

1 large cucumber, peeled, seeded, and cut into 1" pieces
1 large sweet green pepper, peeled, seeded, and cut into 1" pieces
1 large sweet red pepper, peeled, seeded, and cut into 1" pieces
1 large rib celery, cut into 1" pieces
1 large rib celery, cut into 1" pieces
1 large carrot, cut into 1" pieces
1 medium onion, cut into 1" pieces
4 cups tomato juice
1/4 cup red wine vinegar
1 tsp oregano

WOULDN'T IT BE NICE

The Beach Boys sing a song by that name. It includes a line that says:

"...wouldn't it be nice to live together in the kind of world where we belong..."

Of course, the world that the Beach Boys are singing about has more to do with adolescent fantasies than with the 'real' world. However, thinking about that song, we, in these United States, are closer to living in the kind of world where we belong than we might realize...

True, there are still cases where prejudice, injustice, and intolerance exist, but; we in these United States have the choices to make our own decisions and the means to pursue justice if we have been victimized by any of the itemslistedearlier.

The children of Belfast, Northern Ireland aren't as lucky. They are constantly subjected to prejudice between persons of the same race, but; of different religions.

Bruce and Susan Schulyler spoke to the Club about the Maine Irish Children's Program. Founded in Maine in the mid-eighties, the program sponsors more than a dozen children each year. Each child, ranging in age from 10-12 are from Belfast, Northern Ireland. They are coming to the States for a six-week educational experience.

Ideally, they will learn that people of different religions are essentially the same. Many of the students (each group is split into equal representation of the Catholic and Protestant faith) have been bought up believing some pretty bizarre things about the other.

Susan told us about the history of these exchanges. Initiated by a letter from a distraught Irish mother, who wanted her child to have a safe time away from home, the program was begun by the Hibbing Rotary Club in Northern Minnesota.

That was 1974...the program now serves thousands of children each year through 23 different programs. The Maine program places 16-24 each year. The funds for the exchanges are raised through various fund-raisers and privatedonations.

It was truley an enlightening presentation and we thank Fred Janson for inviting the Schyulers.

Mr. Richens is the key contact responsible for coordinating our upcoming three-way fund-raising event with the residents of Xalapa, Mexico.

She stressed that the most important steps in estate planning (beside having a will!) is to designate someone to carry out the power of attorney duties. Another equally important consideration besides those mentioned relative to reducing taxable estates, is to give serious consideration to Living Wills or Health Care Declarations.


SCHOOLDAZE

The only difference between Bangor, Maine and Archangel, Russia is the size of the cities...their

ocation...thepopulation...
ARCHANGEL. Located in the flat-nothingness 600 miles North of Moscow. There are approximately 400,000

residents engaged in primarily shipping and lumber However: the city is also the site of some of the major missle bases; submarine manufacturers; and other secret

defenseinstallations...rather...was!

Bill Serreta, President of Harper-Connecting Point. and Portland Rotary Club's Chairman of International Services spoke about the City of Archangel, Russia

He was one of a small delagation that travelled to Russia last year. Bill spoke about three major items relative to his trip and his duties as Chairman of Internaional Services and Co-chair of the AID to Archangel

Where is Archangel? As described above...just

about nowhere...similar to Bangor, but bigger!

What exactly is the AID to Archangel Project? Essentially it is a relief effort organized in conjunction with the 'Sister Cities' movement started in the late 1980's. Portland was matched with Archangel. During the subsequent meetings, it was determined that Archangel. ike many Russian cities, was in need of great assistance

However, due to the political climate during 1989 thru 1991 none of the efforts amounted to much. Finally, in ate 1991 there was another attempt made... very

successful!

It only took 9 days to gather 25 tons of food plus \$20,000 in cash! Most of the items were donated by large corporations, but a lot was collected by area schools. The items (including medical supplies and anti-biotics) were shipped through a network of vendors at no charge. Nearly 95% of the shipments reached the intended end users!

What is going on in Archangel today? There is the potential for a Rotary Club ... if they'll elect officers! Bill told stories about how difficult it was for the people of Russia to get used to actually having a voice... one that is

Throughout the journey, the delegation saw a desperate people. There is a great resource of businesses ranging from Bear Testicles to Submarines. BUT, they haven't a

clue as to running a business.

The conclusion of Bill's talk seemed to say it all: Russia is no different from the United States, the only problem is that the US won the Cold War because we didn't run out of money first.

It's funny, but even with all the troubles, the Russian people seem to maintain a sense of humor as evident from. the following story:

The Russian farmer had finally saved enough Rubles to buy a car outright. The dealer said it should be ready to be picked up 5-years from this day. The farmer said that

would be fine, if he could pick it up in the morning. Perplexed, the dealer asked why.

Because, da plumber is coming in the afternoon!"

What can be done? Wachtel suggested 'short-term' stimulation. She said that there has been substantial progress already resulting from the Governor's recent Job Summit. The soon to be released: Jobs Commission Report will highlight proposed flat-rate taxes; Worker's Compensation repair and/or replacement; and efforts to reduce duplication of regulatory agencies' policies.

Ms. Wachtel hoped to allow time at the end of her presentation to answer questions, but after expounding on many of the programs her office offers, there was little time remaining. She didn't have time to touch on Education, Health Care and Tourism and the effects that each have on the long-range survival of the State of Maine.

However, she did stress that the most important goal to be reached is proper long-term planning. Without it...the State cannot compete in the INFORMATION AGE. Many thanks to Wayne Goodrich for inviting Lynn...

Trying to stress the impact of current Worker's Comp rates on area businesses, Russ gave the following example of a Gorham company's rate increases over the past few

The company, involved in manufacturing, has a workforce of one-hundred and fifty. It has been in Gorham for nearly twelve years and is one of four locations across the country. During the past few years, the company's insurance rates have sky-rocketed from \$66,000 to more than \$365,000.

The worst part relative to the whole' scheme of things' is that the Gorham location is the safest of all of the locations. In fact, one of the least safe operations spends just \$60,000 on Worker's Compensation in another state.

Currently there is an unofficial investigation being conducted through the Maine Municipal Association to try and find another system. The group involved with this project represents many different entities ranging from local government to small business.

Also, a new 4-member 'blue ribbon' Commission has been established by the Governor and the Legislature to research the current system and to seek alternatives to a problem which has plagued Maine for more than two decades...GOOD LUCK!

The future looks a bit gloomy when one considers that already 15 of 18 insurance companies have left the State of Maine... BUT, Joel thinks that something may come of the work being conducted by the two groups... one of which has an August deadline to report!



LOW INCOME HOUSING PLANNED FOR CAPE'S TOWN CENTER

The Comprehensive Planning Committee's Town Center sub-committee presented its vision of the "future" center of Cape Elizabeth to the full committee at a meeting last week.

The plan shows several high-rise, multi-family buildings immediately adjacent to the present Town Hall It also includes multi-use facilities framed by the Route 77 and Shore Road corner. The Town Hall would be moved across the street and be the anchor for a Governmental Center which would include: Fire, Police and Public Works; Local administration; School administration and a PublicRecreational facility

The plan was developed in conjunction with CETA funding programs and a locally matched Town Center Funding program... YEAH! RIGHT!!

Actually, there was such a plan proposed in the midseventies for the Cape Elizabeth Town Center area. It never received the public's support (good thing!) But it

opened many eyes as to the possibilities...
Town Planner Maureen O' Meara is presently working with Cape Elizabeth's Town Center Planning Committee (TCPC) She explained that the group, consisting of nine members of the Cape Community, are exploring many issues relative to the Town Center concept

She described the study area begining at the intersection of Hill Way and Route 77 (Tarbox Triangle); continuing along Route 77 unitl it intersects with Fowler Road and Old Ocean House Road.

The area also extends easterly down Shore Road to the Community Center and to the west along Scott Dyer Road

encompassing the whole school complex

Maureenidentified many avenues being investigated by the TCPC. Included are: possible ordinance changes regulating set-backs; possible signalization of the Shore Roadintersection; increased commercial activity (within existing structures) and the enhancement of trails and sidewalks to provide linkage with the various contiguous neighborhoods.

The Chairman of the Cape Elizabeth Conservation Commission, our own Jack Roberts, followed up on Maureen's linkage theme. Jack spoke about the Commission's efforts to create a 'greenbelt' throughout the

The function of a greenbelt is to provide relief from urban spread. It keeps natural areas preserved to be enjoyed by hikers and future generations. Currently there are a few hundred acres providing conservation easements.

However; most of the easements and land masses are not marked. The Conservation Commission is working closely with the Cape Elizabeth Land Trust to change this...but, there will be many hours required from volunteers to complete the process... beware of Jack!!
