

Requests for funds from outside organizations shall be submitted on a form provided by the Club. Information to be required of the applicant shall contain at least: The name of the organization, the contact persons name, address and phone number, as well as the amount of funding being requested. A short narrative on how the funds are to be used shall also be required.

Notifications of the disposition of the request shall be the responsibility of the Club Secretary unless otherwise stated by the

For the fifth time a clear majority of the 431 delegates from 58 countries attending turned down a proposal to change the rules that prohibits women from becoming members of Rotary.

District 779 was represented on the Council of Legislation by Harold Fralich of our club.

Harold voted in favor of changing the rules to allow women as members of Rotary.

The sessions were held over a four day period in six languages. A total of more than 40 hours were spent in the sessions. 251 enactments or resolutions were considered. ammended, 83 were

61 passed, 8 passed as ammended, 83 were defeated, 96 withdrawn, 1 tabled and 2 sent to the Board of Directors for further study.



For your information the following is the four types of Rotary member classifications.

MEMBER CLASSIFICATIONS

Active and Additional Active members work in a leadership capacity (owner, partner, manager) in the business or profession under which they are classified. They also must either work or live within the club's territory. The South Portland / Cape Elizabeth Rotary Club's territory consists of the City of South Portland, the Town of Cape Elizabeth and the abutting communities.

Senior Active members are former active members who automatically become senior actives through one of the following ways:

1. They were active members of one or more Rotary

clubs for at least fifteen years; 2. They are at least 60 years of age with ten or more years of active membership in one or more clubs;

3. They are at least 65 with five or more years of active membership in one or more clubs;

4. They are a present or past officer of Rotary International.

Senior Active members may move to another locality and be elected by a new club to this type of membership.

Past Service members are those who have retired from work after having held active membership for five or more years, but are not yet eligible for senior active membership. They must reside and continue to reside within the territorial limits of their club.

Honorary Members are elected because of distinguished service in furthering Rotary ideals. They may attend meetings only of the club that elected them, but they do not vote and are not eligible to hold office in the club.

Some notable Honorary Rotarians:- Heads of State: King Albert I of Belgium, King George VI of England, King Victor Emmanuel III of Italy, King Gustav VI, Adolf of Sweden, U.S. Presidents starting with William Howard Taft. Explorers Richard E. Byrd, Thor Heyerdahl, Edmund Hillary, and various U.S. astronauts. Aviation pioneers Orville Wright and Charles Lindbergh. Authors Thomas Mann and William Allen White. Composers Franz Lehar and Jean Sibelius. Inventors Thomas Edison and Gugliemo Marconi. Others: Sir Winston Churchill, Walt Disney, Albert Schweitzer, and "Buffalo Bill" Cody.


