LIFESTYLE IS LEADING CAUSE OF DEATH

It's a sobering statement to use as a headline, but one that needs to be kept in the foreground if we truly care about a long, healthy life.

Thomas Downing, director of USM's Lifeline Center, gave a very informative presentation about the center's evolution from the 1970's to present day.

Originally started as a co-operative walk/jog program with the Jewish Community Center, the lifeline program was first perceived as a recreational supplement. It has grown to a full-scale, self-funded fitness center which is broken into four areas catering to every person in our community.

The center is located at the Portland campus of USM which allows great flexibility in scheduling activities as most of the University's athletics compete at the Gorham campus.

Operating with an annual budget in excess of \$600,000, the center's program covers: Fitness, Rehabilitation, Continuing Education and Leisure Activities and Employee Wellness.

Most of the areas mentioned above operate in conjunction with other institutions. Mercy Hospital, UNUM, L.L. Bean are just a few of the businesses that benefit from the Center.

Young or old, it is never too soon to be concerned about your health. Mr. Downing stressed the importance of good health citing statistics that the biggest contributing factor to a healthy America will be through changes in everyday lifestyle. High blood pressure, stress, alcoholism... these are things which we have control over. The percentage of improved health relating to advances in medical technology is minuscule compared to the benefits achieved by minor changes in daily activities.

How do you learn more? Usually, the Center is promoted through the Grapevine... you know, that word-of-mouth sink-or-swim network. They even have a newly created Customer Service Center... not happy with your

health? Wouldn't it be nice to complain and actually have someone that can do something about it!?

WASTE NOT, WANT NOT

An old saying, a word from the wise, advice well given but never well received...until now!

Sherri Huber, the director of the Maine Waste Management Agency, spoke about the current problems facing Maine relative to waste and its management. (Not to be confused with managing an employee that is referred to as a 'waste product')

Ms. Huber spoke of the current processes which Maine uses to dispose of its wastes: 38% still goes to the wonderful landfills (Of which there are 185 operating legally and all but 12 are scheduled to close within 4 (four) years); 45% of waste goes to the incinerator; and 17% is recycled.

She said that the figure for recycling was actually very impressive placing Maine in the top ten in the country. There are plans to better that figure by 8% in 1992; and to hit 50% by the end of 1994.

Huber said that an important part of waste management is to eliminate it at its source. No where is this more easily done than at the manufacturing plant. Packaging alone accounts for a great percentage of the waste stream. There is pending legislation towards reducing waste in this manner by 5% in 1992 and 10% by 1994.

Also, the private sector is being affected by new legislation. Currently, businesses with 200 or more employees must separate and recycle office paper and corrugated products. In 1992 businesses with 50 or more employees will face the same requirements... And, in 1993, businesses with 15 or more employees will have the same row to hoe.

Sherri gave an excellent presentation and we thank her and **Bob Levasseur** for inviting her.

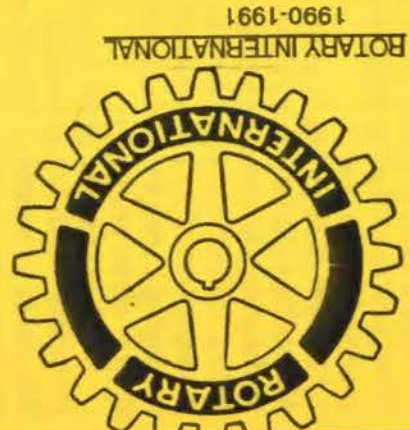

- Furniture:** The soft housing market is creating some very good bargains. You can get up to 20% off on even the most popular lines.
- Hotels:** Like the airlines, some hotel chains are now offering very low—but nonrefundable—rates. *Example:* You can stay at some Marriotts for as little as \$49 a night...if you pay for the entire stay in advance.
- Housing:** The National Association of Homebuilders reports about 50% of its members expect prices to rise this year ...40% see no change...and 10% expect prices to drop.
- Moving:** Long-haul, do-it-yourself moves will cost a lot less. Ryder Systems has cut its truck rental prices up to 40%, depending on the market.
- Poultry:** Prices could drop as much as 5% this year—to 87 cents per pound. *Reason:* Production is expected to increase 5% to 6%, and consumption is not growing that fast.

Price alert

- Beer:** Today, premium brands are selling at discounts, too.
- Camcorders:** Discounts of 33% and more have helped drop the average price to near \$850—\$150 less than just a few years ago.
- Cellular phone service:** Rates could fall 10% or more over the next few years as competition increases. The FCC is allowing firms that provide mobile communications for fleets of vehicles to enter the market.
- Fax machines:** Some bare-bones models can be found for as little as \$325.
- Fish and seafood:** Expect a 2% to 4% increase this year—about the same as last year's 2.2% advance, but considerably below the 5% increases of the previous two years.

Already, the State has the lowest teacher to pupil ratio in the nation. It has also climbed from the basement to the 34th floor in terms of teacher's salaries compared to the other United States.

She admits that some of these advances haven't greatly affected the overall test scores which are used to measure scholastic abilities; but, they are important nonetheless. Maine is unique in that nearly 60 percent of school age children don't go beyond high school. However, the Board is trying to set up a program that requires that all students achieve at least a minimum standard of excellence.

Jane answered a few thought provoking questions before receiving her official Rotary Mug from the President of the Club, Mr. Joe Conroy.

He told Jane that the most important thing about education is the learning triangle of: Student, Parent and Teacher.

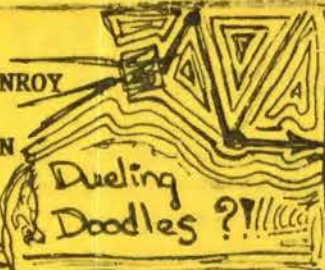

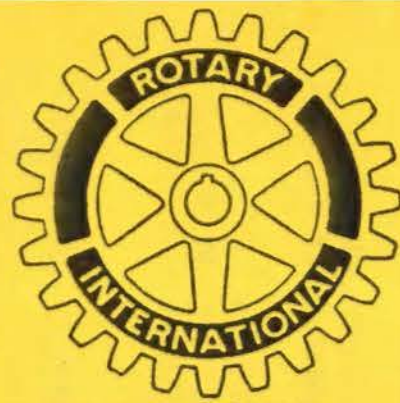

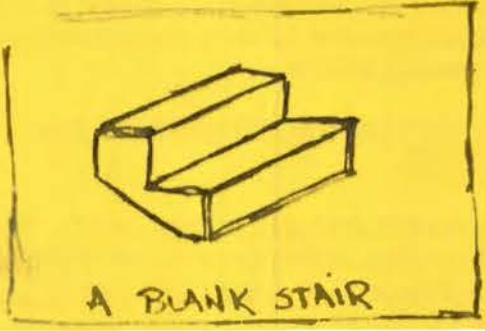
