- Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

## Criteria for Recognition of Rotary World Fellowship Activities

New Fellowship activities groups seeking recognition of Rotary International must meet the following criteria and receive approval of the World Fellowship Activities Committee of R.I.:

1. Must be a group of Rotarians, adequate in number, sharing common interest in a worthwhile recreational or avocational activity;
2. Must have the approval of district governors of a minimum of three different districts in three different countries;
3. Must be organized with a president (or chairman or other administrative head) and be self-sustaining financially, administratively, and otherwise; and the head must be willing and able to serve as a member-at-large of the World Fellowship Activities Committee of R.I.;
4. Must be organized and function in harmony with established Rotary policy and must not use the Rotary name and emblem in any way contrary to established Rotary policy;
5. Must have for its objective and provide opportunities for the furtherance of acquaintance and fellowship among Rotarians, exclusively, with no financial, commercial, or political goals, expressed or implied;
6. Must have a potential international membership base open to any interested and qualified Rotarian, each of whom pledges a willingness to correspond and cooperate;
7. Must maintain a roster of members, revised annually;
8. Must not exist or function in any country in violation of the laws of such country;
9. Must understand and accept that recognition of the existence of the group by Rotary International in no way implies legal, financial, or other obligation or responsibility on the part of R.I., or any R.I. district or Rotary club, other than cooperation in furtherance of activity along with other Fellowship groups participating in the World Fellowship Activities program of R.I.;
10. Must publish and send a newsletter to all members of that Fellowship who are in good standing (as indicated by their inclusion in the annually revised roster of members), on an annual basis during each Rotary year.

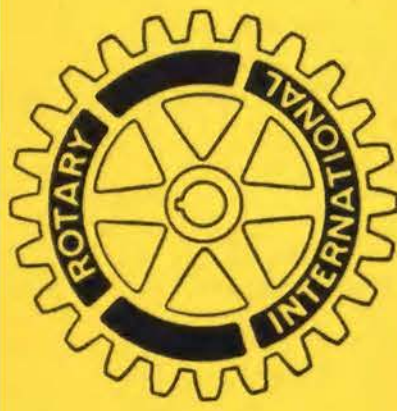

PRESERVE PLANET EARTH

A message from Rotary International President.

(from August 1990 Rotarian magazine)



**P**lanet Earth is our home—our only home in this life. If we destroy it, we have no recourse. If we poison its air, we cannot breathe. If we foul its water, we cannot drink—nor can we lease ourselves and our surroundings. If we annihilate its plants and animals, we cannot eat—nor can we maintain the equilibrium of nature.

If we destroy nature, we destroy ourselves. We also devastate the beauty and resources we inherited as citizens of earth, and the centuries of culture and progress we ourselves have created.

The preservation of Planet Earth is in our hands. Or it might be better to say the preservation of the remainder of Planet Earth—for we have already ravaged portions of it that can never be recovered.

Although the message is bleak, it is not final. But we must act quickly. Many parts of our earth and its inhabitants are already sick—from pollution, from hunger, from disease. And, ironically, as earth's bounties are depleted, populations increase, making more and more demands on the less and less that remains.

Our future—and the future of our children—hangs in the balance, but there is still hope. Our awareness has come in time—perhaps in the nick of time.

We must not leave solutions to governments alone. We must all help. We must change the mindsets that have permitted, even encouraged, waste and extravagance. This is a problem of all mankind because, from the simple cutting of a tree to the massive destruction of an atomic explosion, the selfish, foolhardy things we do accumulate to defile our planet.

Together, more than one million Rotarians stand with us unite in a mighty effort to **Preserve Planet Earth**. We are heirs of the earth. Our planet is our home. Love it. Preserve it. Save it.

**Who 'turns off'

In August 1989—Membership Development Month—I had the dubious privilege of hearing quite a few Rotarian friends lament the fact that so many club members drop out after having been in Rotary just a short time.

"How can we stop this?" they asked. The usual answers were given: "Get the new members involved"; "Establish personal and family contacts"; "Make them feel more at home during meetings"; "Let them know more about Rotary"; etc., etc.

But this conventional wisdom hasn't helped much, has it? Perhaps some introspection will provide an answer.

Who turns a Rotarian away from Rotary? Isn't it we, the other Rotarians?

As in any other field of life, a new entrant to a group or association is a keen observer of all those around him. He watches, weighs, and evaluates every action of those he has decided to associate with. He enters the world of Rotary with the knowledge of what has been told and written about the organization. Then he sees how the Rotarians in his club practice Rotary, individually and collectively. That is the all-important notion that gets imprinted in the new Rotarian's mind. If something jars, whose fault is it really?

Of course it is important to reach out and show friendliness, but it is more important to let one's actions, practices, truthfulness, and sincerity show. We often fail to achieve this standard, and thus drive away a friend who came so near within our reach.

A group is a collection of individuals, and the character of a group is the sum total of the individual personalities. When a group fails to retain a friend, when members run away from a club, it is indeed time for introspection.

"How are we projecting ourselves as Rotarians?" In the response to this question lies the answer to, "Why did we lose you, my friend?"

But that would not really answer her question: "What is Rotary about?"

After much thought, it came to me that Rotary is about the future. We focus our attention on tomorrow. All of our Avenues of Service are really about the future.

Club service concentrates on our activities for the coming year. What will we do at our next meeting? Will we enjoy ourselves and will we continue to meet each week? Will the club grow?

Community service focuses on our local area. Through this avenue we try to provide a better tomorrow for our city. We work with the Boy Scouts to insure that our kids get the right start in growing up. We work with the schools to show children that it is okay to grow up and be responsible. Rotarians are concerned that we pass along a better world for our children and grandchildren.

Vocational service is concerned with our place in business and industry. Can we follow and communicate a good code of ethics? Can we present our vocations in such a favorable light that young people will want to follow our footsteps and become business or professional persons?

International service promotes international goodwill and understanding, not just today but into the future. Rotary Youth Exchange and the Group Study Exchange program of The Rotary Foundation are keyed to the leaders of tomorrow.

You and I have the future in our hands. We can pass along a vital, growing, and worthwhile tomorrow. We can give tomorrow life. That's what Rotary is about.

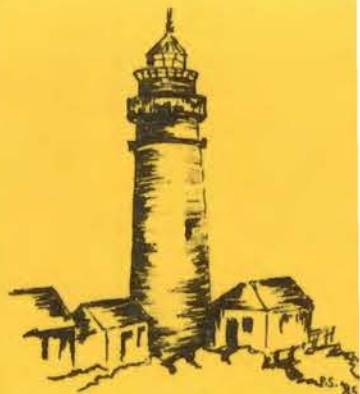

Tony Wagner gave a classification talk this evening.

Tony gave us a brief background of his life -

Tony was born in 1949 in the northeast part of the Bronx. He is the oldest of three children Tony was educated in the Catholic school environment. Tony attended the State University of New York Maritime College receiving a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering.

Tony began his career at Con Edison in New York. In 1976 he was hired by Betz and has been with them in the Specialty Chemical industry ever since.

Tony explained to us what the specialty chemical industry was and how his division works at blending chemicals to create treatments for water to get rid of impurities. These blended chemicals are then sold to industries to help them save on metal damage to pipes and containers. This is a large business and growing larger each year. The estimated savings to industries using these water treatments is very substantial. Water treatments is one small part of what Betz does and Tony sees the future of the specialty chemical industry as vital to the 1990s and on into the next century.

Some facts about transition employment are that only 15% of jobs are publically advertized, only 20% of job displacement is related to performance. Good people are available for employment needs.

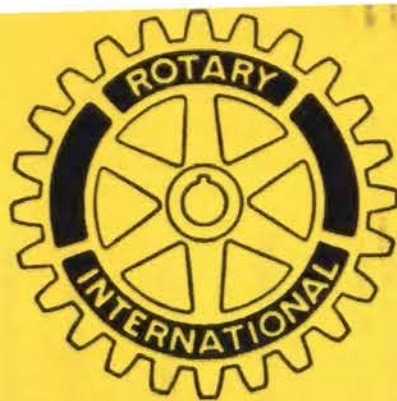

### Speaker :

Paul Butler introduced Dan Jones the Director of Admissions at Maine Maritime Academy.

Dan gave an excellent program describing the program and life of the students at MMA.

The college is located in Castine Maine on a beautiful 50 acre campus. The college has been in existence for 50 years building a world class reputation. Students come from all over the world although the majority are from New England... The college is proud to say that public service is a major part of each student's life at the school.

The college offers study in 10 different fields including engineering and ocean studies. The college has 19 different labs and supports the only Navel ROTC in Maine. The school also owns the 500' training ship the "State of Maine" and the sailing schooner "Bowdoin". Over half the power plant engineers in Maine are graduates of MMA. Students are not required to serve in the services or go to sea after graduation

Graduates can go to sea or not upon graduation. Many who stay ashore get jobs in pulp and paper industry and nuclear power. They also attain careers in marine study and computer science. Dan read an impressive list of the various careers that graduates have entered and it covered the complete gambit of professional careers.

65% of the students are from Maine and the college does not recruit outside of New England. The college is currently 90% complete in a capital campaign to raise \$10,000,000. The tuition for Maine students is currently \$6200 and the average starting salary for recent graduates is approximately \$32,000.

All in all MMA is in the mainstream of higher education in the state of Maine.
