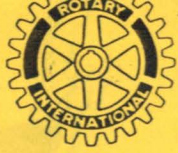

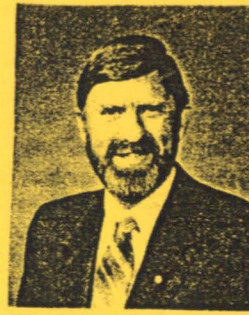

As I mentioned at the Balsams:

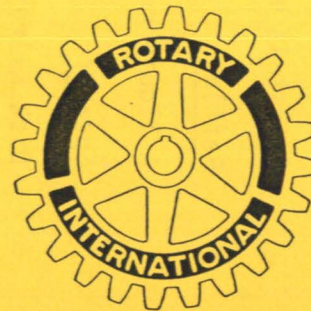

The program speaker, Chief Mate Bill Gatchell, was introduced by Sam Giftos. Bill works for Energy Transport Corp on a Liquid Natural Gas transport vessel. The ship is 80,000 tons, 936 ft long and carries 125,000 cubic meters of Liquid Natural gas. Bill noted that one cubic meter of LNG is equal to 620 cubic meters of vapor gas. He outlined the many safety features on the craft during his interesting slide presentation. Sam noted Bill's craft has picked up many boat people in the South China sea and was recently recognized by the American Maritime Assn Humanitarian award. Bill also noted the sorry state of the American Merchant Marine.

Finally, the presence of several cookie monsters was noted. It seems plates of the chocolate chip cookies, as they were passed from person to person, seemed to wind up near Dick Holden - even those from the Head Table.

THE PORTLAND BREAKWATER LIGHTHOUSE

Lighthouses of iron were built as early as the eighteenth and throughout the nineteenth centuries; a few were even constructed in the twentieth. Many of these towers look more like oil rigs or riveted boilers than heroic structures associated with the sea and its lore. A diminutive exception is Maine's Portland Breakwater Lighthouse. Modeled after a classic Greek monument, this cast-iron masterpiece stands, darkened, a blind guardian of Portland Harbor.

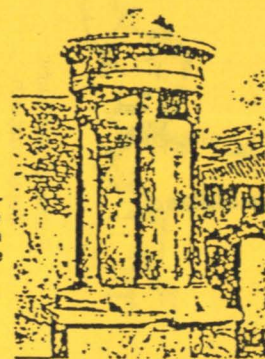
Alan Stevenson, the engineer responsible for one of the earliest classics of lighthouse design, Skerryvore Lighthouse (1843) off the Scottish coast, and a member of the distinguished family of engineers and designers that included Robert Louis Stevenson (who incidentally wrote "On a New Form of Intermittent Light for Lighthouses," which won a silver Medal from the Royal Scottish Society of Arts), states that the first iron lighthouse was designed by a Captain Brodie, R.N., for Bell Rock and the second by a Robert Stevenson in 1800. This latter structure, distinct from the classic stone towers of the nineteenth century, was "constructed of eight cast-iron pillars arranged in the form of a pyramid and tied together by means of horizontal and diagonal braces". In the same book, *A Rudimentary Treatise on the History, Construction and Illumination of Lighthouses* (London, 1850), Alan Stevenson further states that for some locations "iron lighthouses may be the most convenient and least expensive in prospect, [though] the stone tower is the more satisfactory".

For a brief period in the second half of the nineteenth century, cast-iron held the promise of revolutionizing architecture; entire structures could be designed piece by piece, molded, and cast at a foundry, assembled on the foundry floor for inspection, disassembled for shipping and re-assembled on site. Using cast-iron, as Margot Gayle has written, "industrially produced architecture had arrived with ... mass production of identical interchangeable parts." This process not only allowed for rapid assembly, it also provided great flexibility in ornamentation. Copies of classic buildings, orders, or details could be incorporated into a structure's mold, and cast, thus eliminating the need for the expense of on-site craftsmen.

Abandoned since 1943 the Portland Breakwater Lighthouse replaced an earlier wooden structure built in 1855. The new light, standing 24 feet from base to ventilator and measuring 11 feet 10 inches in diameter, was cast and delivered to its site, a granite sea wall originally jutting 1990 feet into the water of Portland Harbor, in 1874, and lighted for the first time in June 1875. The Historic American Building Survey (HABS) notes that "it is possible that Thomas Ustick Walter, who designed and erected the National Capitol's cast-iron dome, might have had something to do with the structure." This seems probable given Walter's experience with cast-iron and his stylistic bias. A practitioner of historic styles, Walters is especially well known for his Greek Revival architecture, including Girard College in Philadelphia—a design based on a Greek temple using the Corinthian order.

derived from an ancient Greek structure—the Choragic Monument of Lysicrates in Athens. Varying proportions and taking liberties with detailing, whoever designed the tower was surely familiar with classical architecture. Nevertheless, the lighthouse differs from its inspirational source in several crucial aspects: most notably in the simplifying of the capitals and entablature as well as in the addition of portholes. As stated in the HABS

Main Catalog, the light's "panoply of classical detail in cast-iron well illustrates the spirit of its age by using old forms in a new material". The design of a lighthouse with classical detailing, or any detailing at all for that matter, is a great departure from traditional lighthouse engineering. Experience taught engineers that only the strongest, most smooth-faced, circular and tapering shape was reliable when pitted against crashing seas and hurricane winds. Accordingly, lighthouses evolved as tall, slightly conical towers.

The Portland Breakwater Lighthouse, however, deviated from this conventional development, at least in part because of its unique location and modest, though important function—guiding seamen into the harbor—as opposed to the typical placement and task of coastal or off-shore lights required to warn distant vessels of dangerous rocks or reefs.

The little tower, visible from Portland's Eastern Promenade, sits on a round bed of cast concrete atop a rusticated, octagonal granite base. The white shaft is one-inch-thick cast-iron bolted together at flanges hidden behind six fluted columns with Corinthian capitals. A layer of brick lines and backs up the cast-iron shell. The tower is pierced by six portholes as well as a quarter-inch iron-plate door, and its top is ringed by acroteria. Inside, a stairway leads to the black, cast-iron lantern with ten panes of glass. The lantern's roof slopes upward to a spherical, cast-iron lamp vent (the black ball) and leads, finally, to a three-pronged, bronze finial that served as a lightning rod.

From its first night of service in 1875, the tower radiated a fixed red beam, the color produced by a red glass chimney surrounding the flame. In 1878, the lamp was modified in order to flash red every forty seconds. The mechanism for this flashing beam revolved by means of an "old style French clock" that ran the light for six hours after each winding. The oil lamp (converted to electricity in 1934) was vented through a tube leading from the upper part of the lens into the ventilator ball. All traces of the mechanical system disappeared long ago, as did the keeper's quarters, built in 1889 and seen in an old postcard view.

Today, left to the sea, salt, and wind, this 108-year-old structure will not likely last a fraction as long as its Athenian relative; but much as the Choragic Monument commemorates a forgotten theatrical triumph, the lighthouse memorializes a mode of forgotten commercial enterprise and transportation. Losing its initial function, the Portland Breakwater Lighthouse takes on importance as a marker of past time, style, and construction. And it stands, today, searching for attention.

By show's end, Audrey the plant is beginning to move about the shop and reproduce, creating a situation obviously reminiscent of the "Invasion of the Body Snatchers."

Also like that cult film classic, "Little Shop of Horrors" began life as a B movie that was ultimately remade for modern audiences. But the second celluloid "Shop" came after the stage version, which opened in the spring of 1986 at the WPA Theater and later that year moved to the Off-Broadway Orpheum.

The \$18 million movie "Shop" came out in late 1986 with a cast that included Rick Moranis, Steve Martin, Paul Dooley and Ellen Greene.

The plant is generally described as a Venus flytrap and while there are certain similarities, Audrey II is like nothing known to man or plant. She is simply herself, a nightmarish lovely with strange dietary habits.

It takes two people to play Audrey II on stage. In the Players' version, her voice will be that of Denis Drobinski and her movements will be those of Paul Menezes.

Cast as the human Audrey is Rebecca Kendall while Louis-Phillipe plays Seymour, Michael Crockett plays shop owner Mushnik and Jeff Levensaler is Orin, the dastardly dentist.

Others in the cast include Julie Cullen, Marilyn Minsky, Norrie Crocker, Greg Charette, Julie Ann Marshall, Debbie Rosenberg, Mark Snowden, Cheryl Reynolds, Patrick Swett, Danny Hawk, Ellen Crosby and Paul Leblond.

The director will be Joe Thomas while Reggie Bonnin will conduct an orchestra including pianist Susan Salisbury, drummer Lonnie Manchester and electric keyboardist Brian Cimmet.

THE famous plants of the stage and screen are few and fairly weird.

There's Jack's beanstalk, of course, and the yum-yum tree, not to mention the poppies that felled Dorothy and the corn that harbored a few crazed kids and the tree that grew in Brooklyn.

But they all lacked oomph or character.

Not so Audrey, perhaps the weirdest of them all and the star of the Portland Players' season-opening production of "Little Shop of Horrors," a musical comedy with real bite.

Audrey, you see, likes to snack on folks. But she's kind of... well, interesting; even likable in a pithy, visceral sort of way.

The toothsome lass actually begins life as an innocuous, humdrum bundle of stems, leaves and veins. She's sort of cute, but so are baby snapping-turtles.

In fact, there are two Audreys, the girl who works in a Skid Row flower shop and the 170-pound shrub — Audrey II — who reaches her zealous zenith in the same horrible shop.

Few have faced such perils as the human Audrey. On the one hand, her dentist boyfriend is a bit nuts and very sadistic. Then there's Seymour, a nerd

co-worker with a lustful thirst for the flesh-and-blood Audrey. And, of course, there's the other Audrey, who dines on unsuspecting victims provided by Seymour.

The first tidbit to tickle Audrey's gullet deserves it, but the act is still murder. Her ensuing morsels don't deserve to die, let alone in such a fashion, but their fates establish the fact that we're talking about unmitigated
